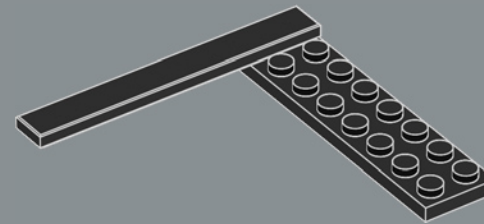


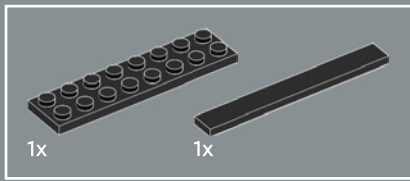
1163-1182: The east side of the cathedral was completed first and served as a functioning church while construction continued on the rest of the cathedral.



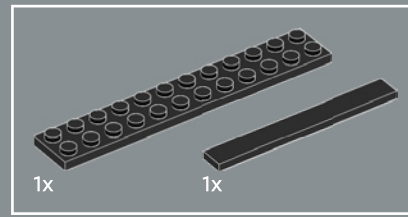
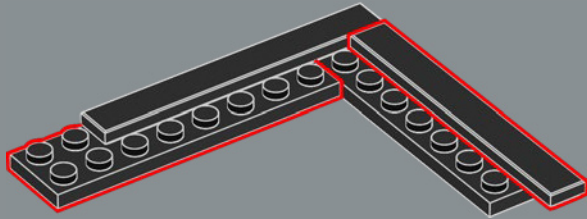


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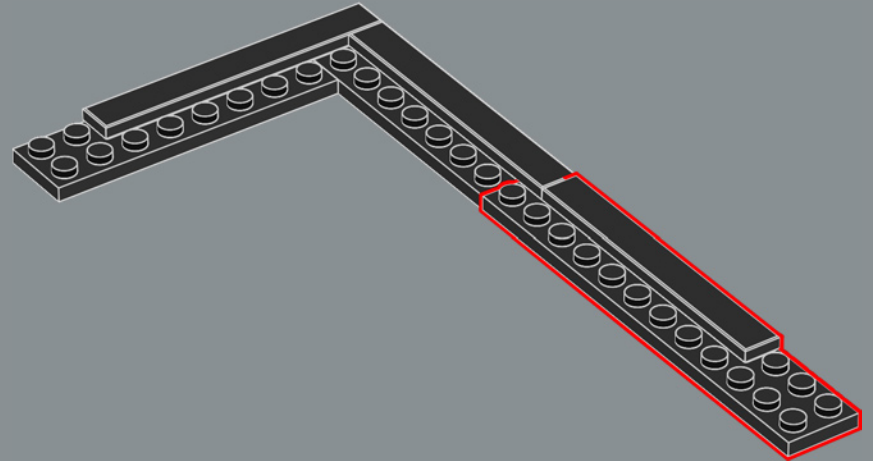


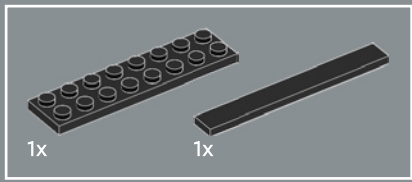


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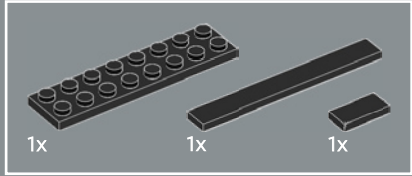
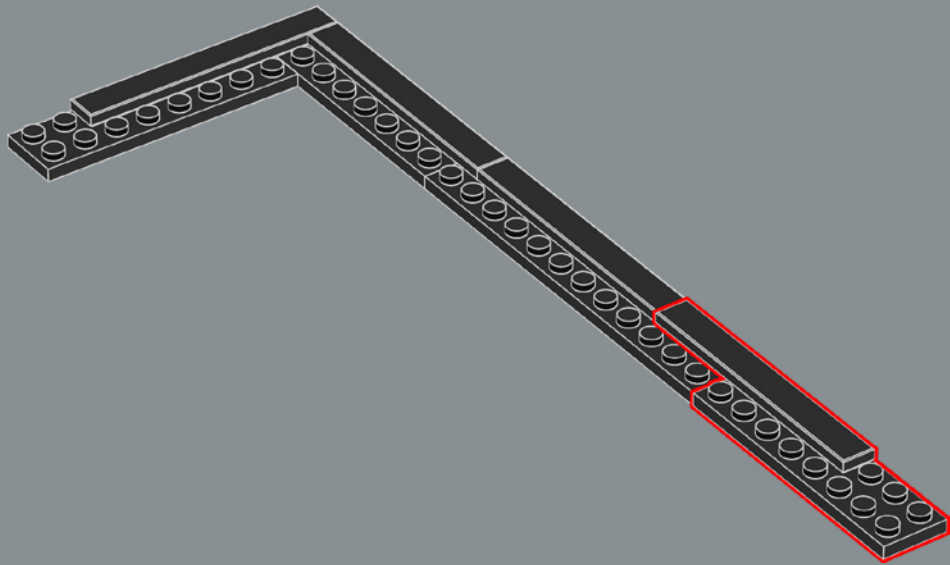


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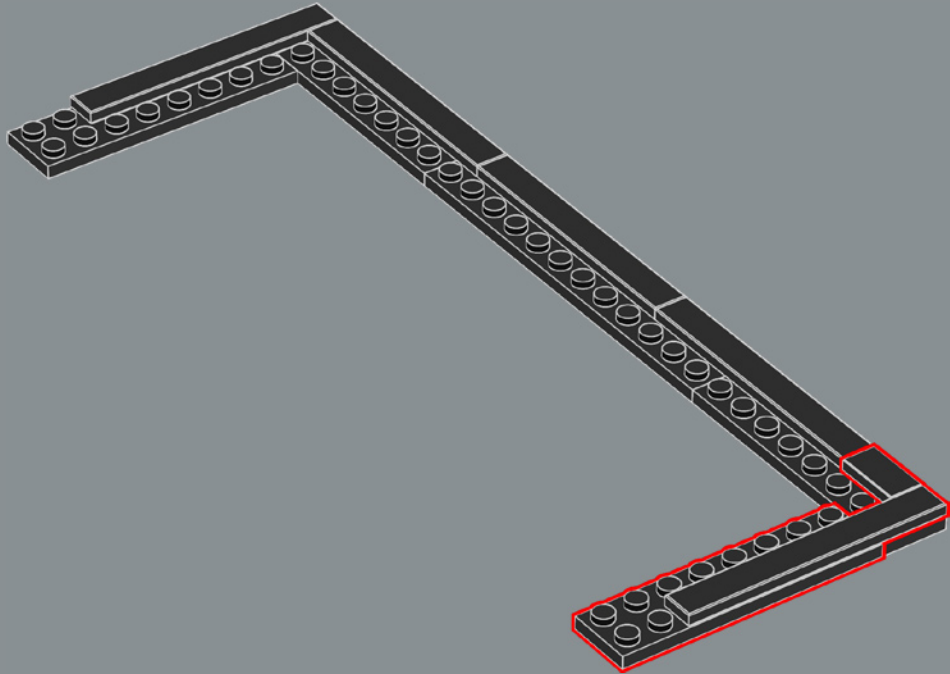




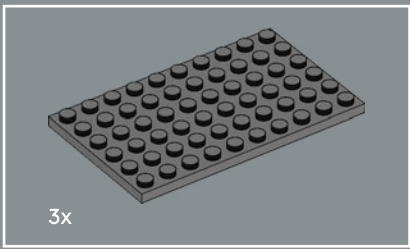
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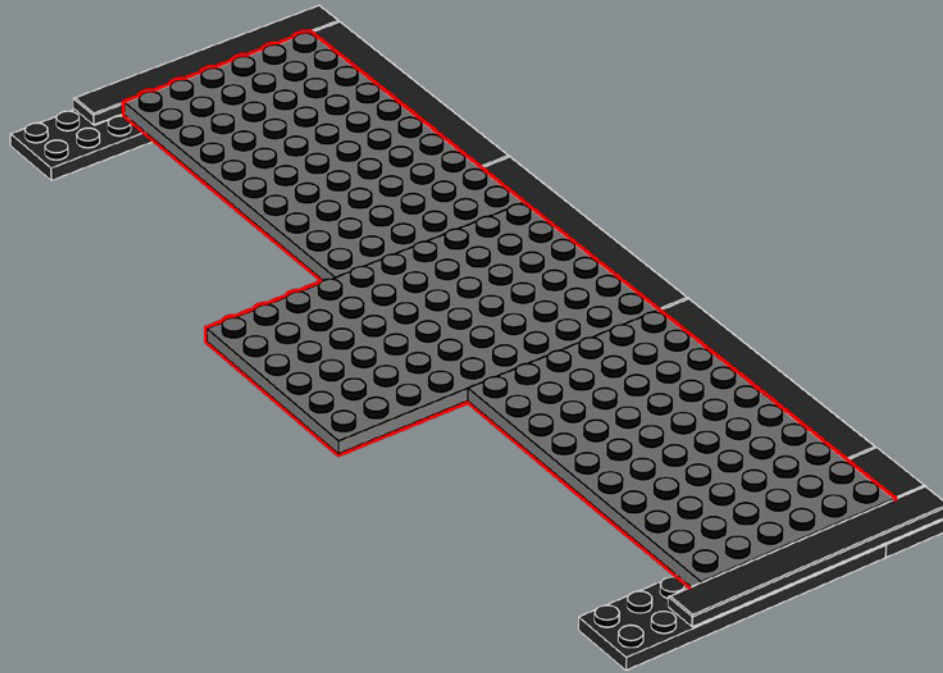
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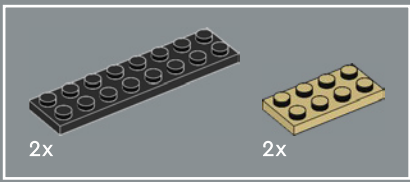


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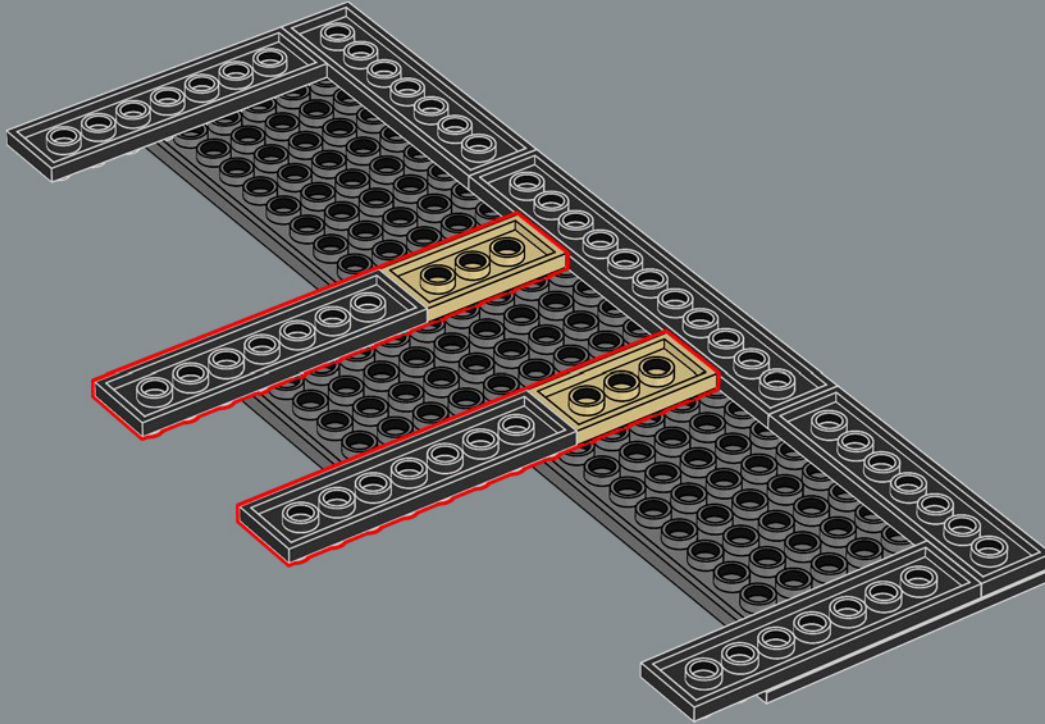


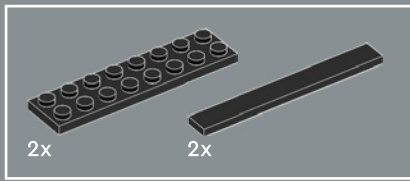
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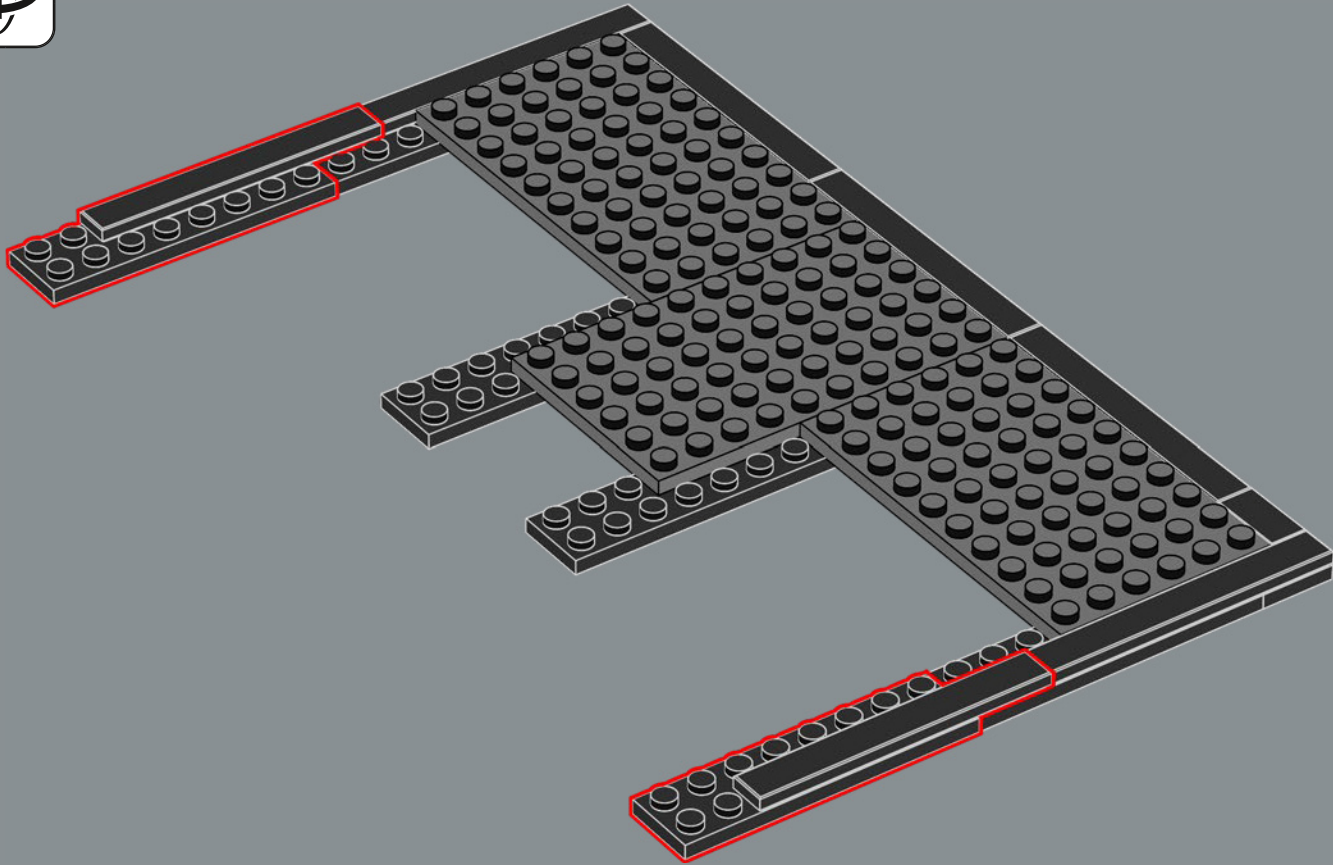


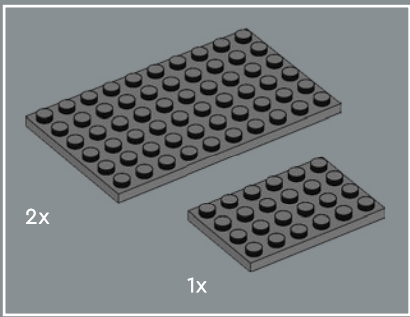
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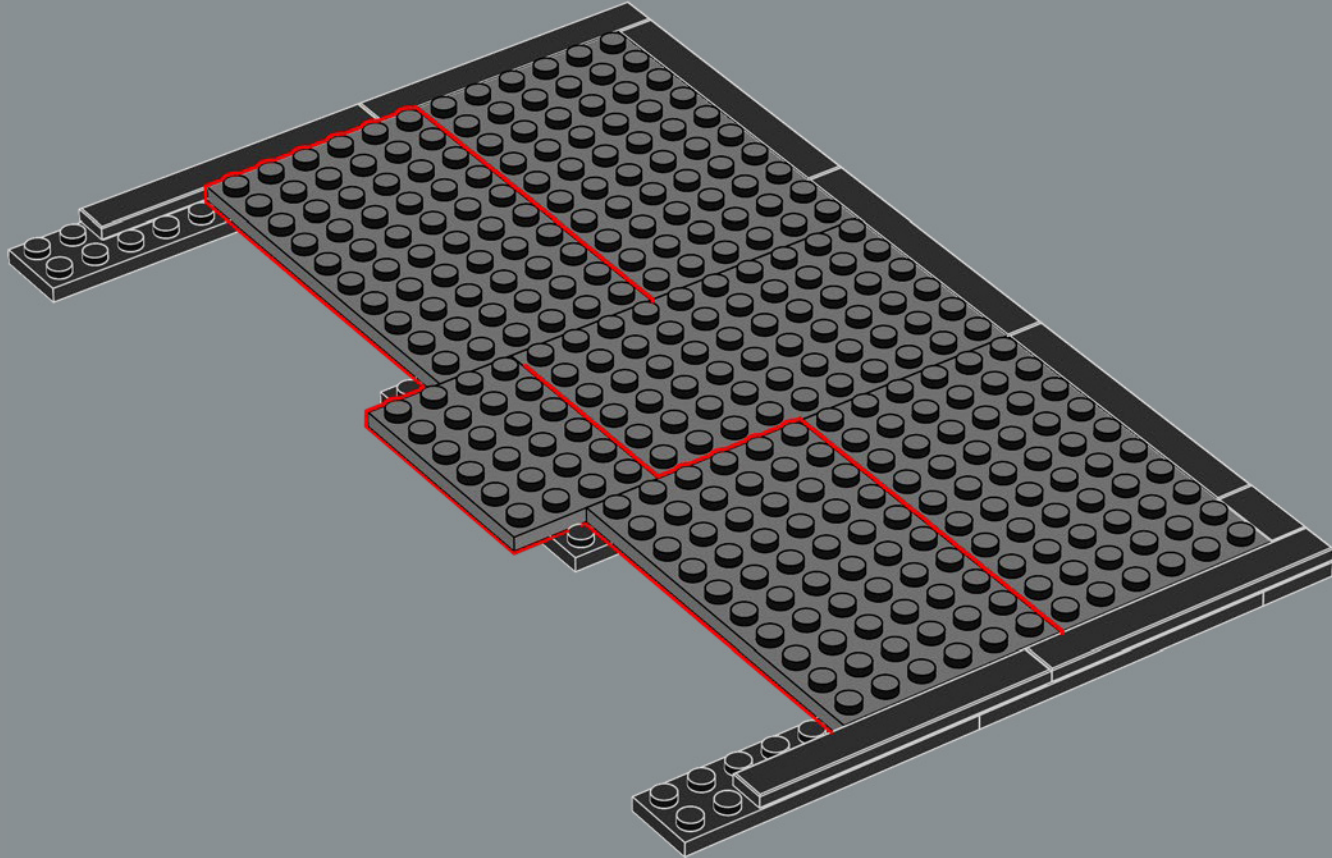


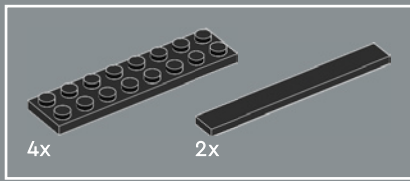
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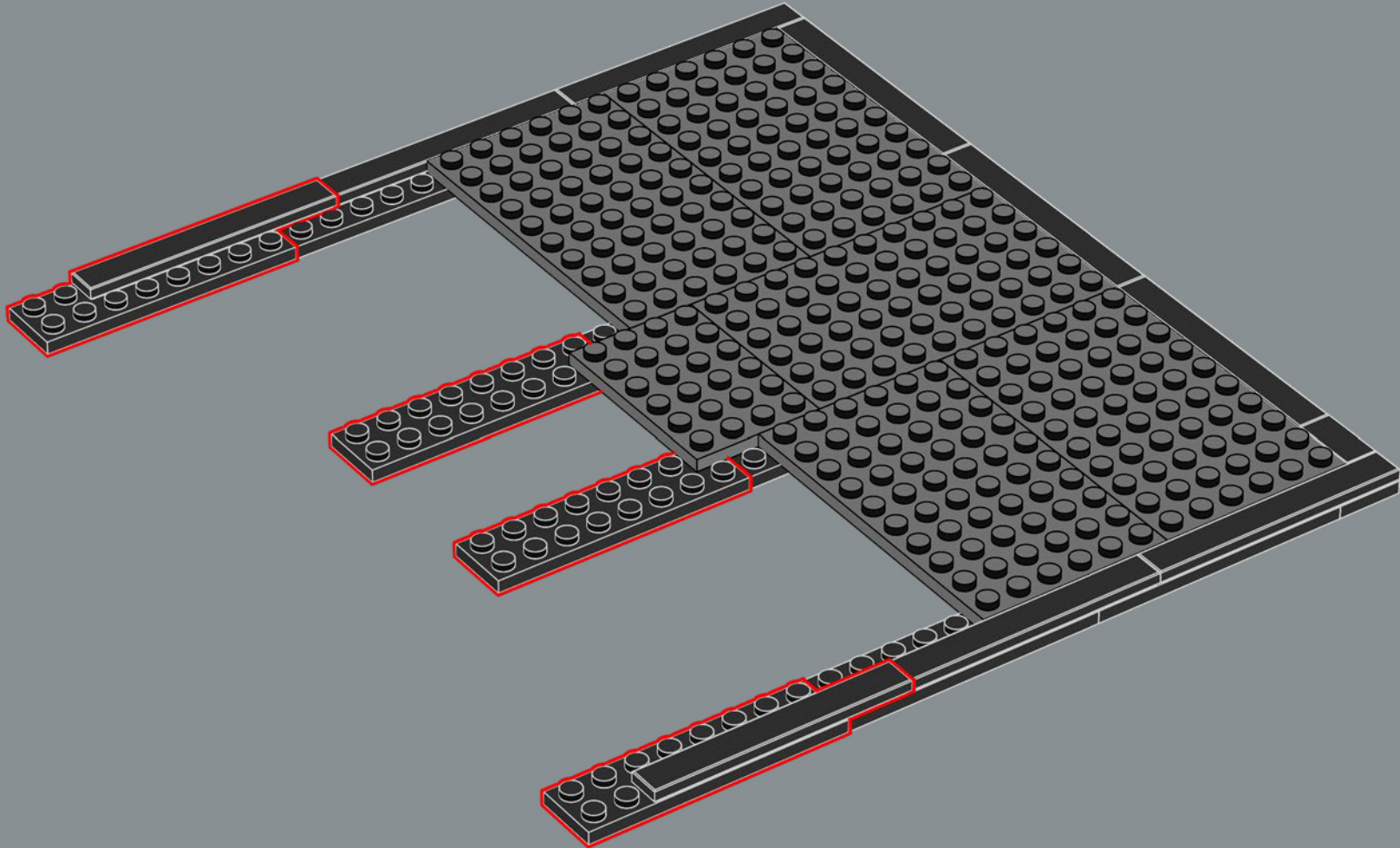


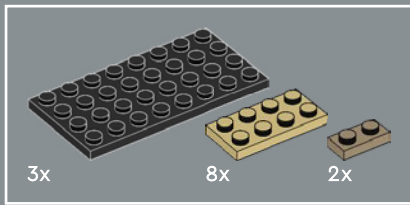
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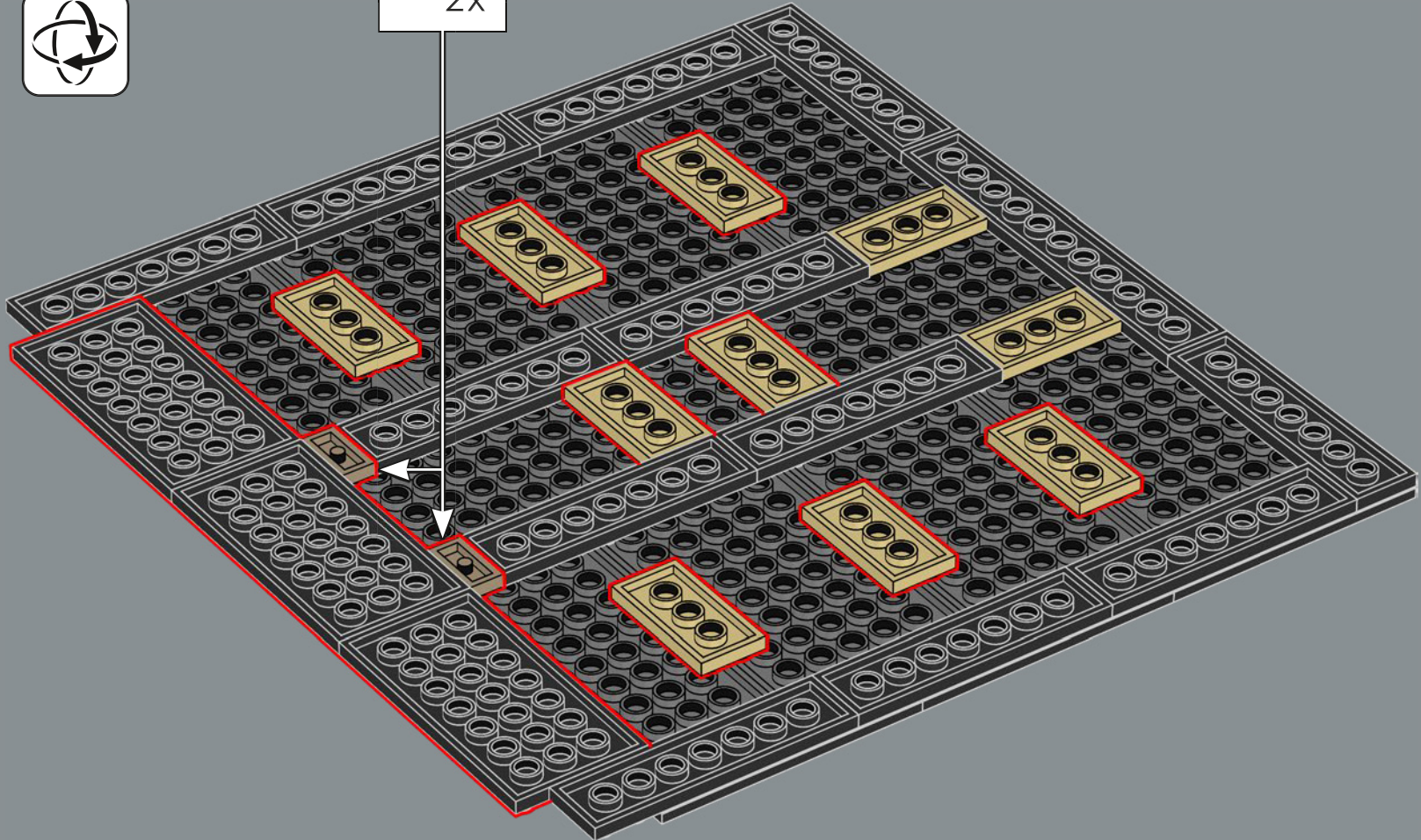
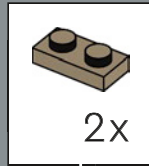


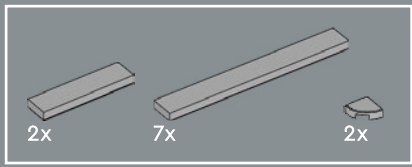
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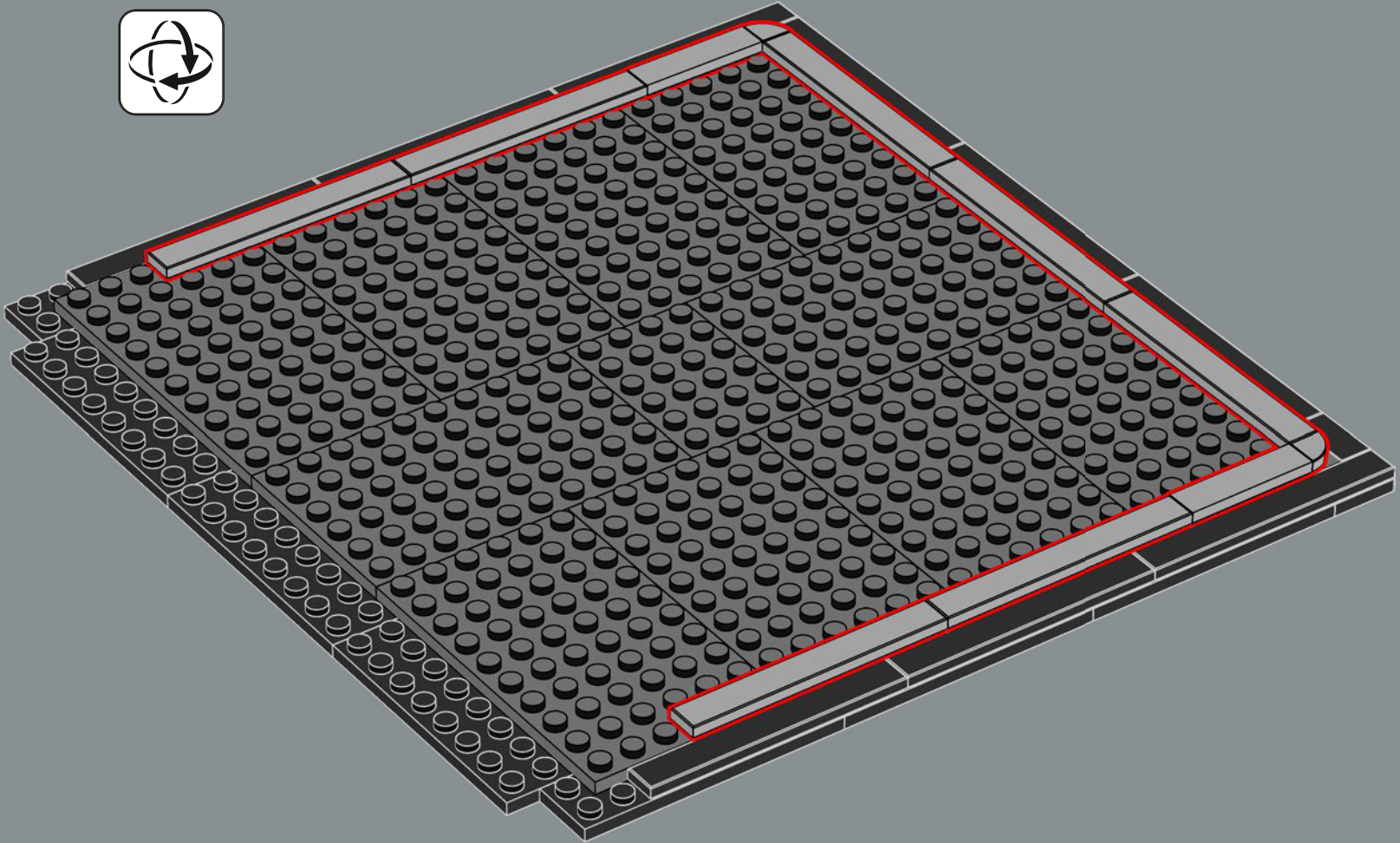


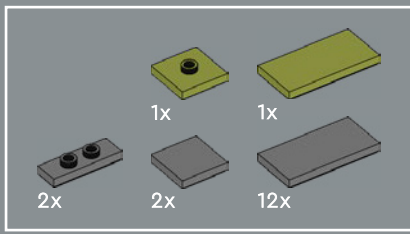
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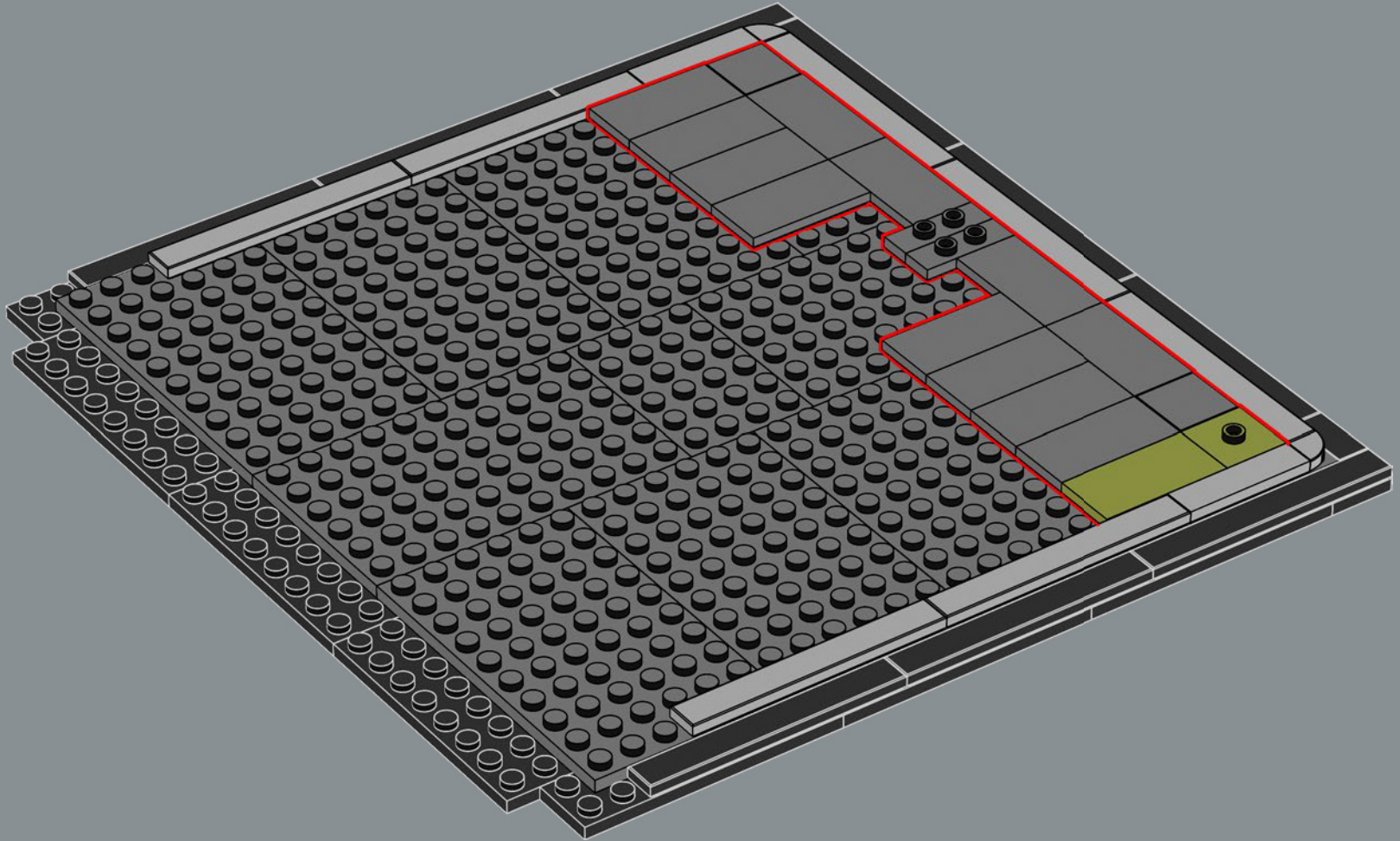


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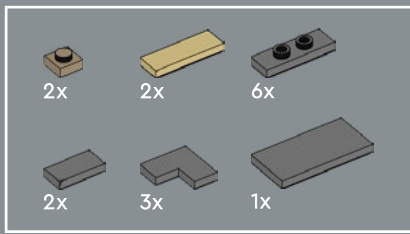




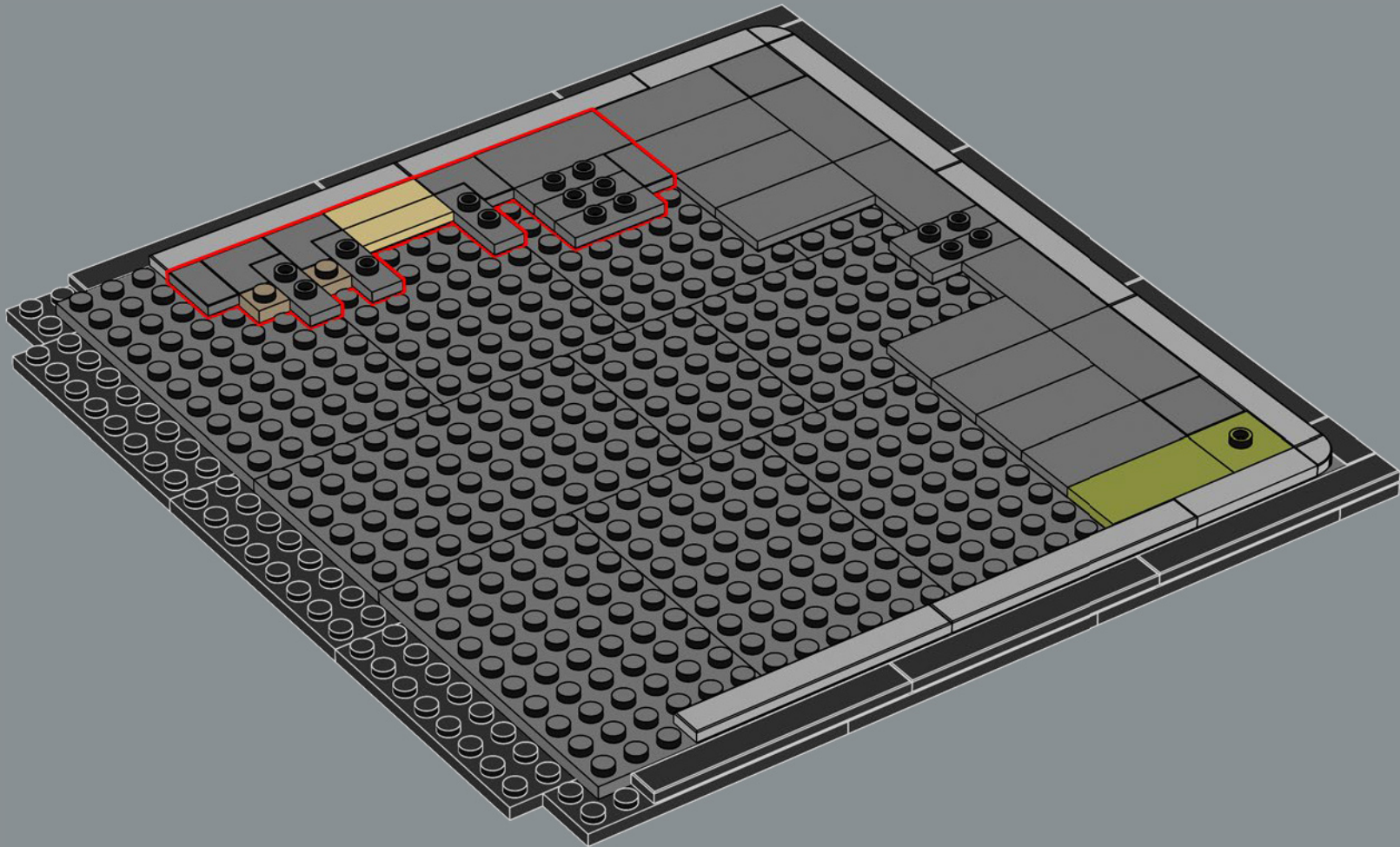
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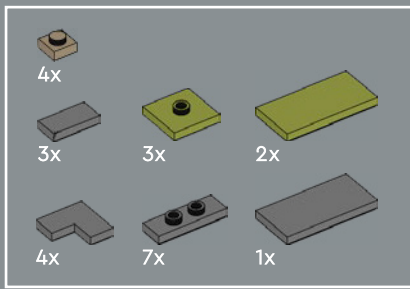


1163 - The plans for the Notre-Dame Cathedral are ready. Construction begins and Pope Alexander III oversees the first stone being set in place.

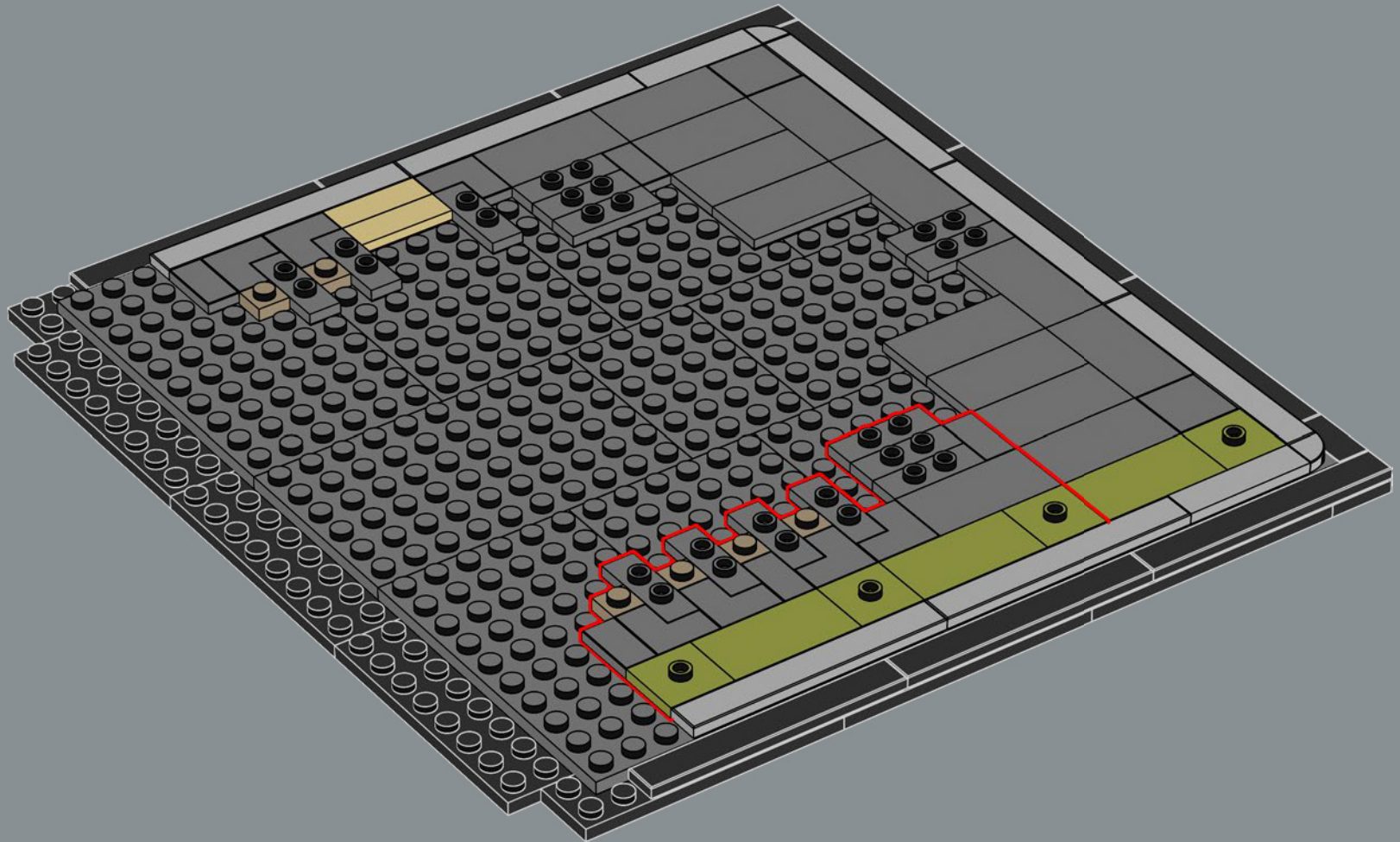


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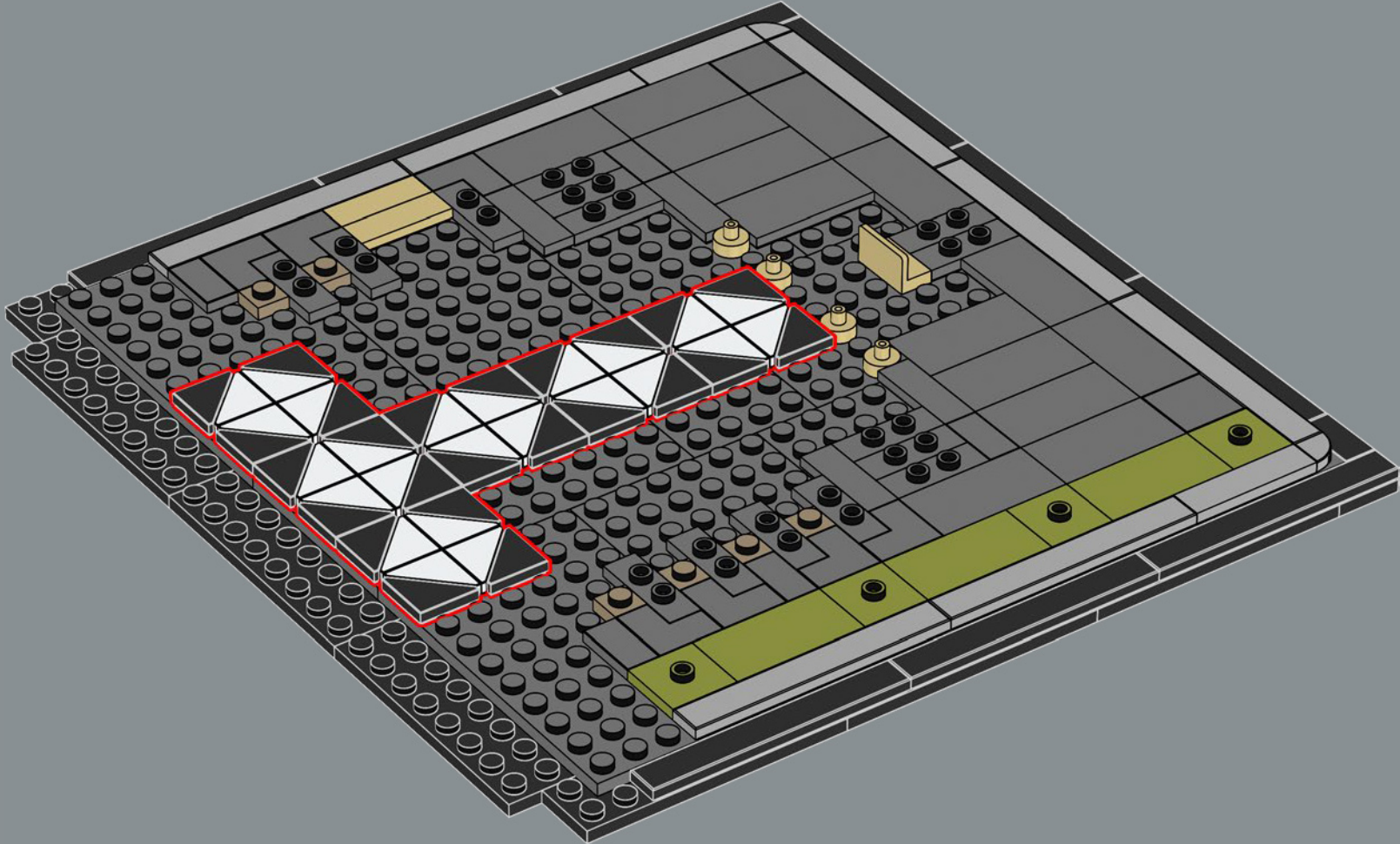


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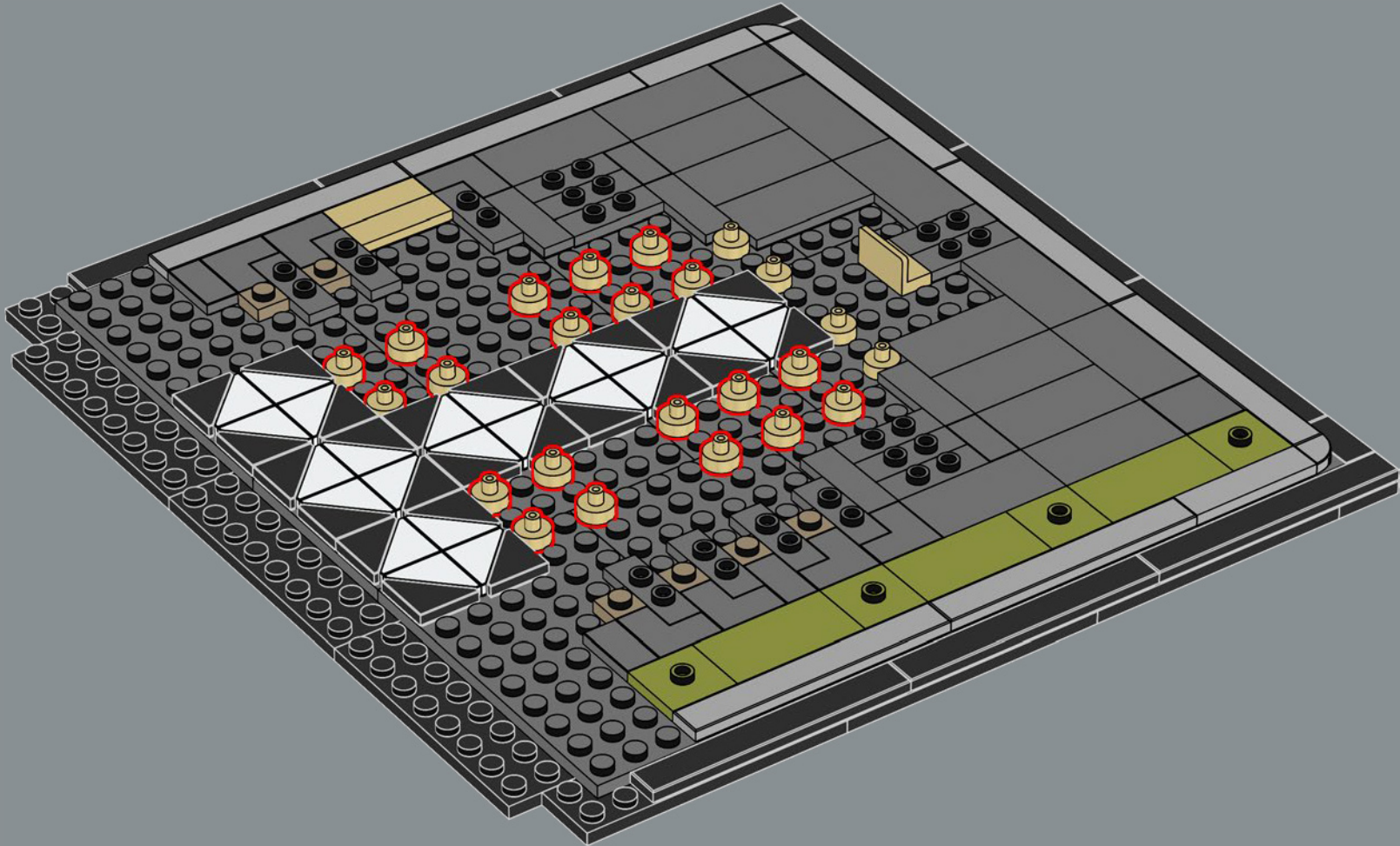
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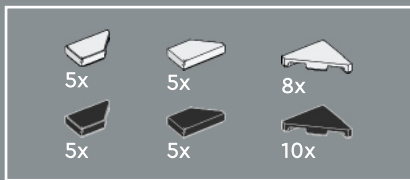




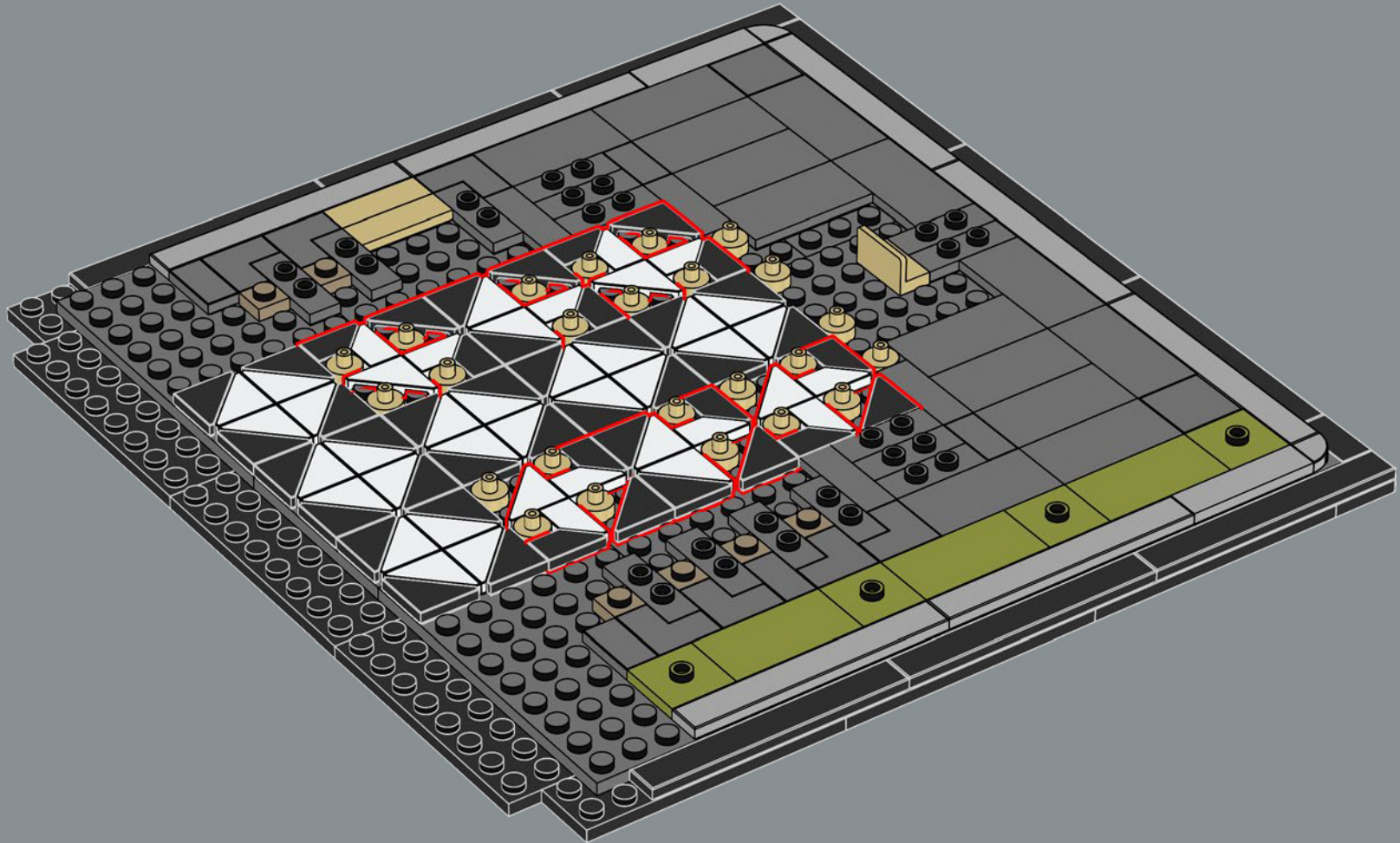
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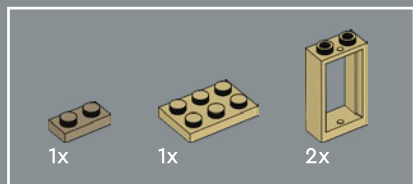
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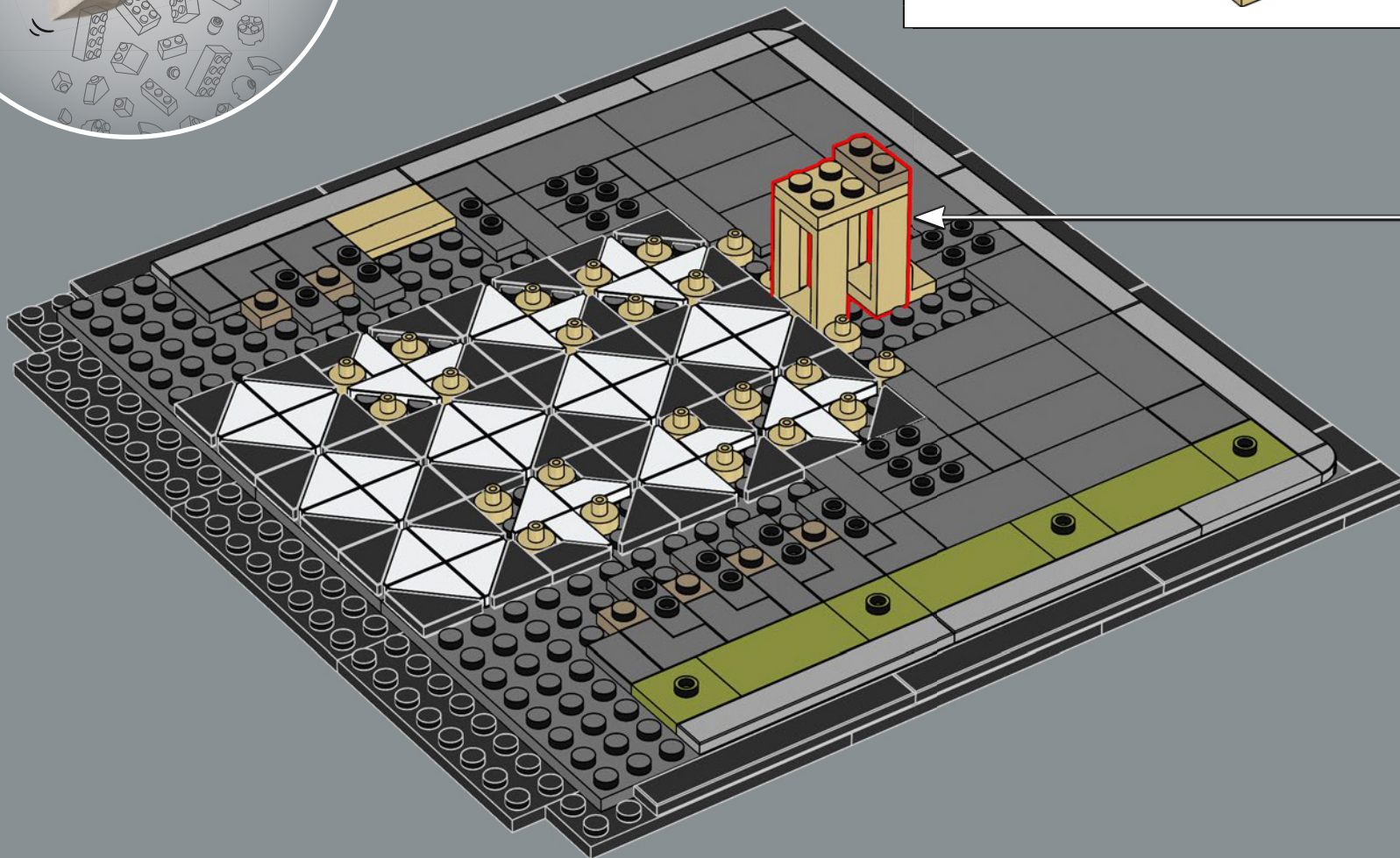
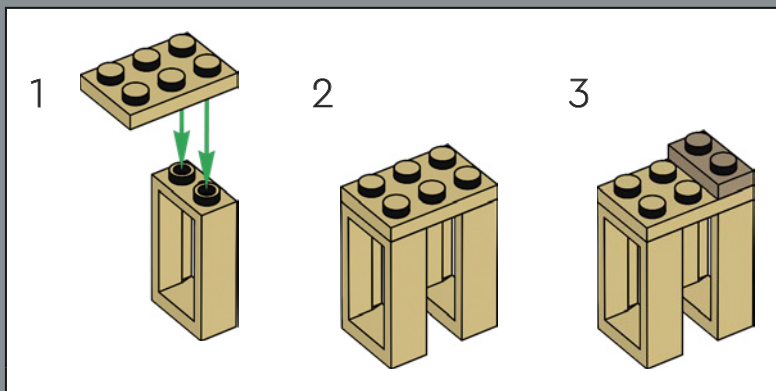


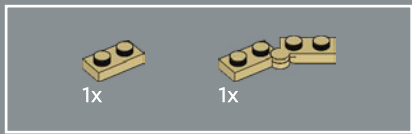
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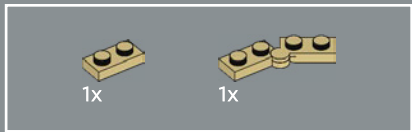
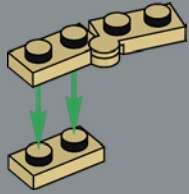


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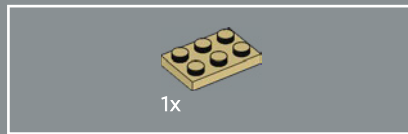
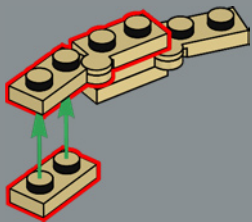




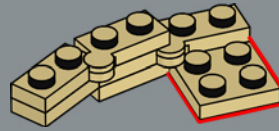
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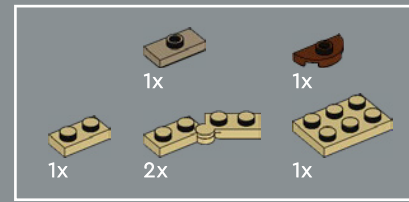
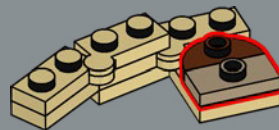
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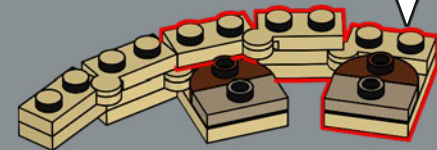
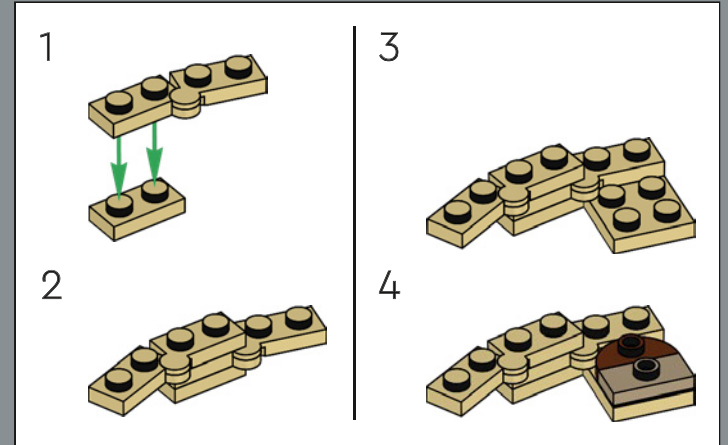
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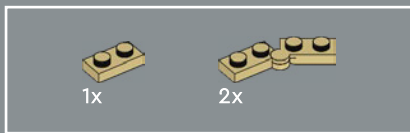


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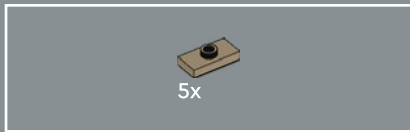
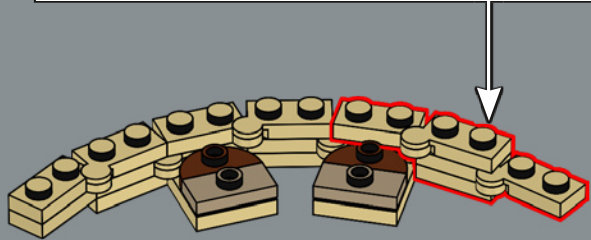
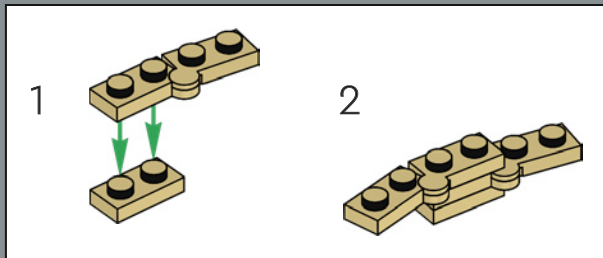


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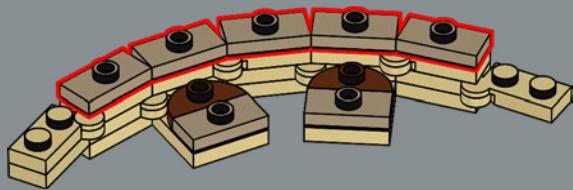




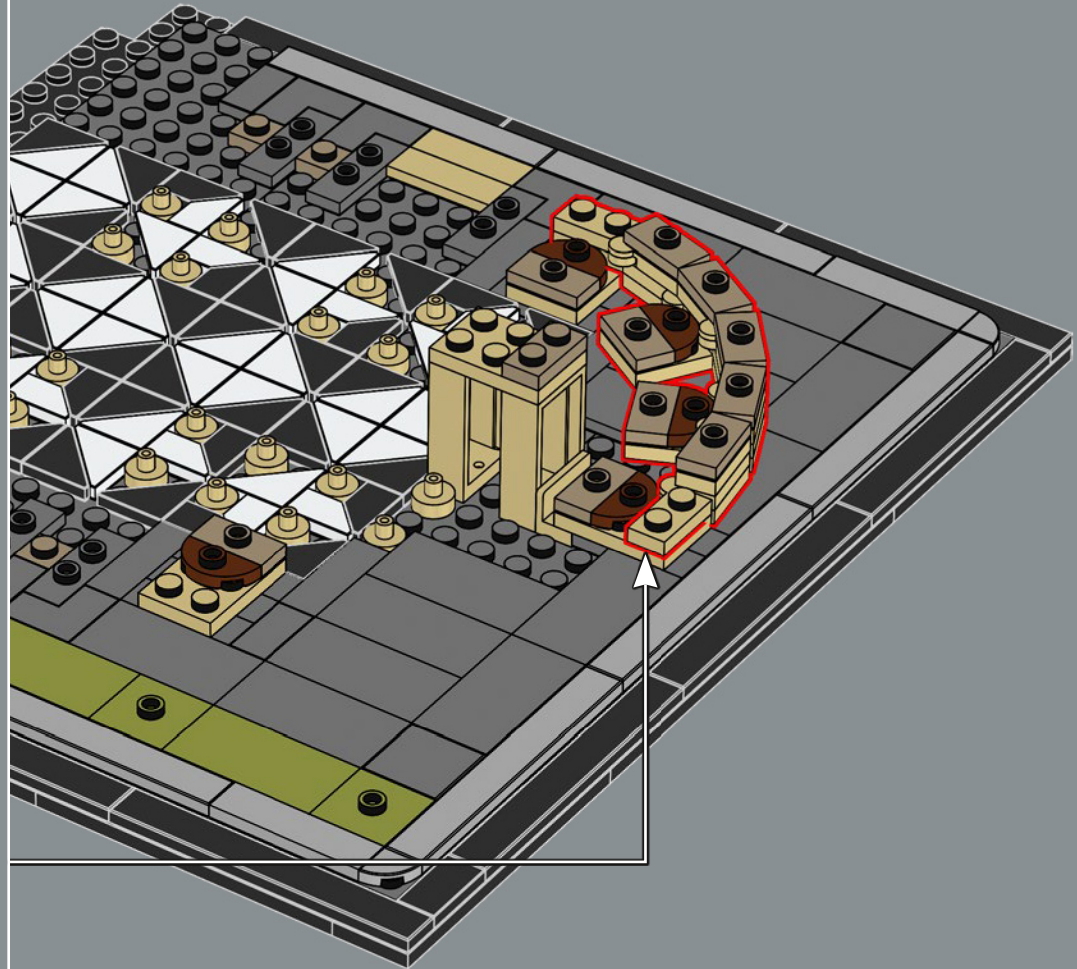
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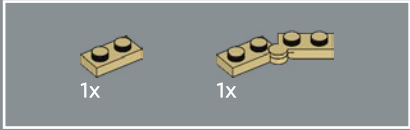
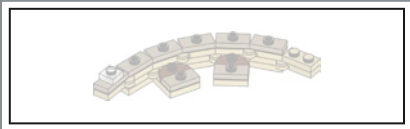


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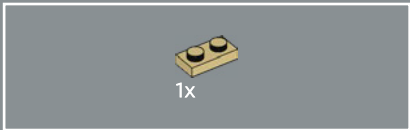
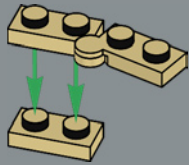


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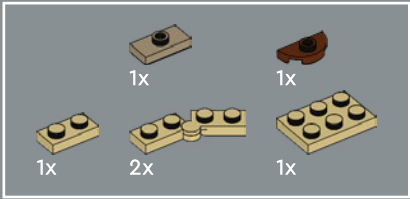




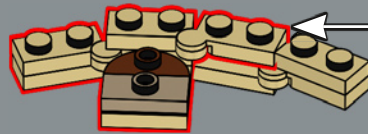
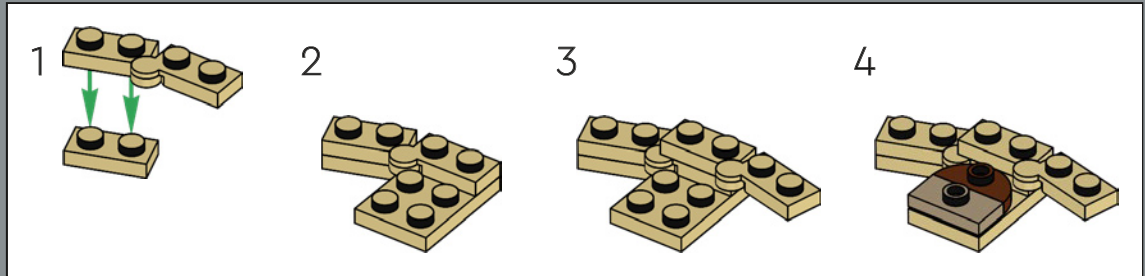
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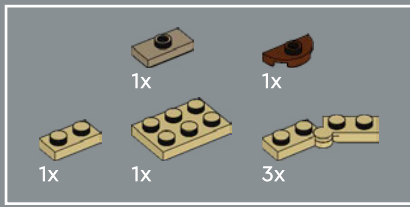


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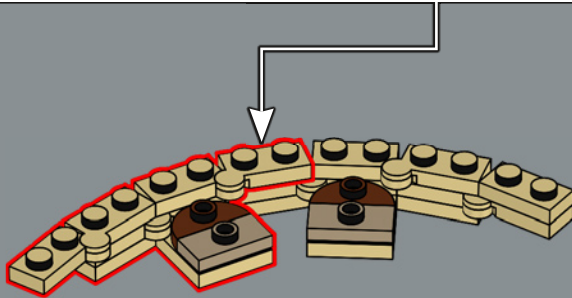
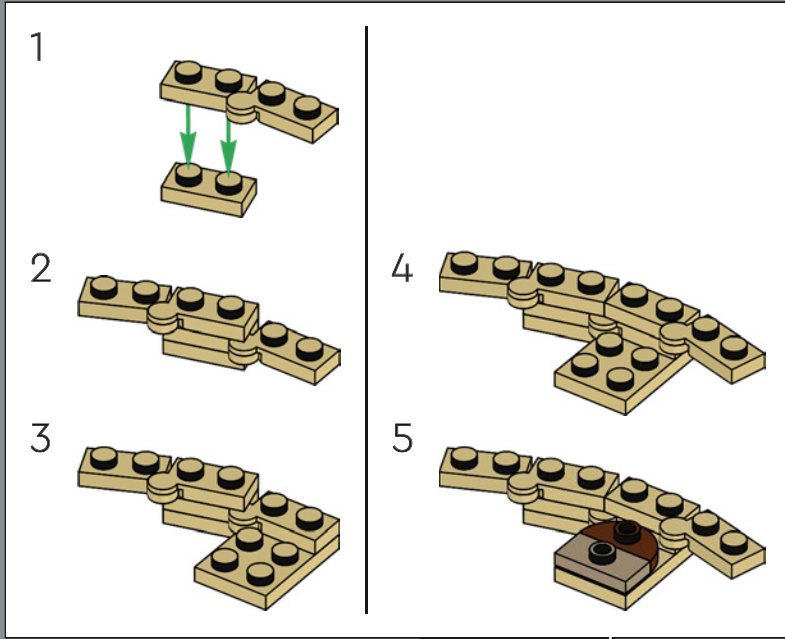


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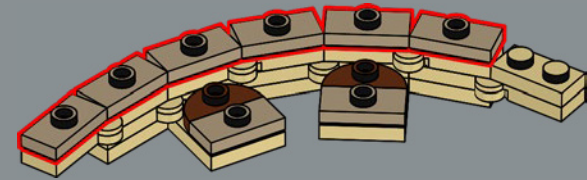




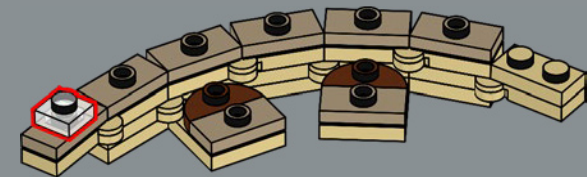
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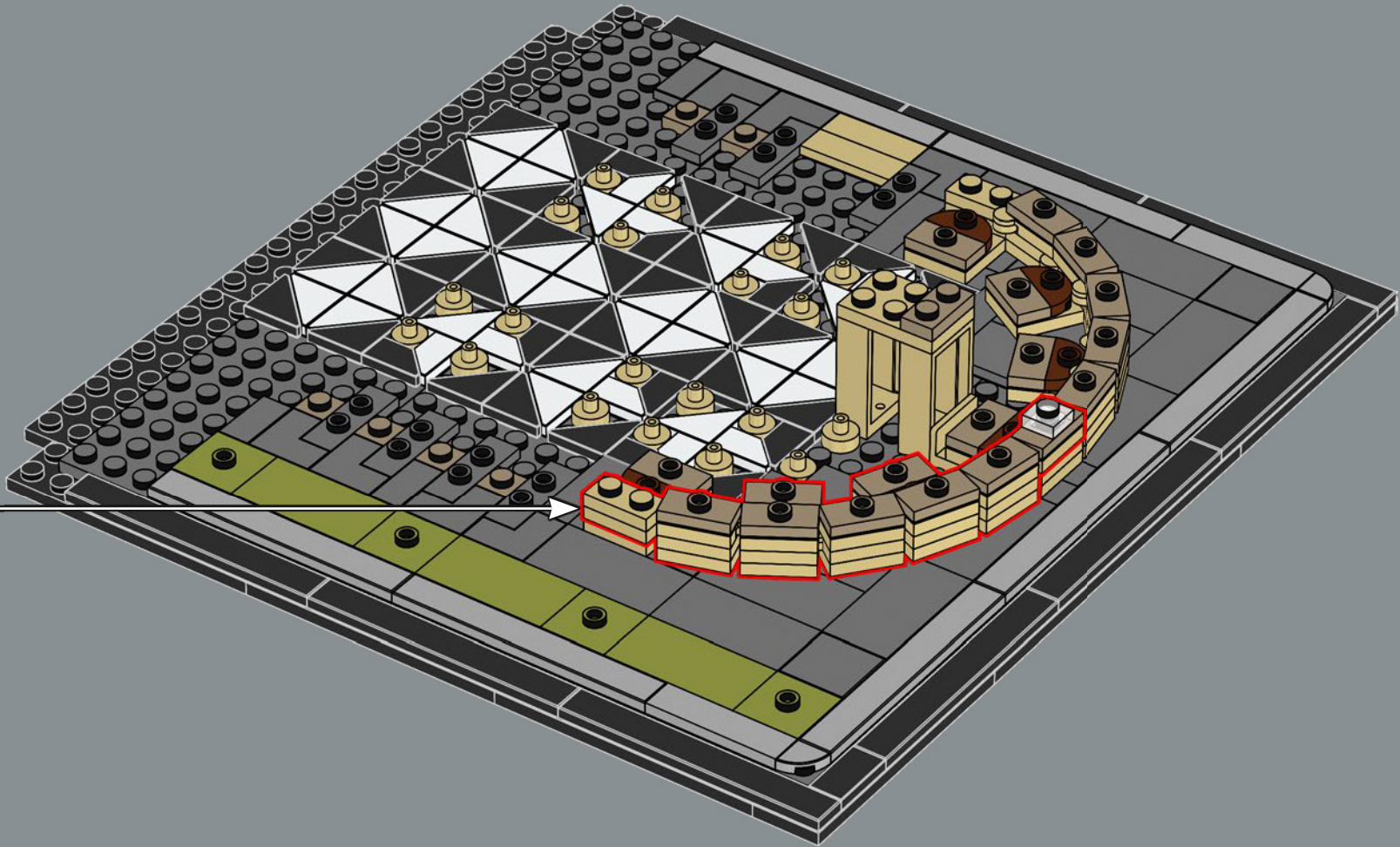


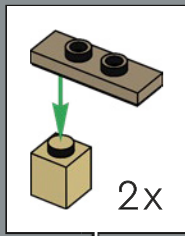
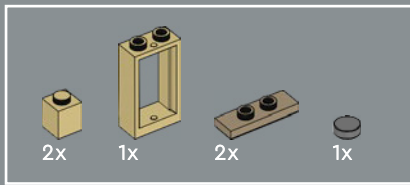
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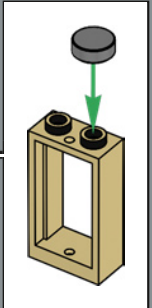
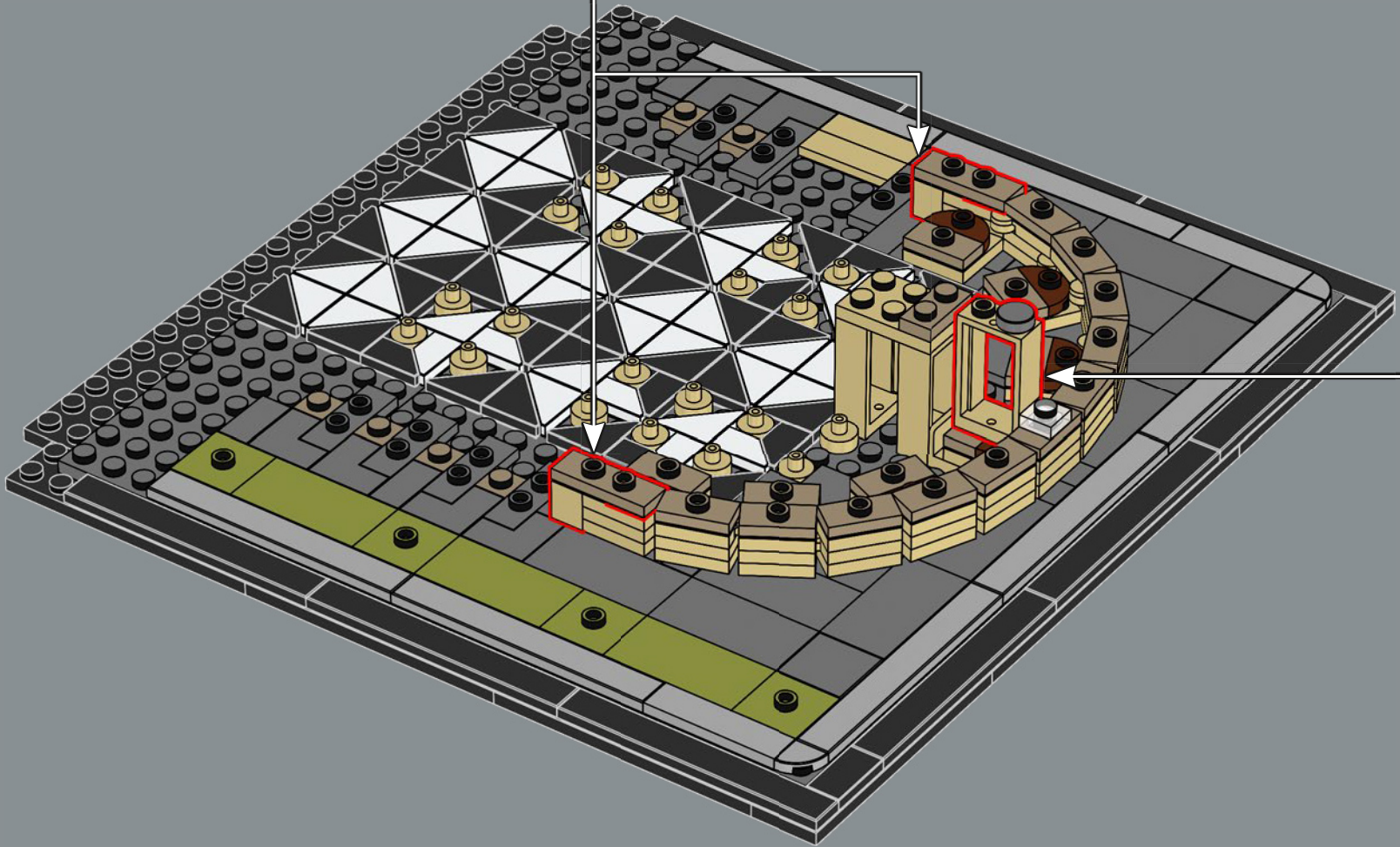
1163 - Elements of the floor plan are determined by a series of circles created with the help of ropes of different lengths attached to a stake at the centre of the cathedral.

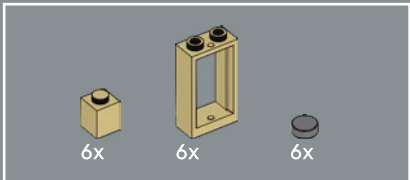
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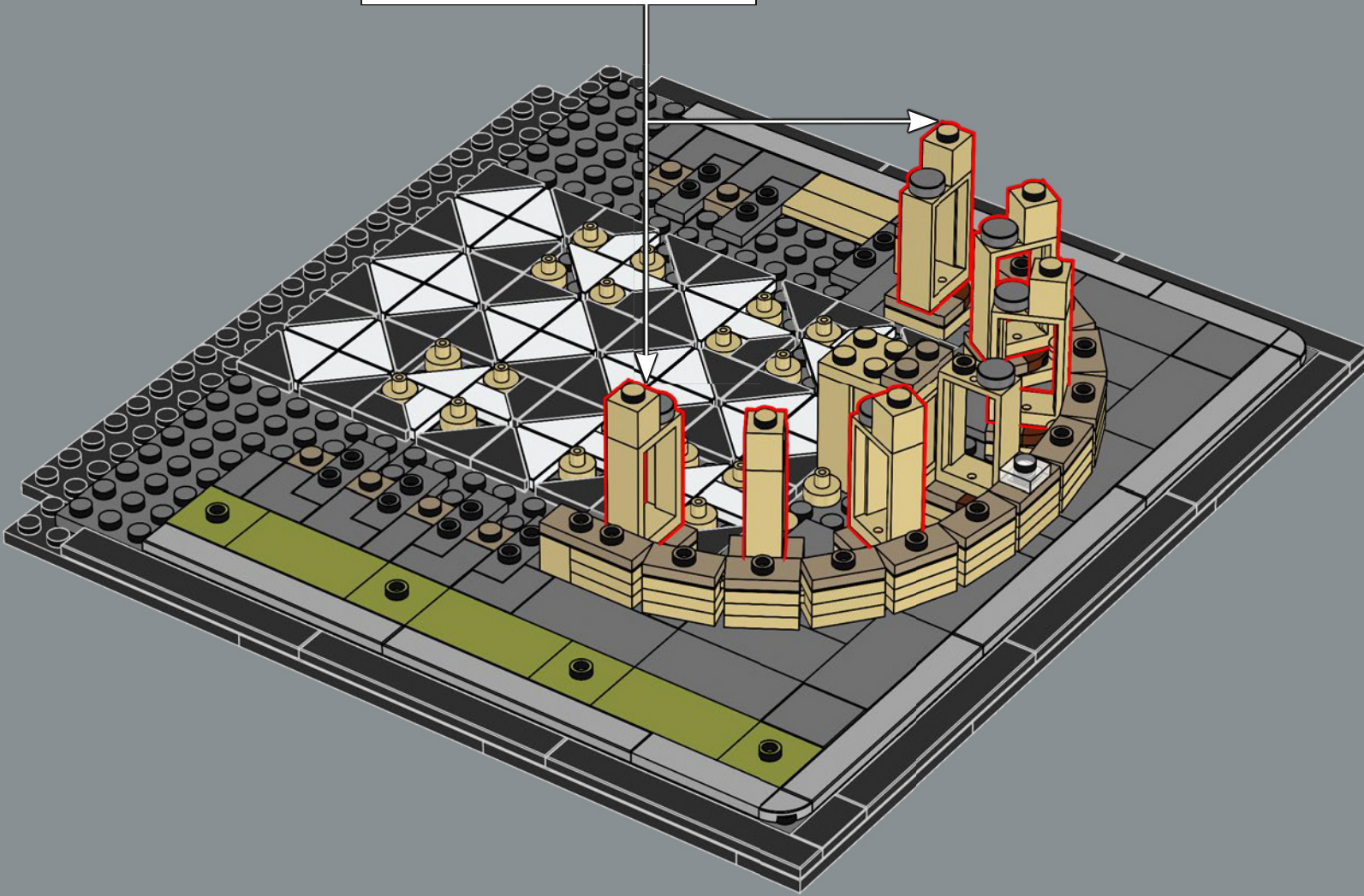
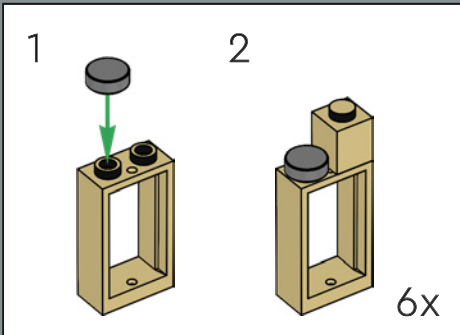


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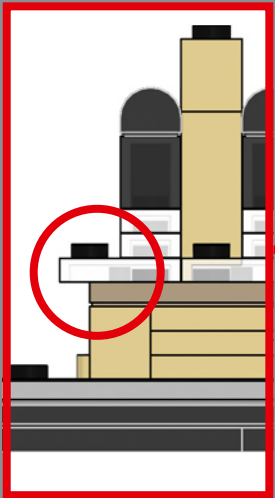
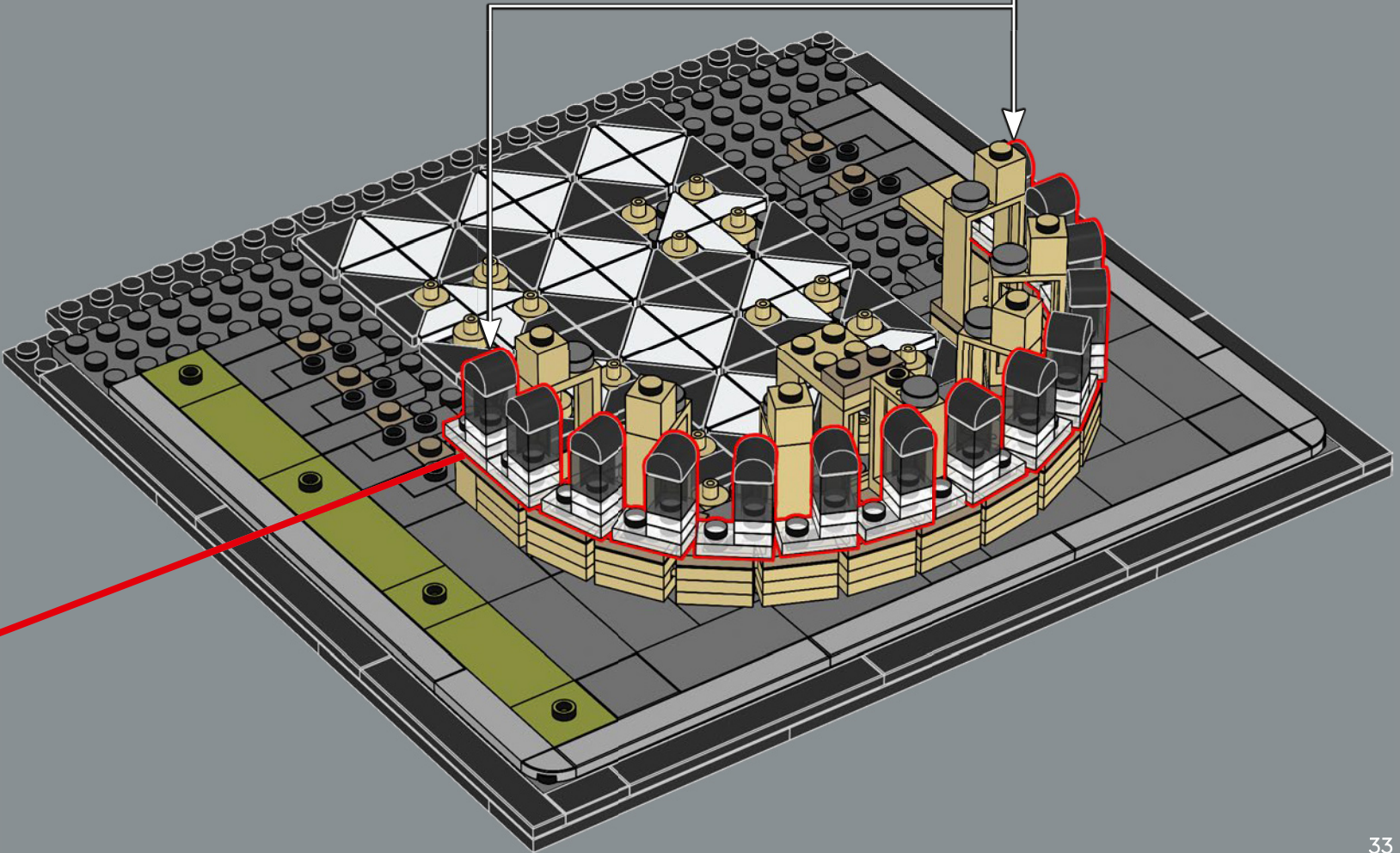
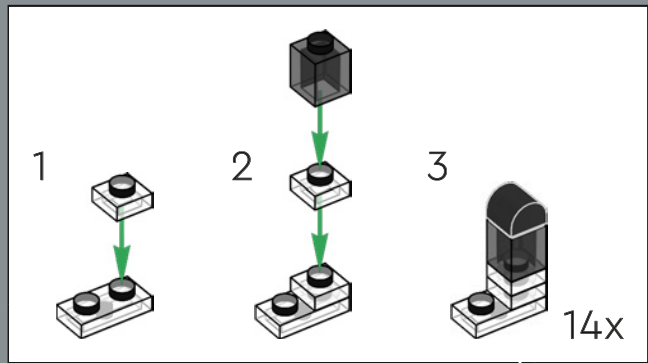


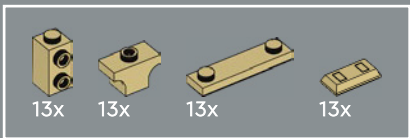
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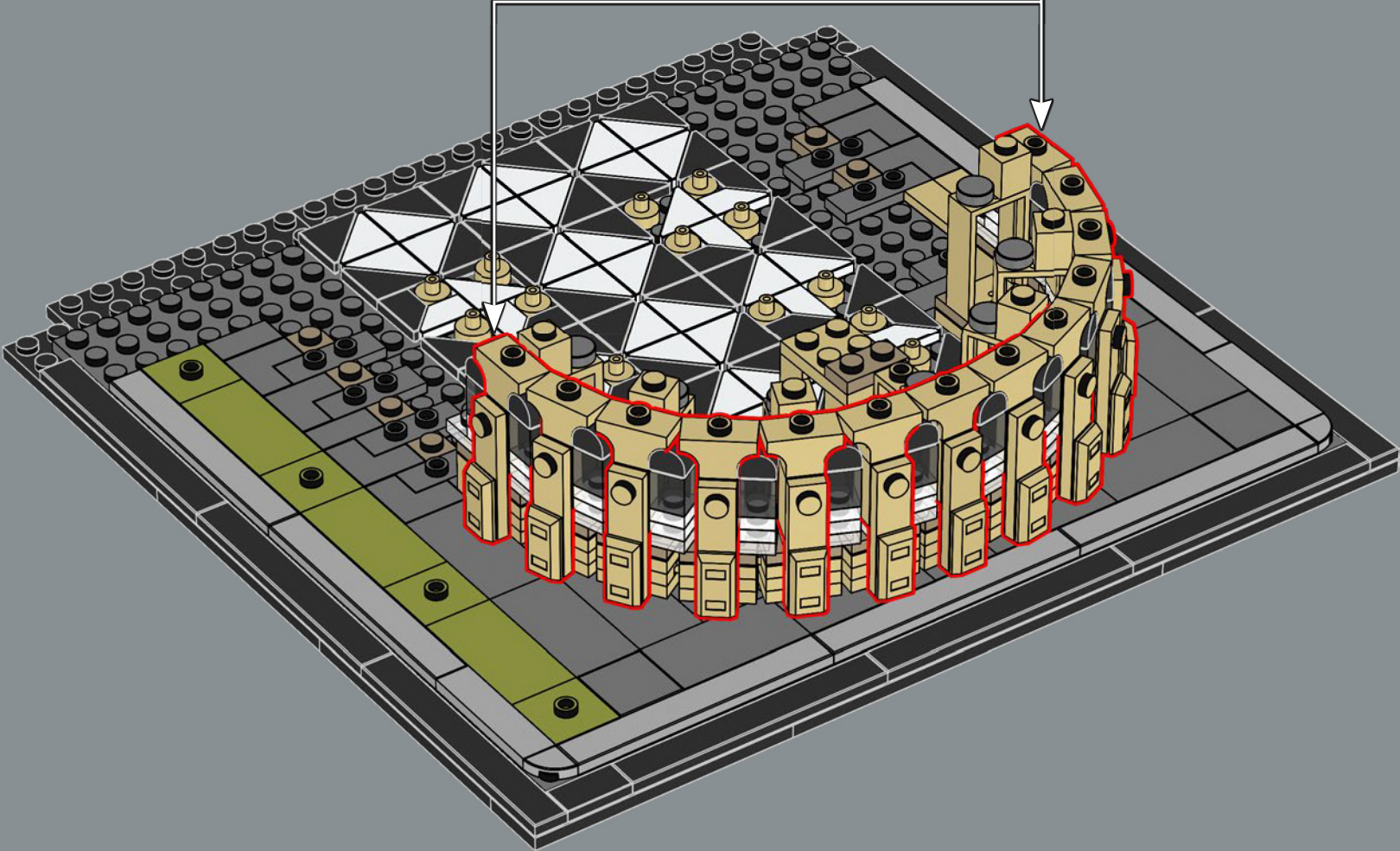
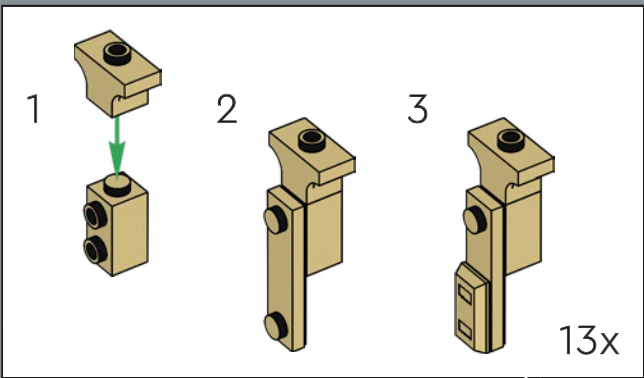


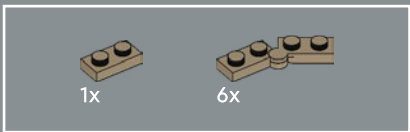
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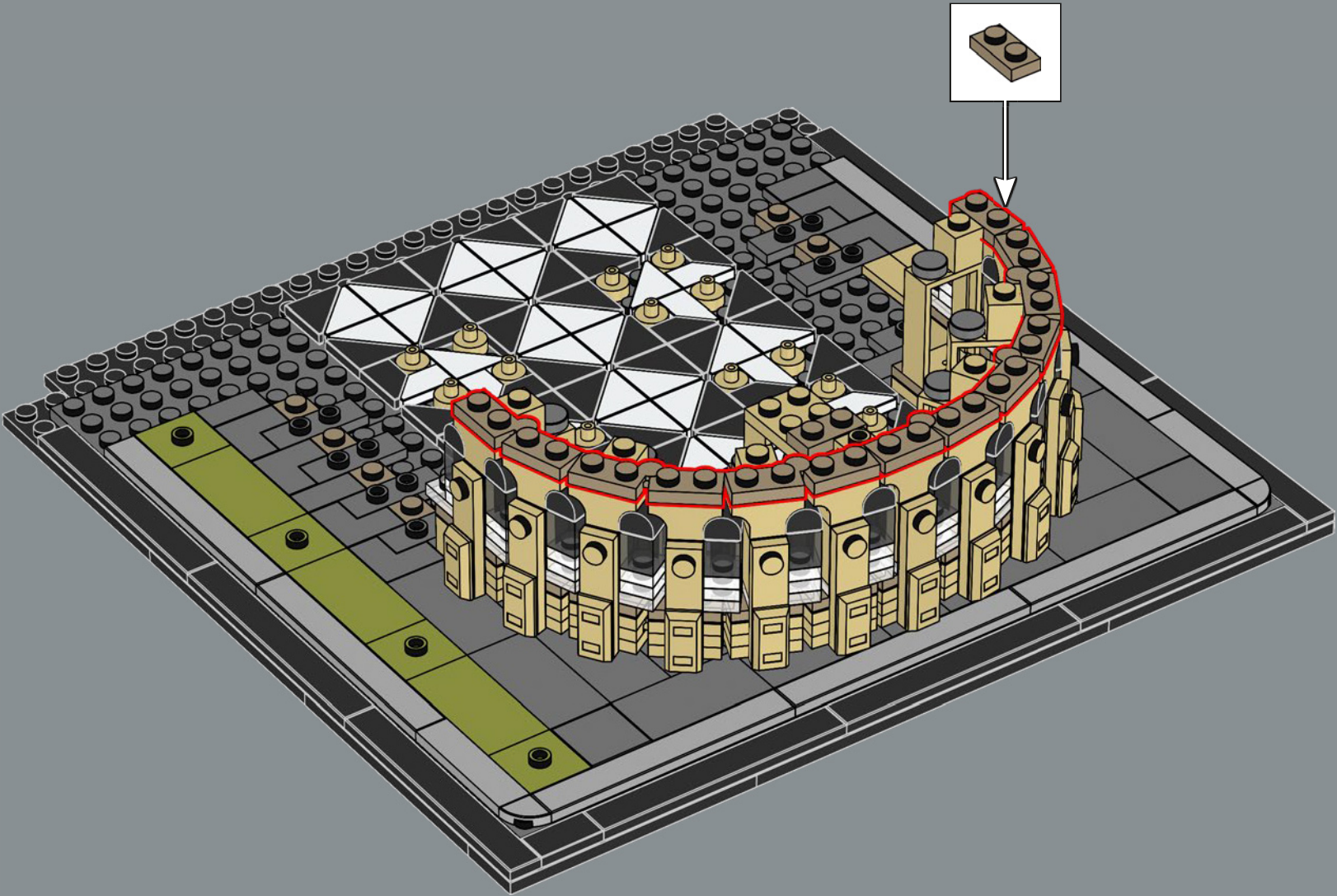


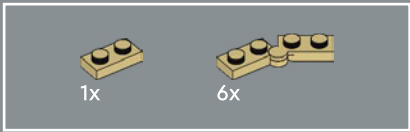
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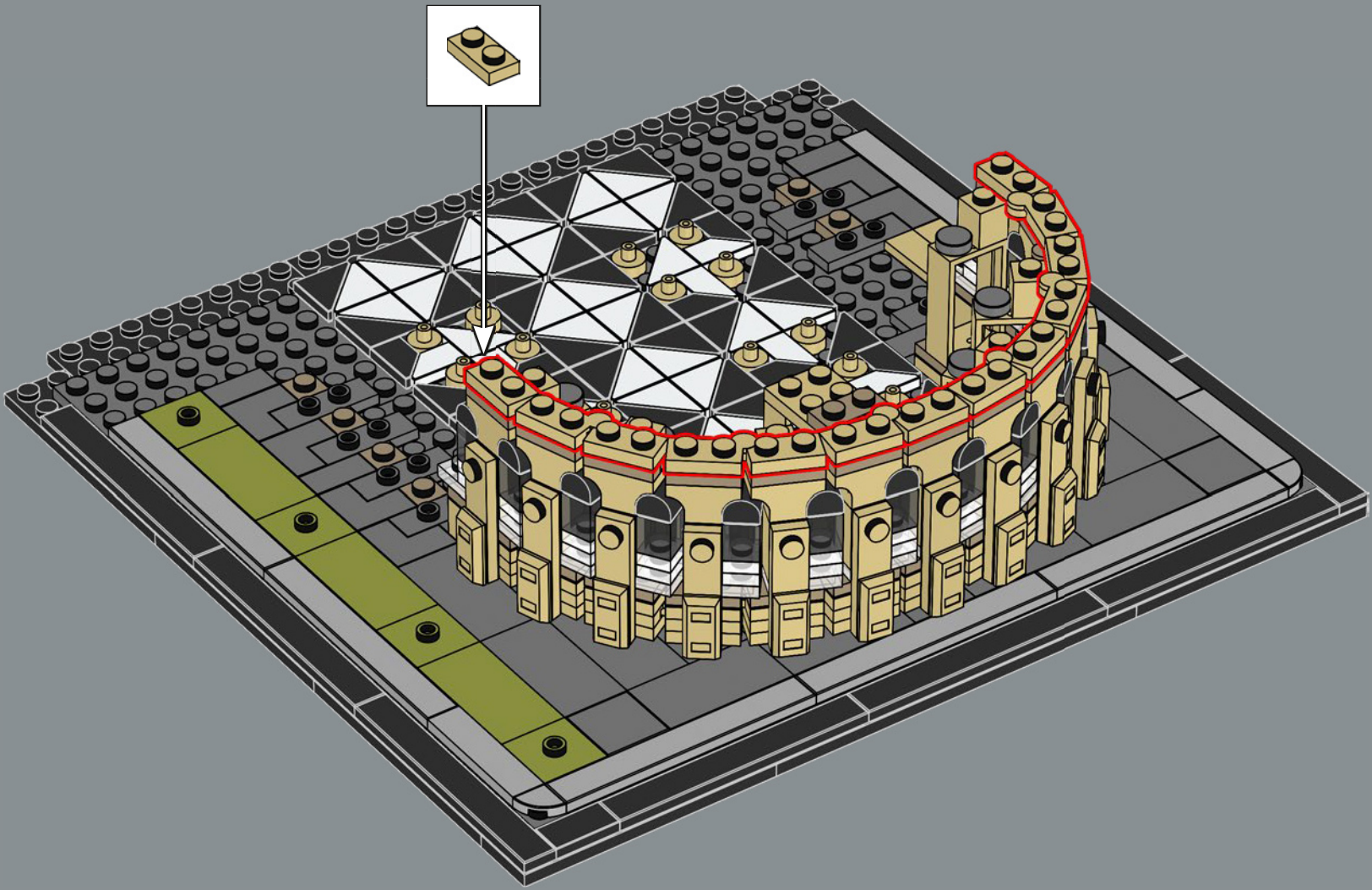


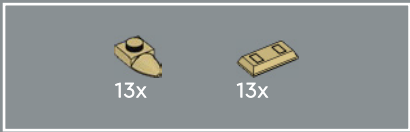
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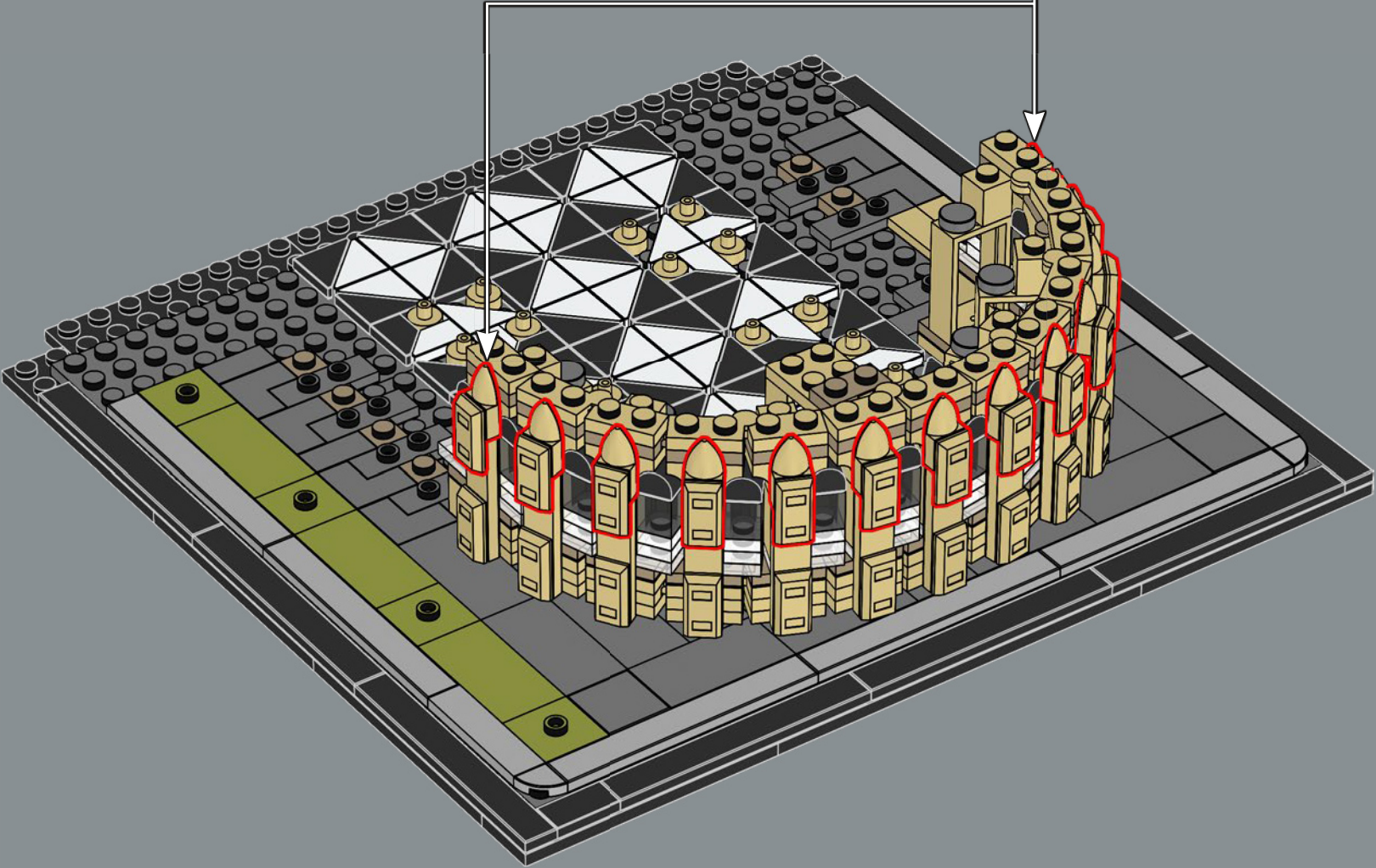
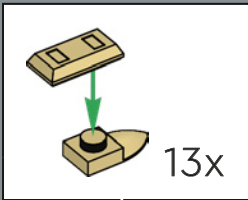


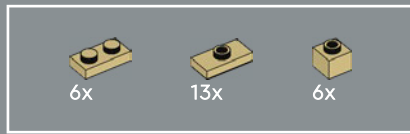
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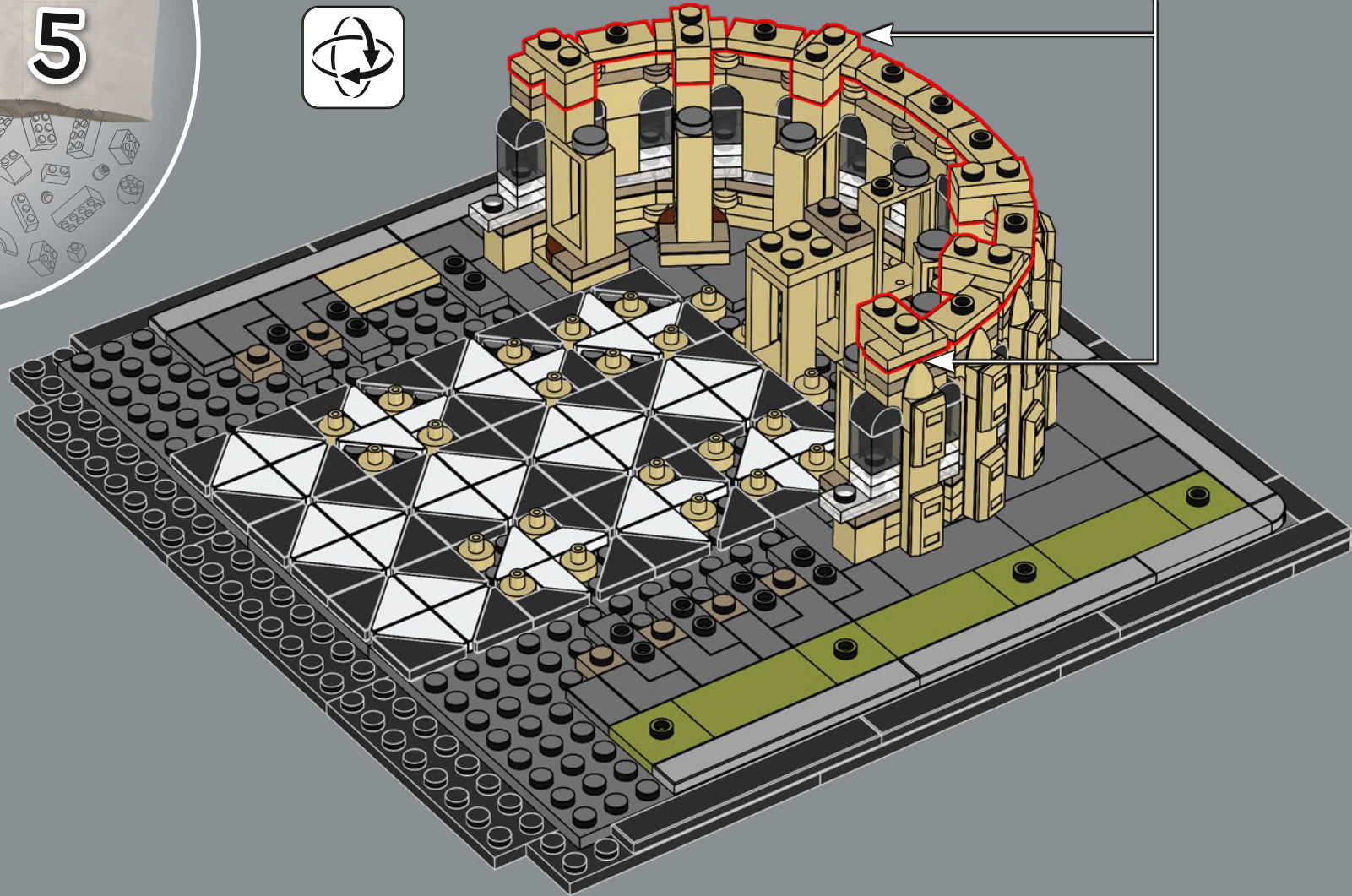
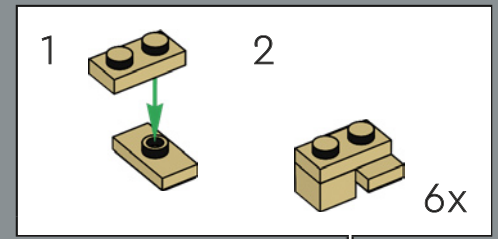


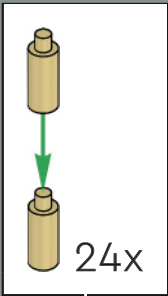
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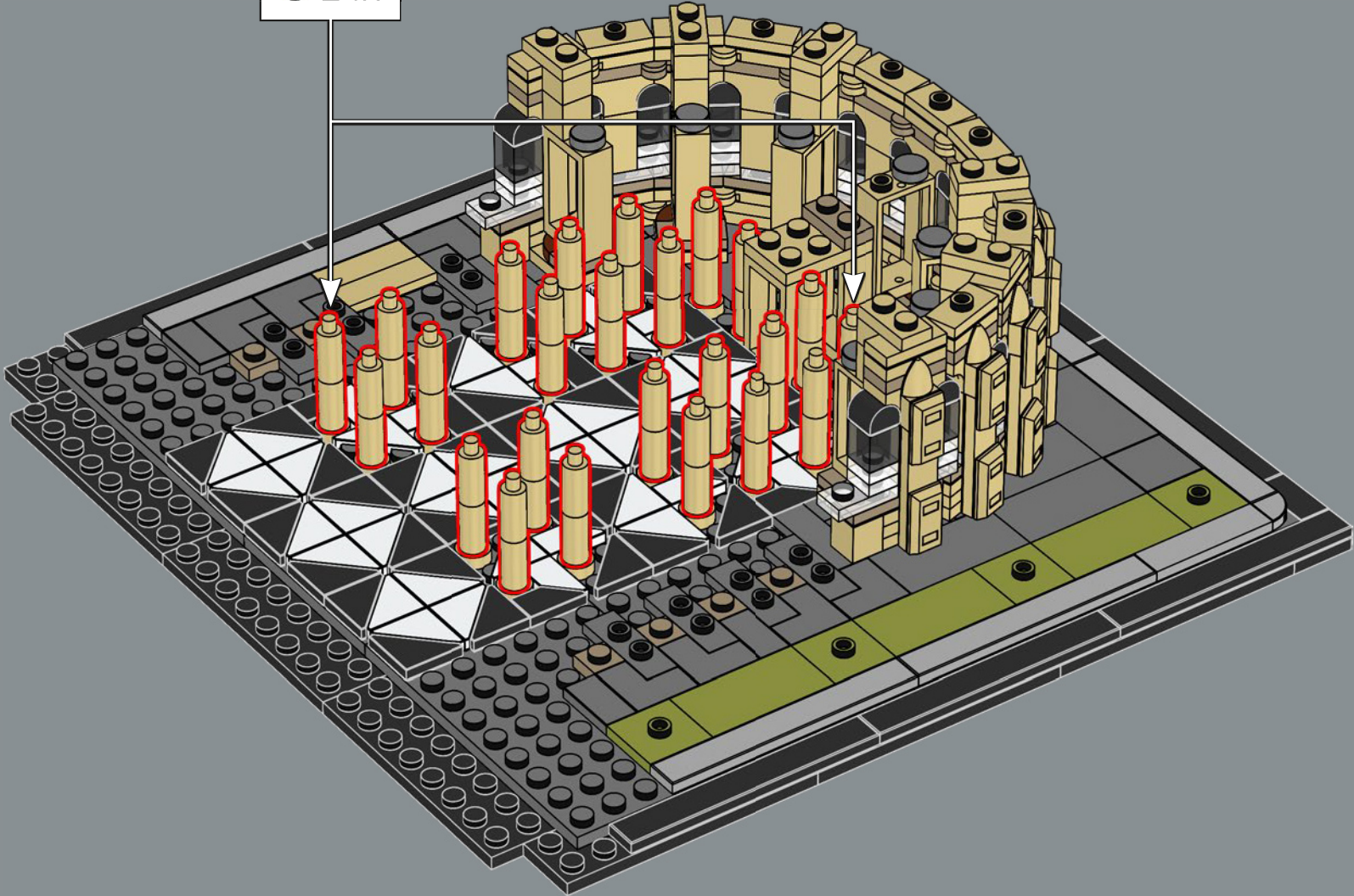


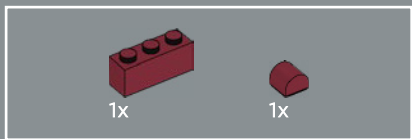
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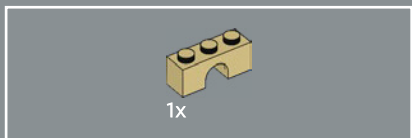
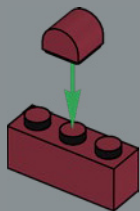


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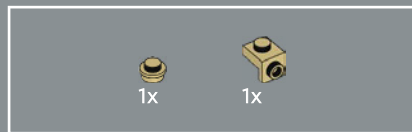
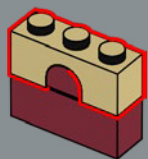




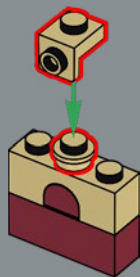
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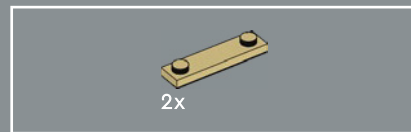
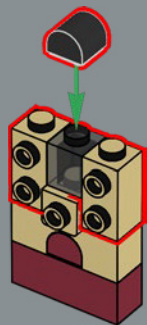
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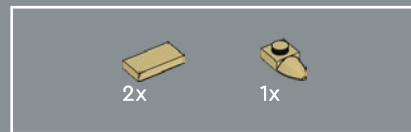
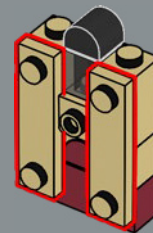
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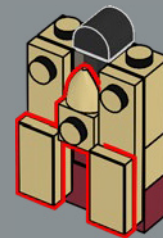

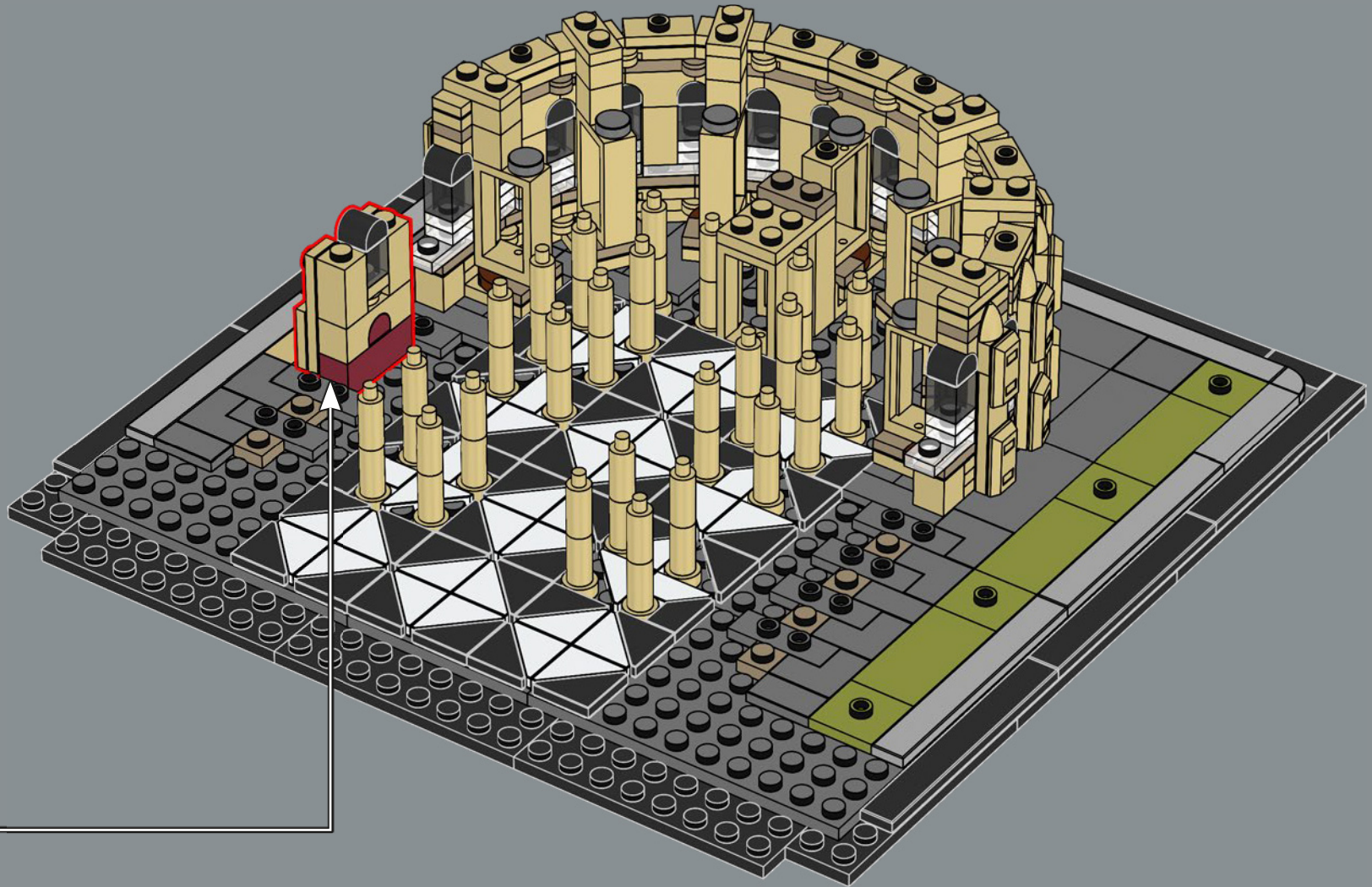


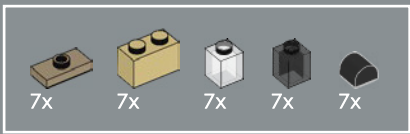
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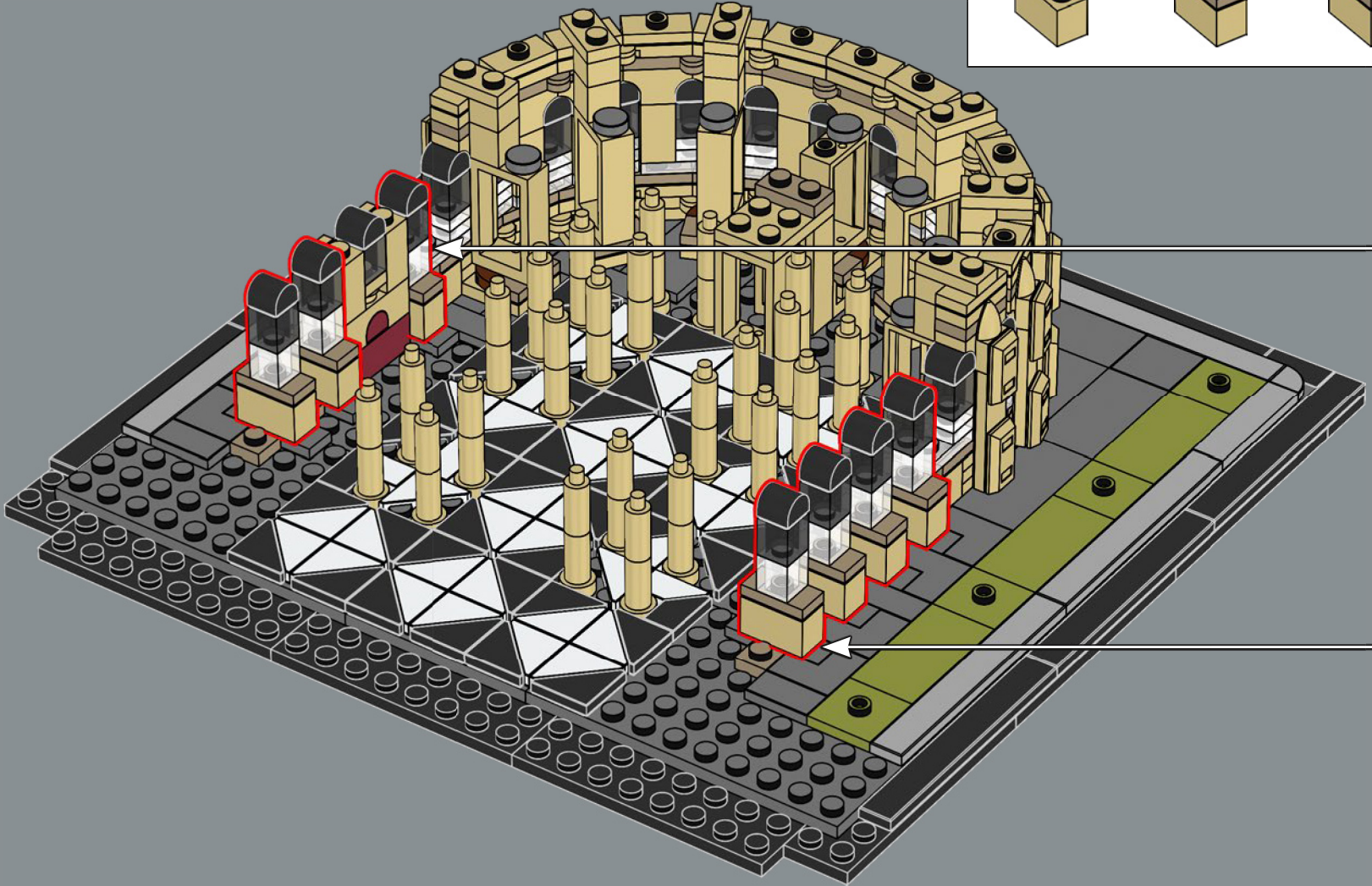
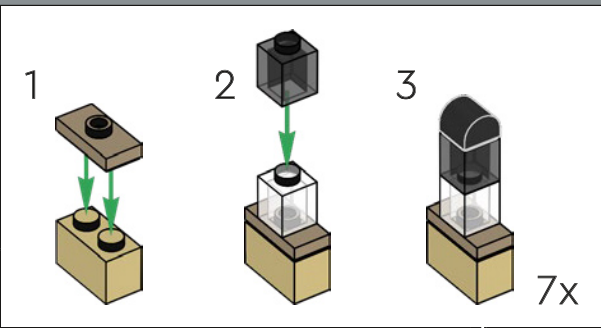
An elegant portal that offers direct access to the choir takes its name from the colour of the portal's door panes – The Porte Rouge. It was renovated around 1270.

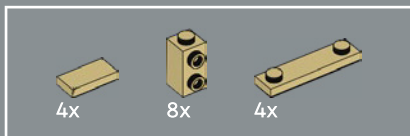
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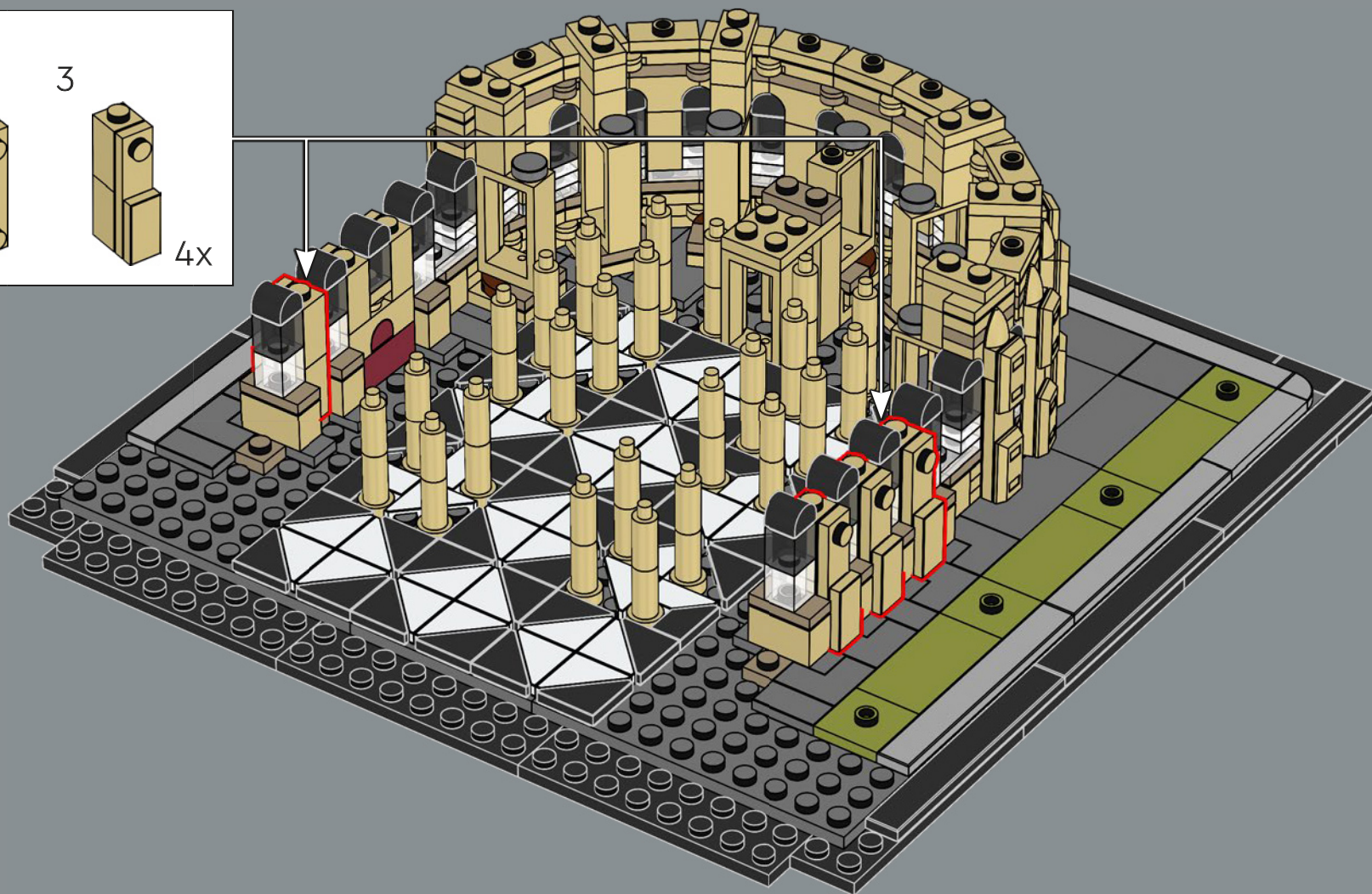
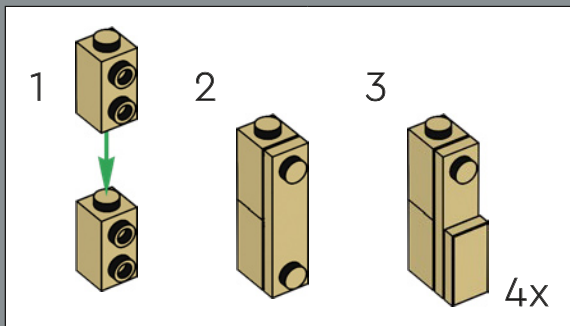


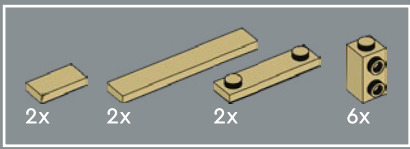
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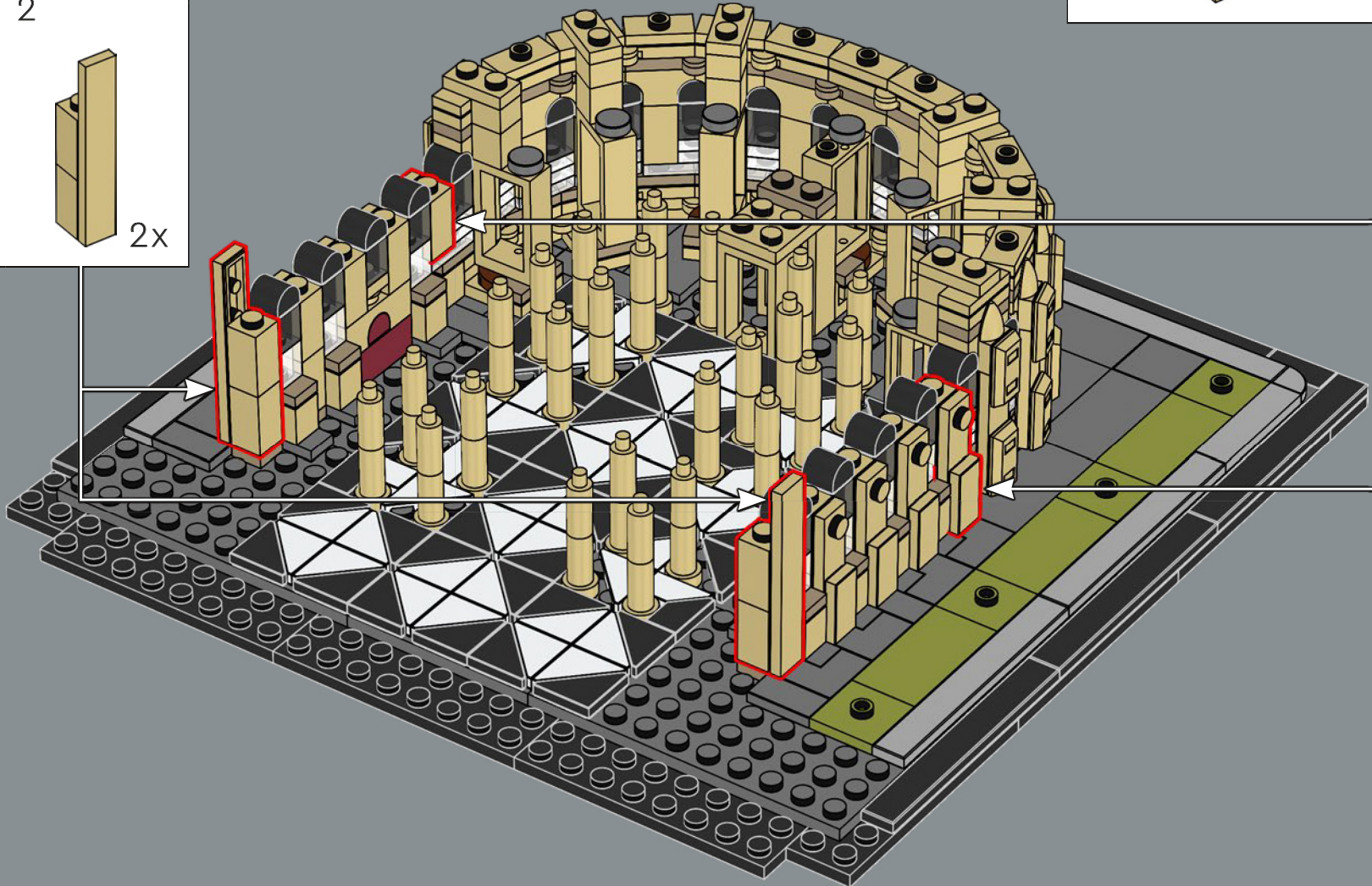
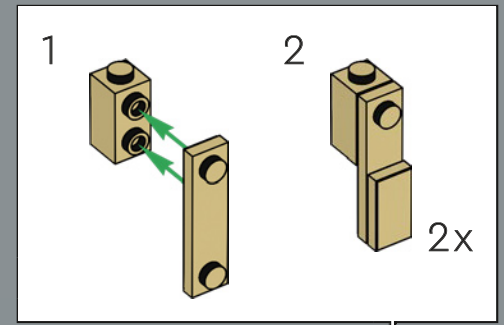
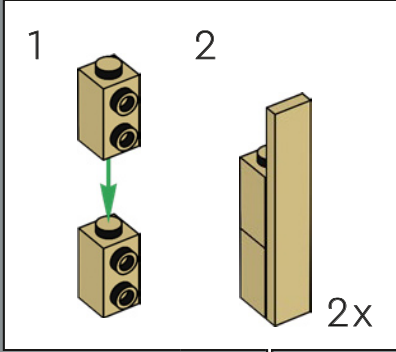


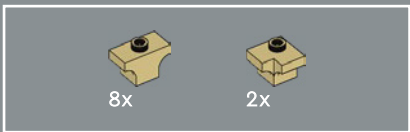
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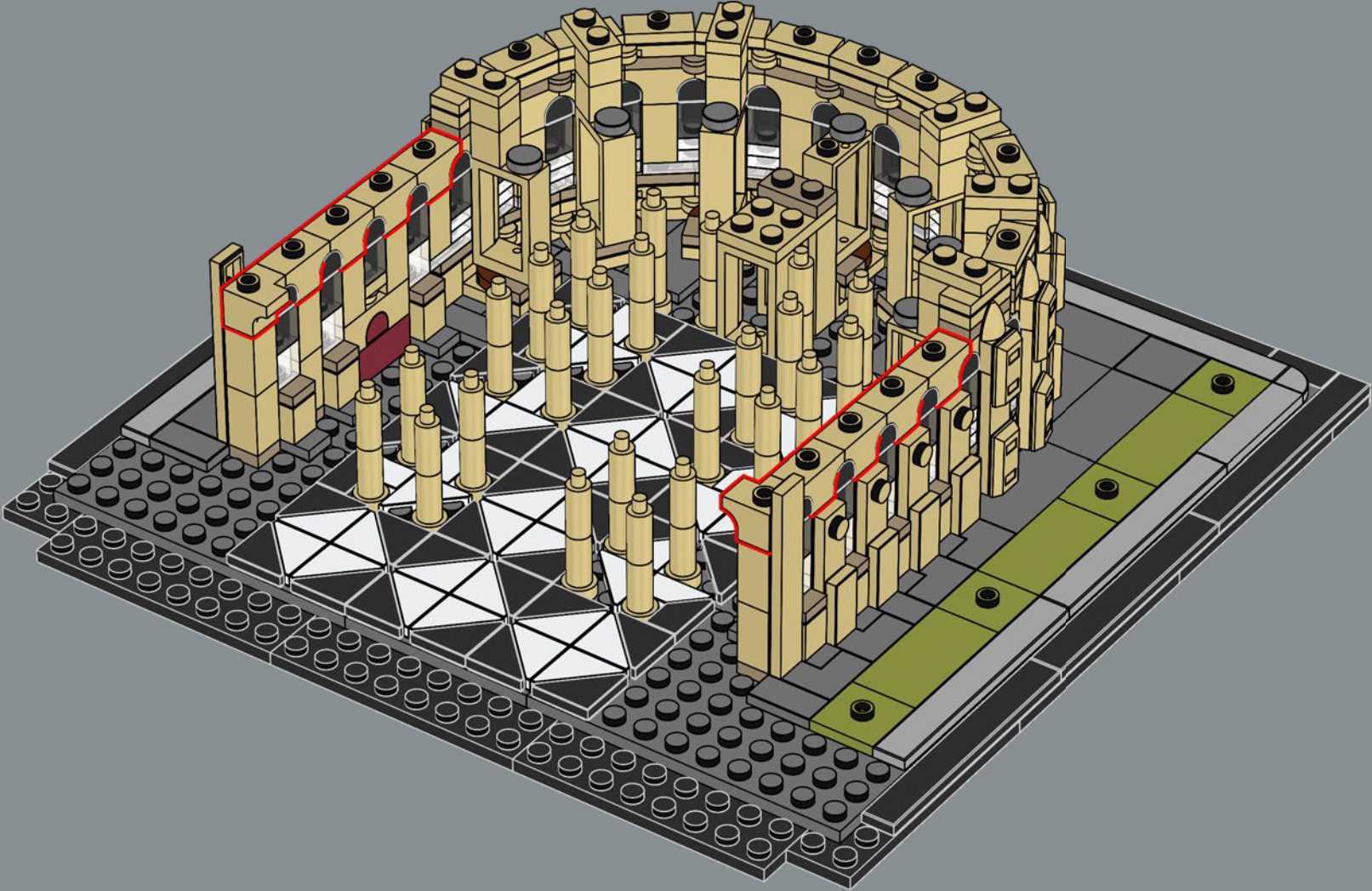


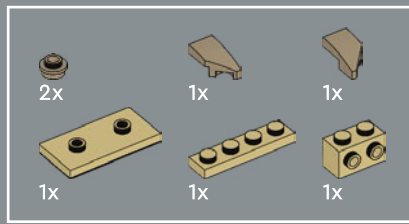
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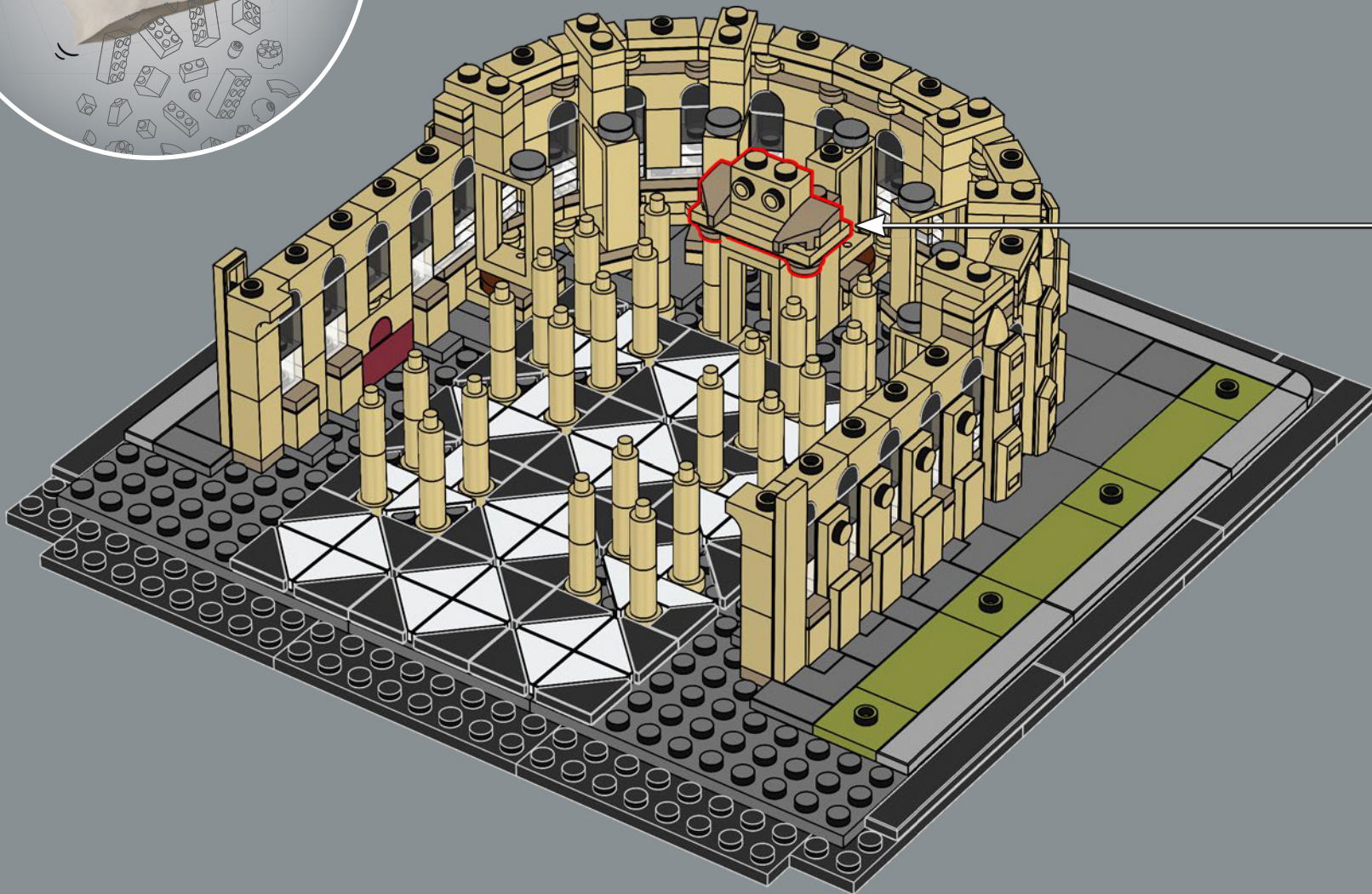
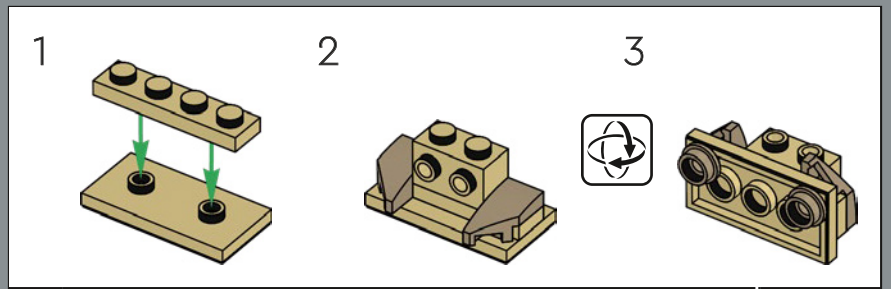


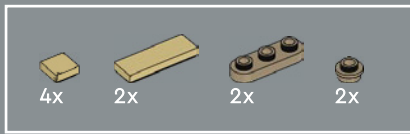
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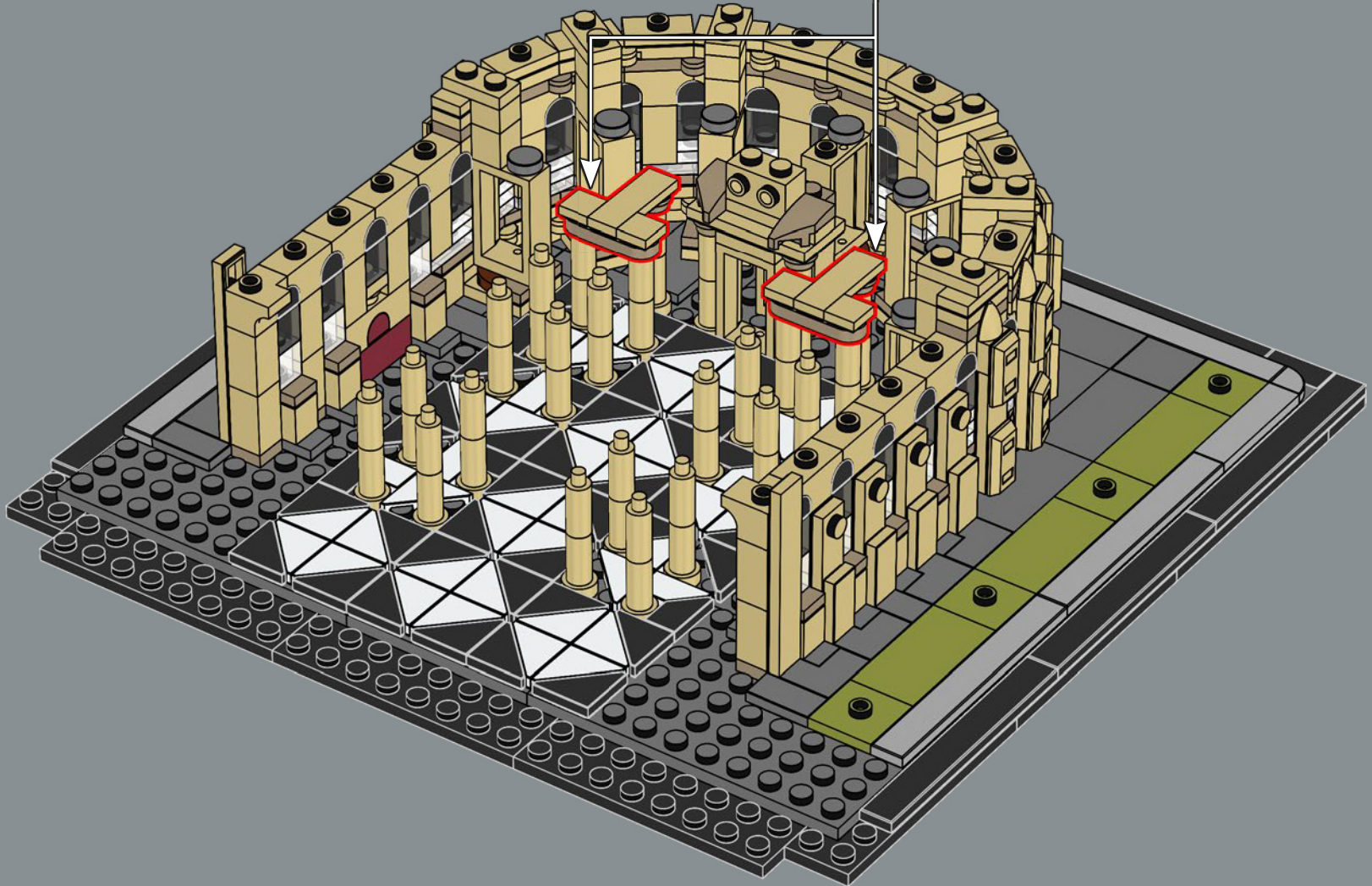
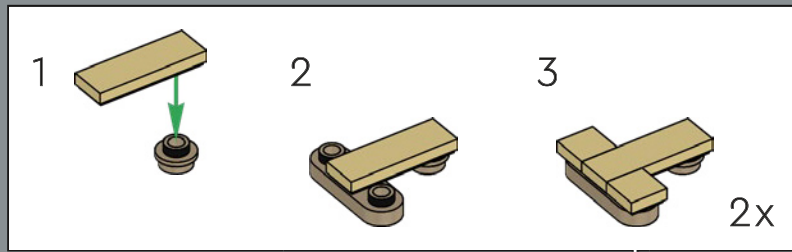


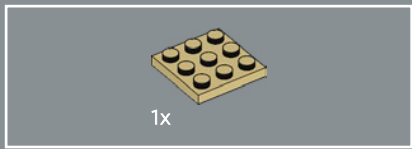
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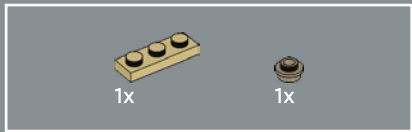


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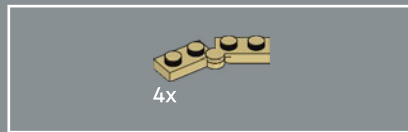
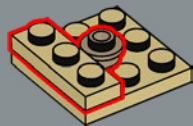




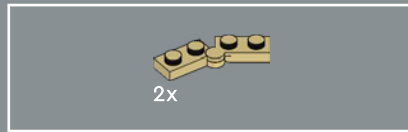
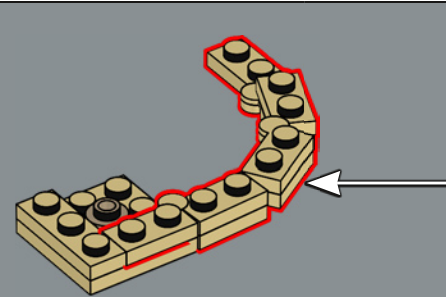
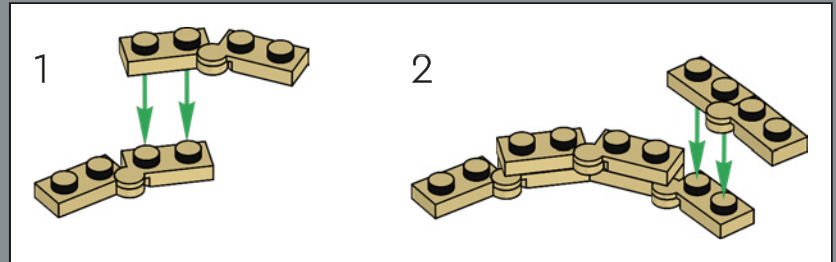
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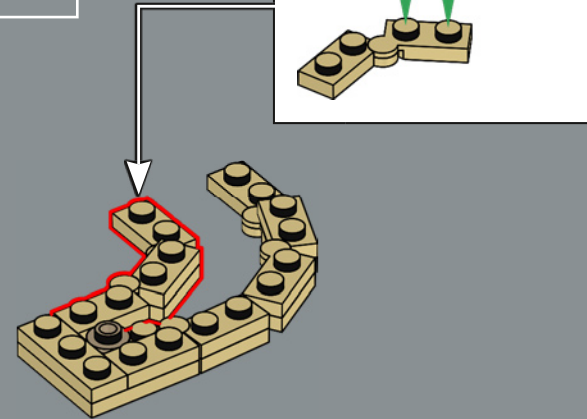
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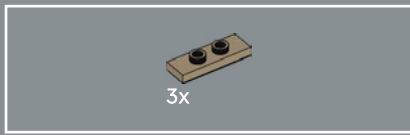


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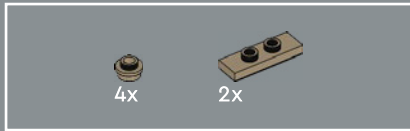
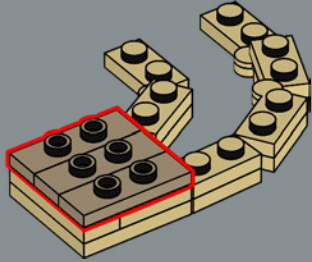


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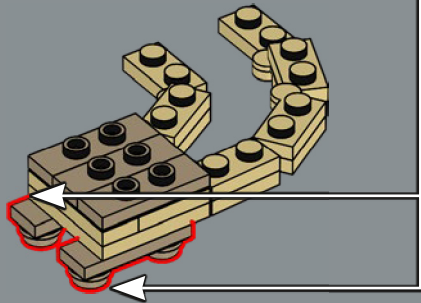
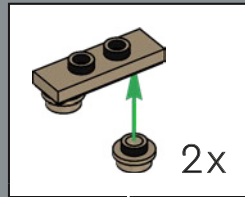




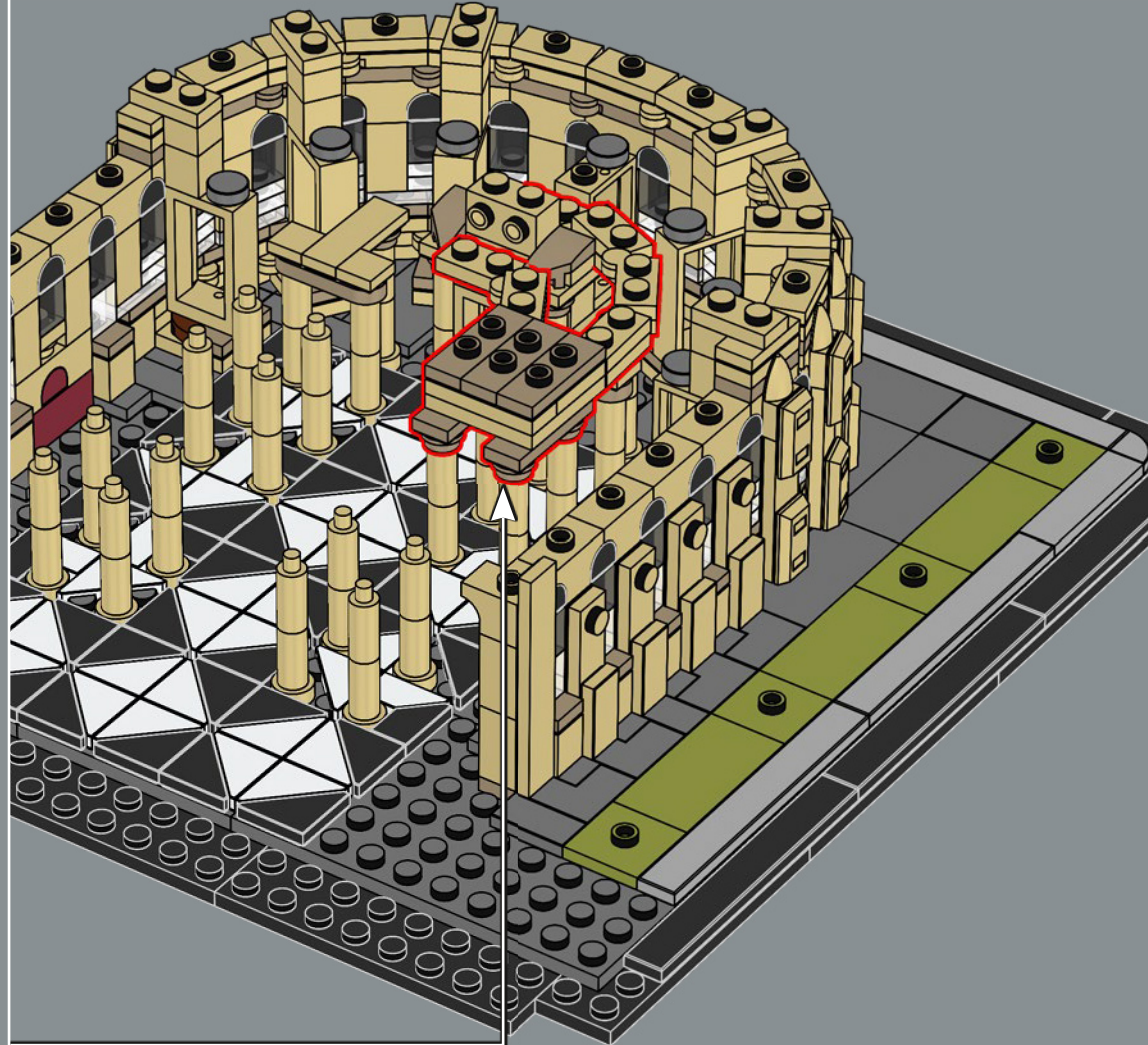
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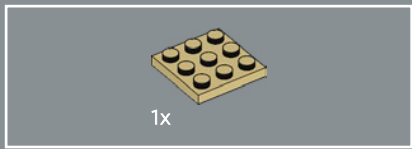


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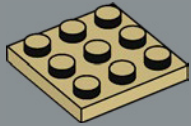


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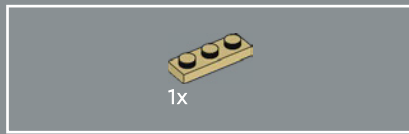
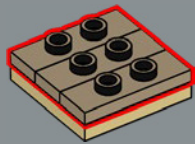




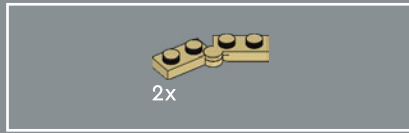
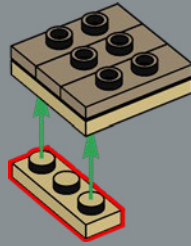
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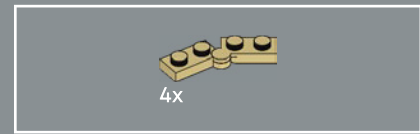
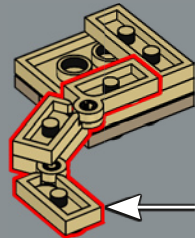
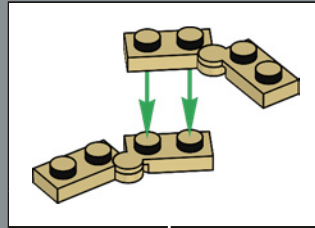
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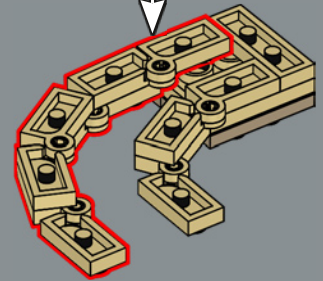
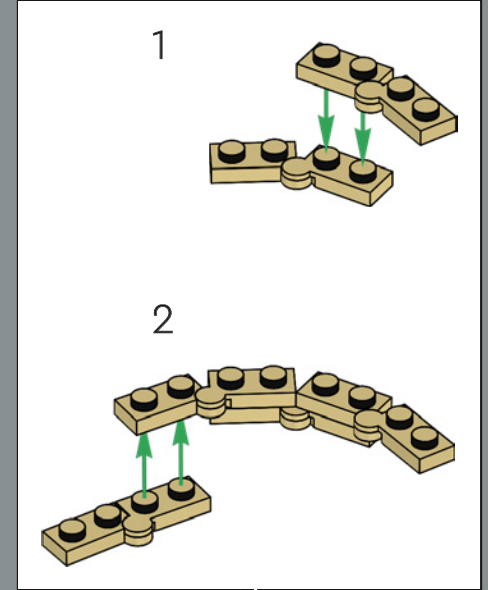
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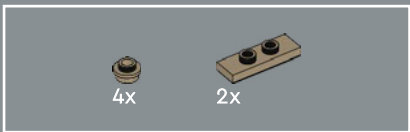


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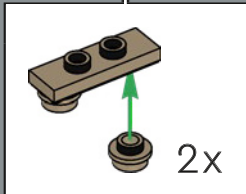
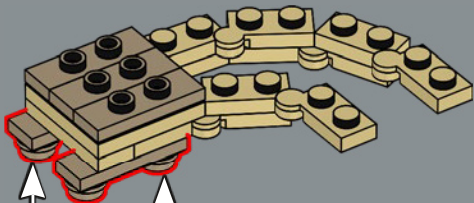


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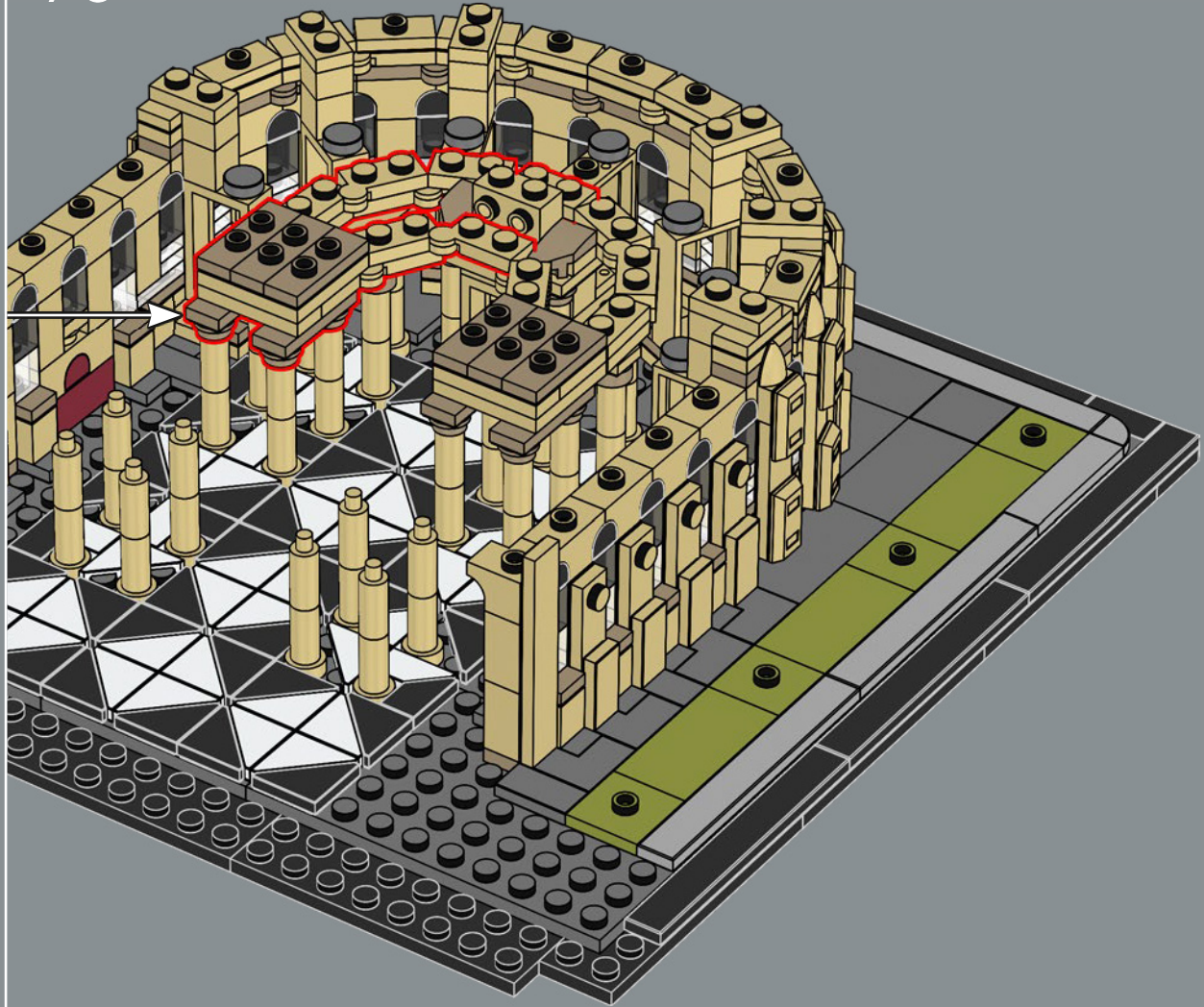


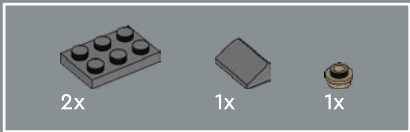


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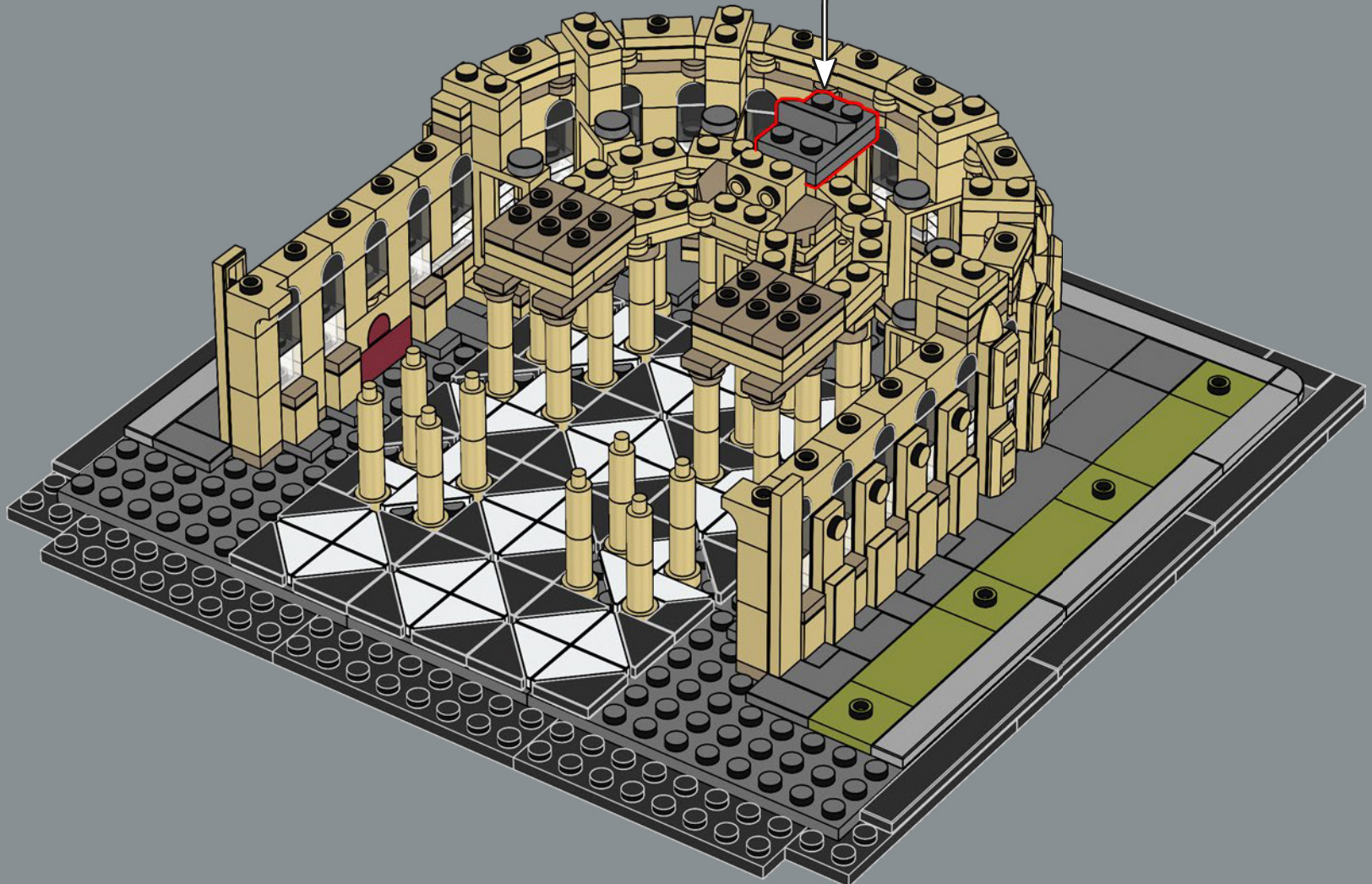
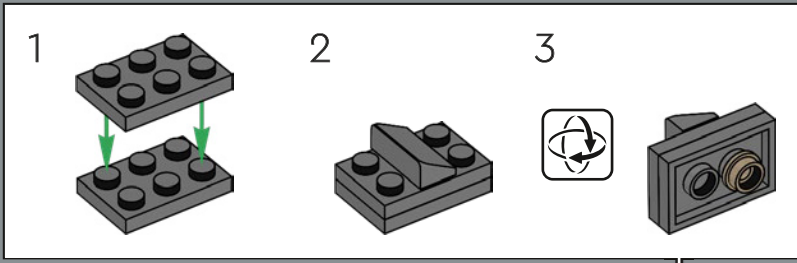


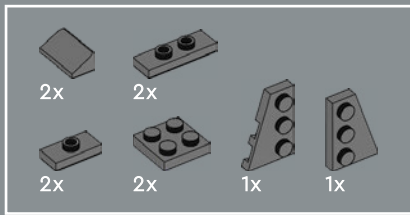
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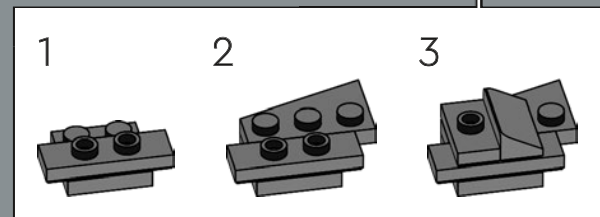
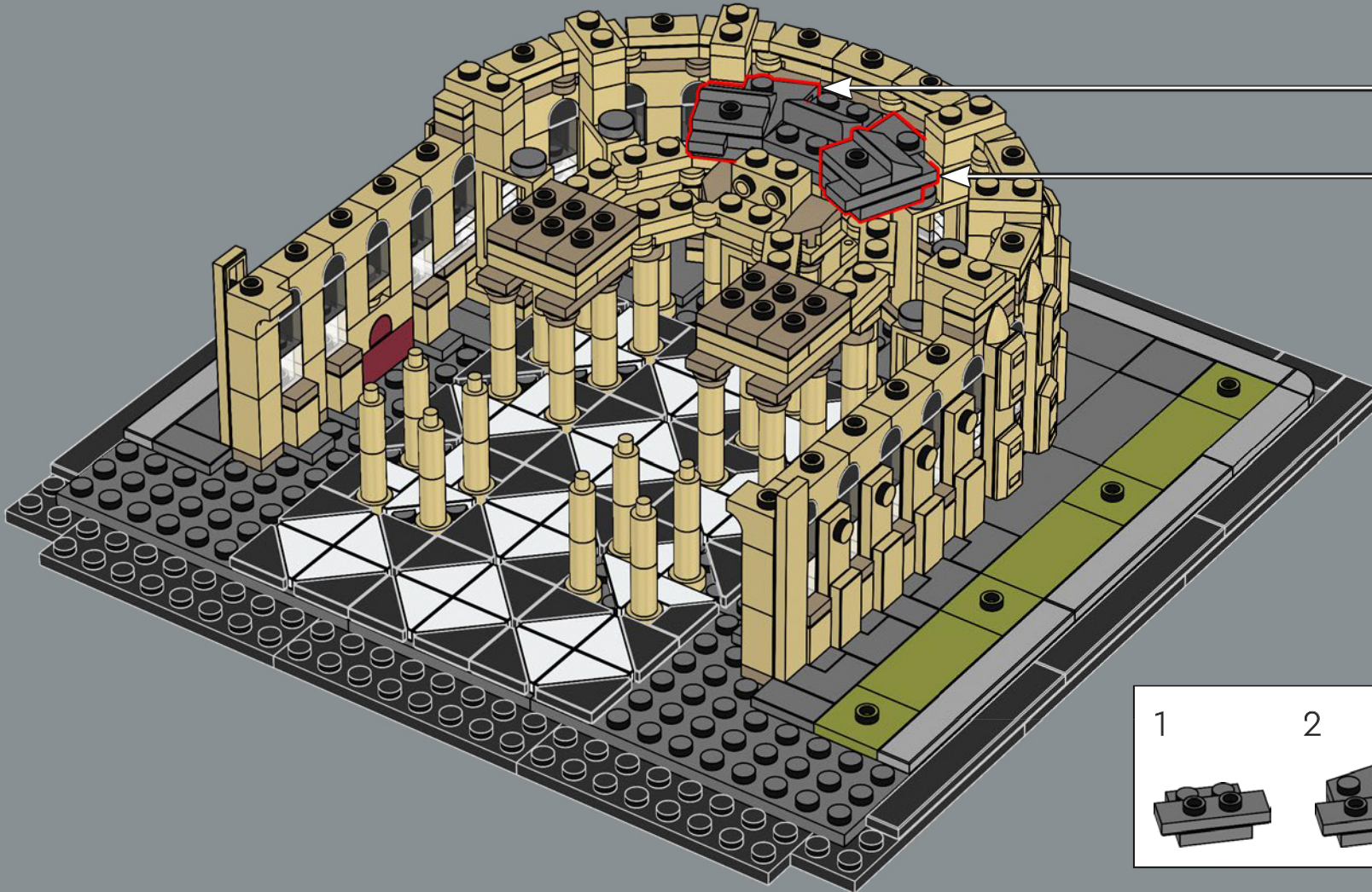
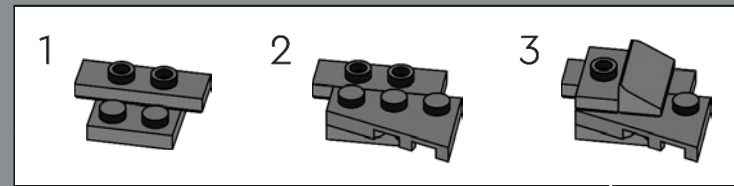


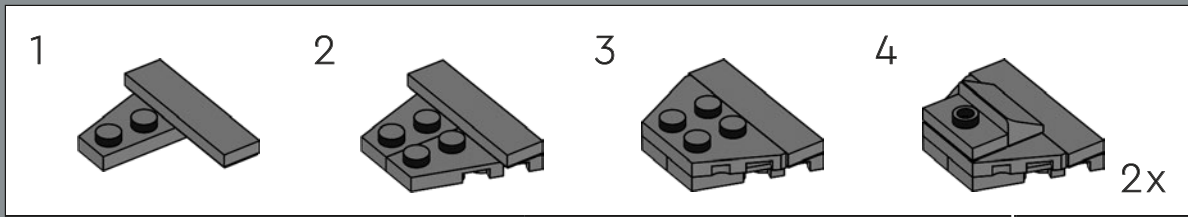
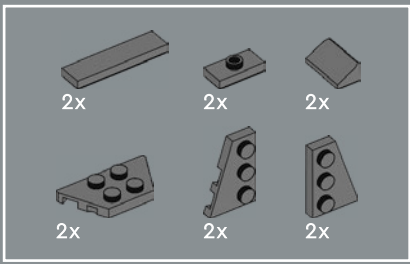
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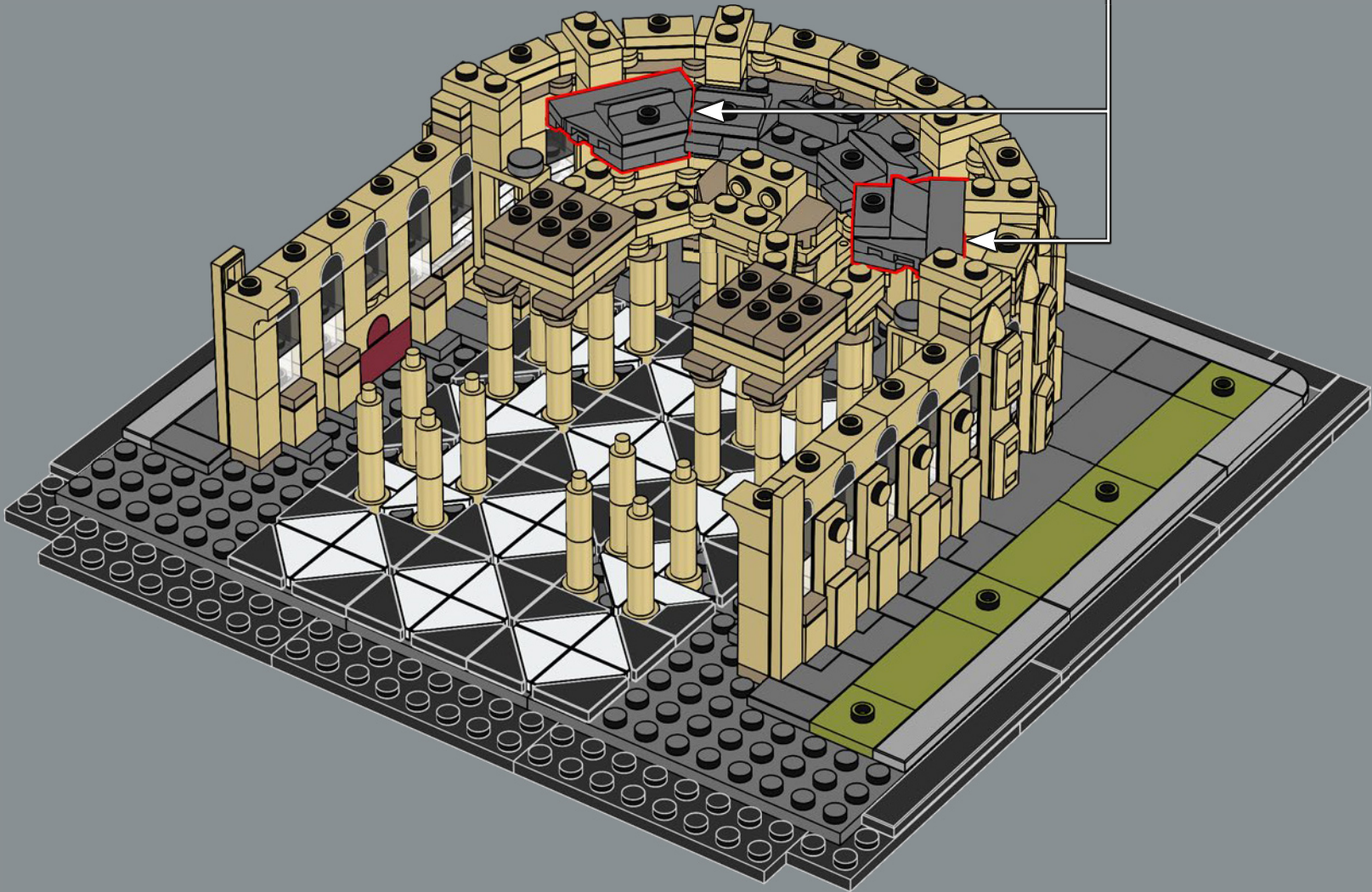


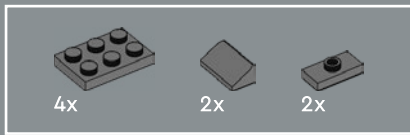
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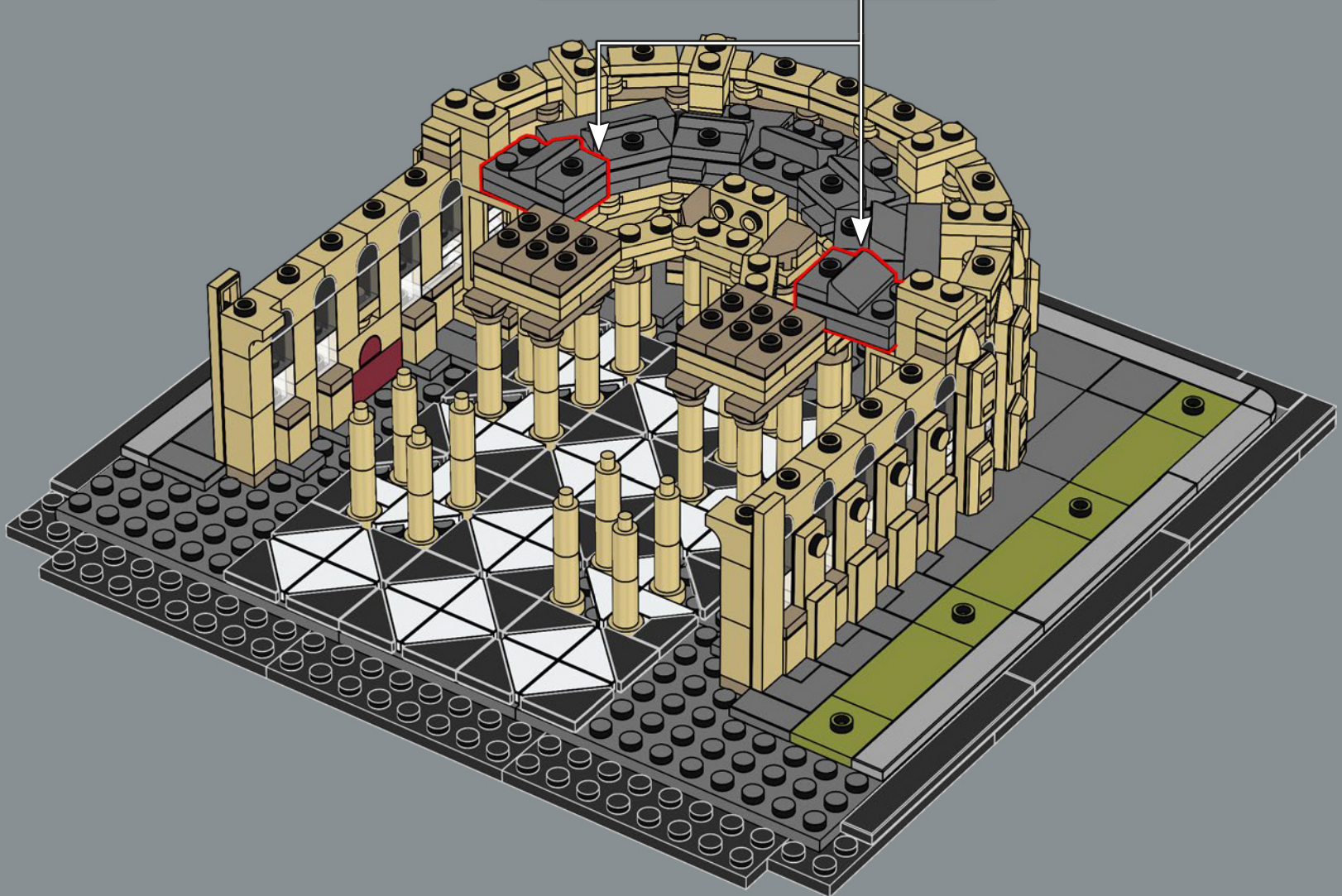
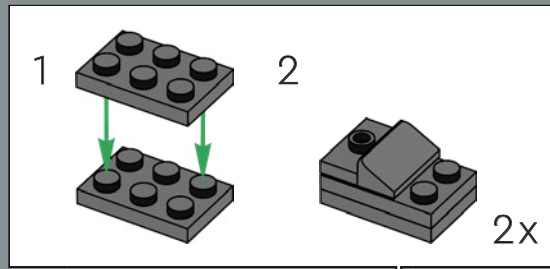


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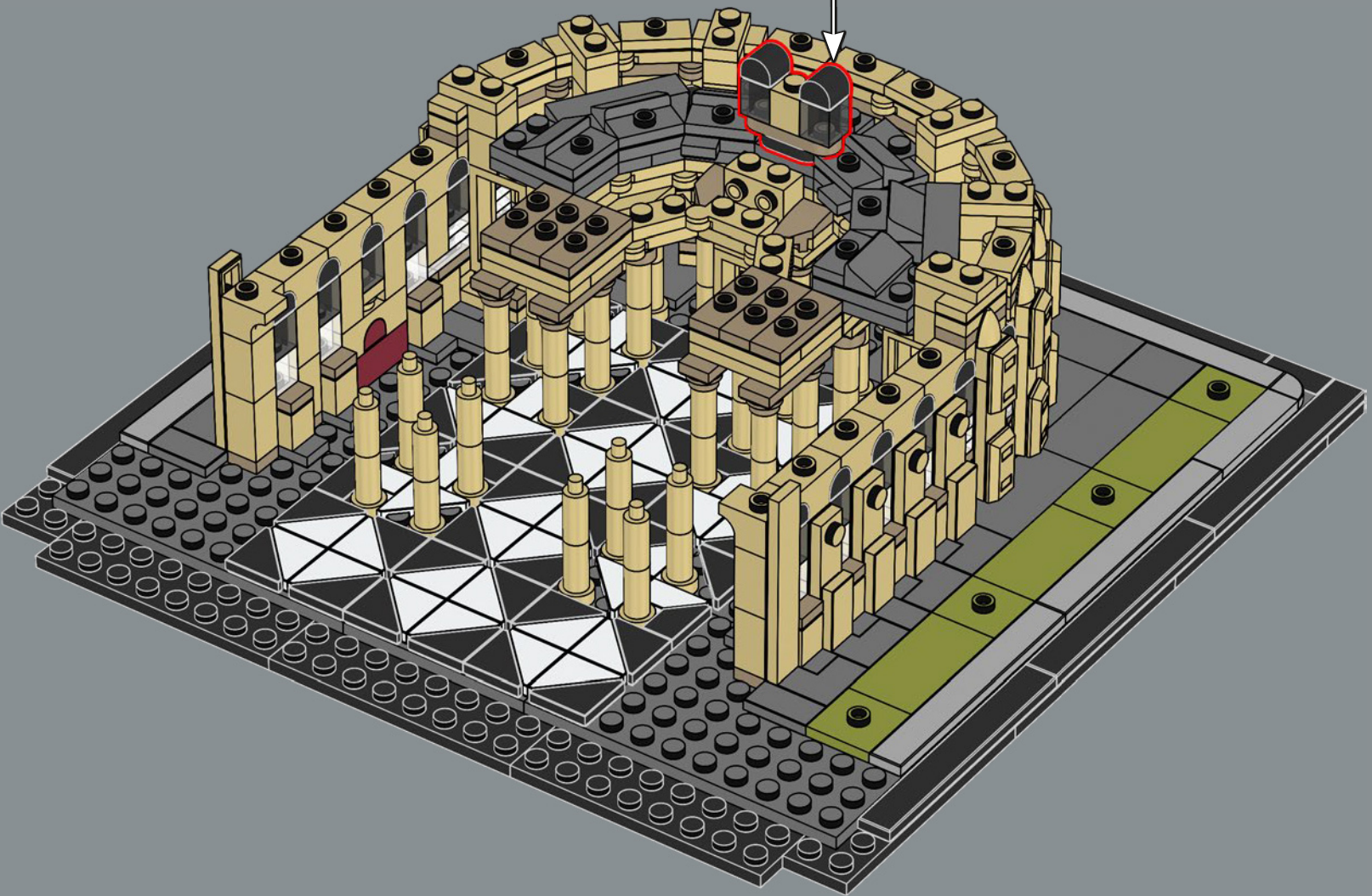
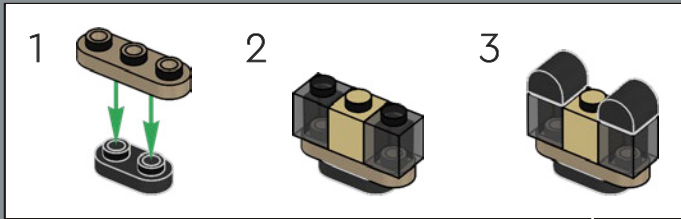

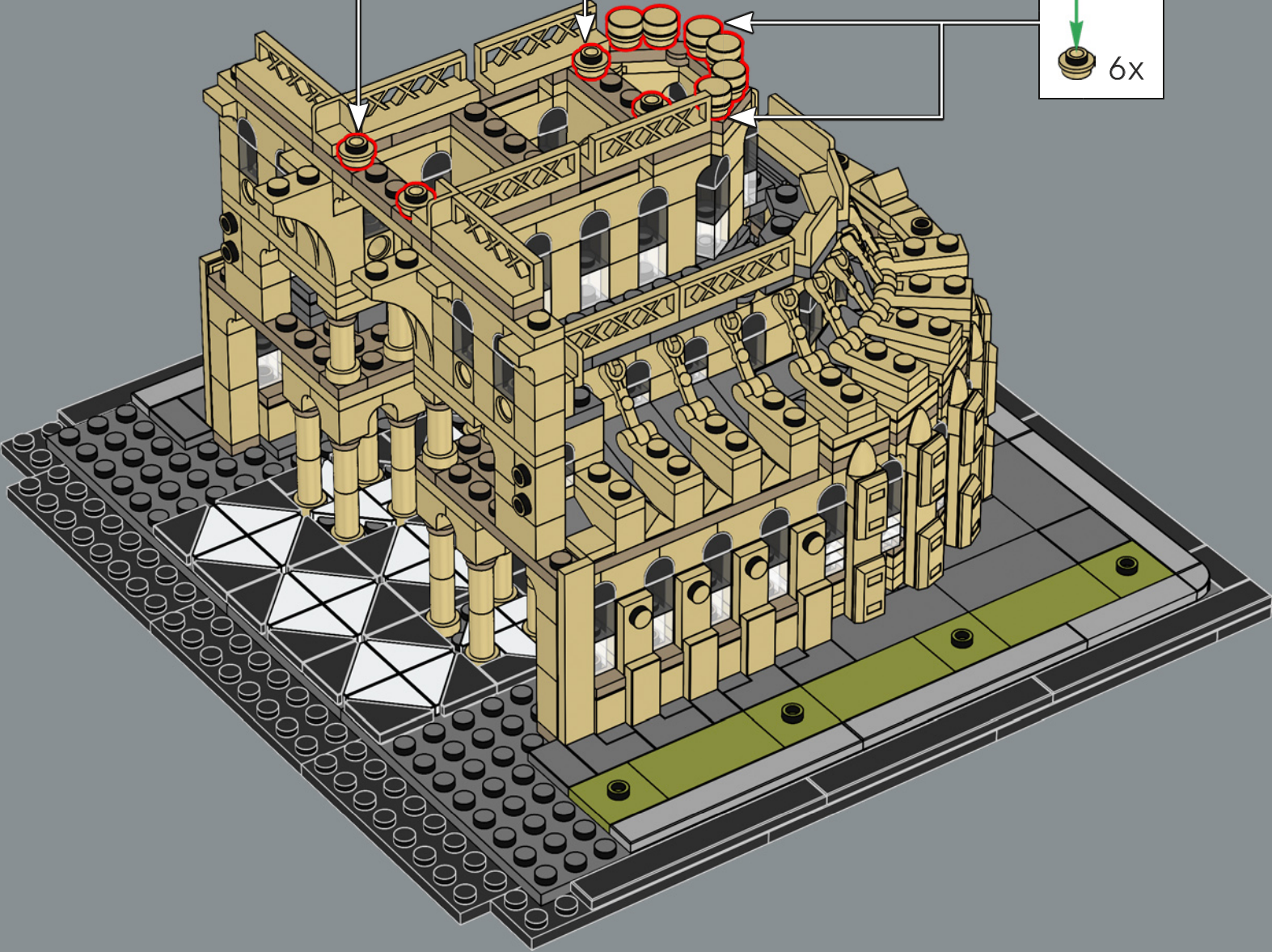


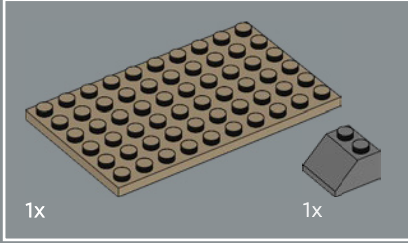
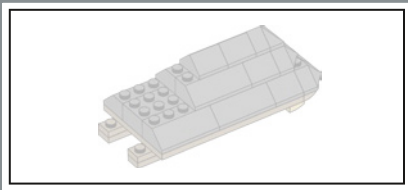
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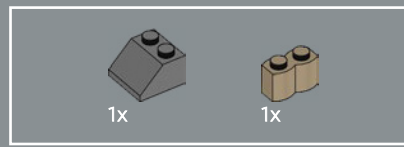
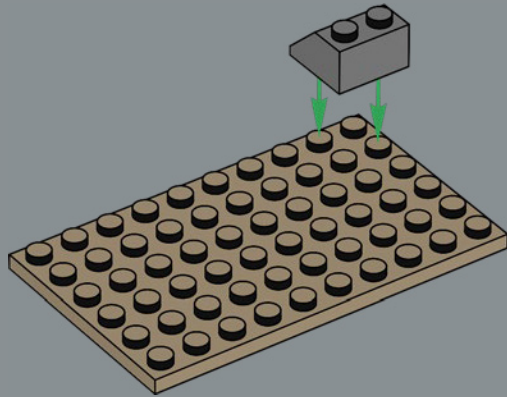
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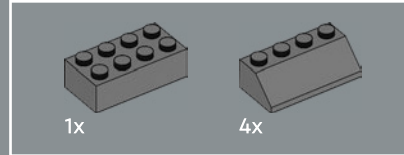
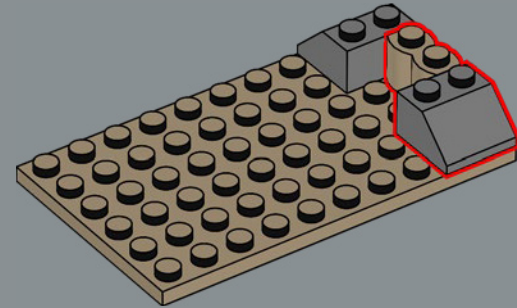




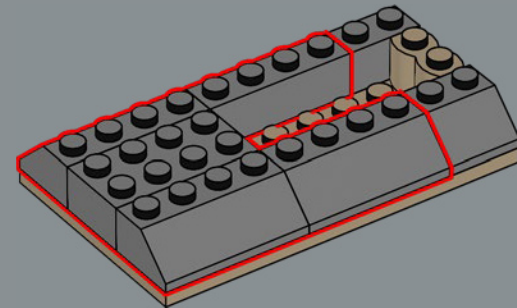
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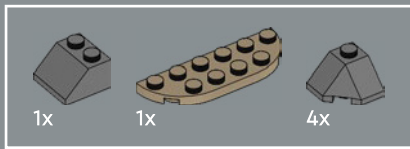


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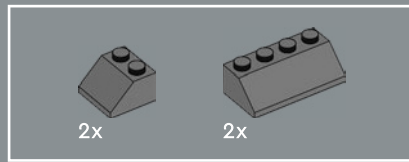
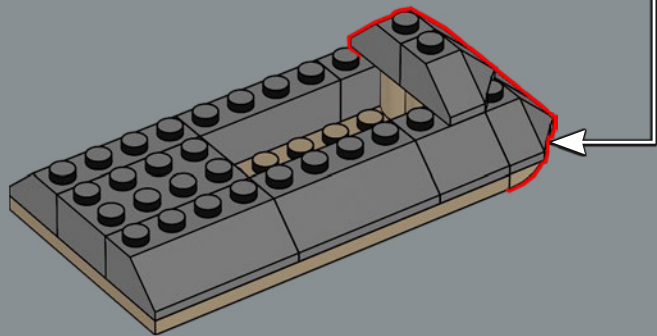


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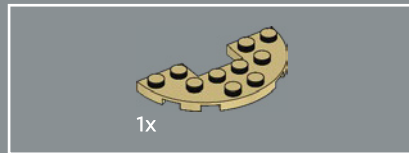
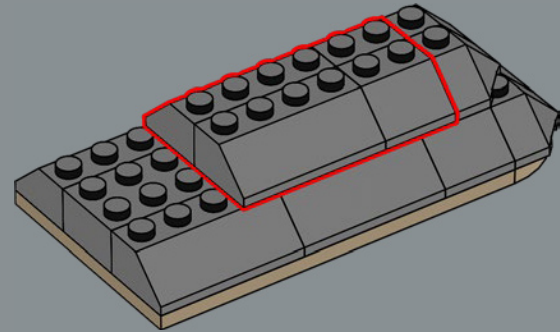




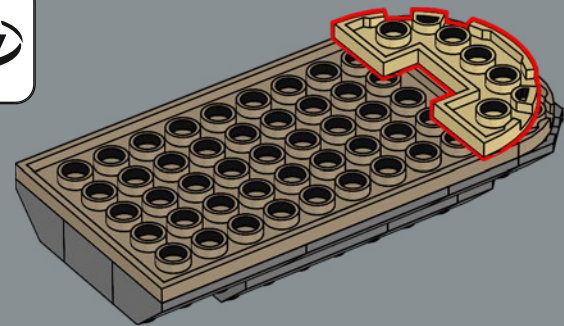
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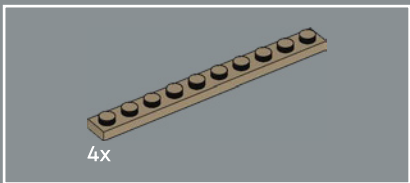


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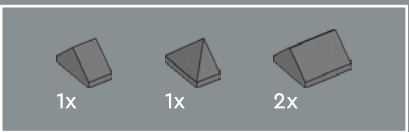
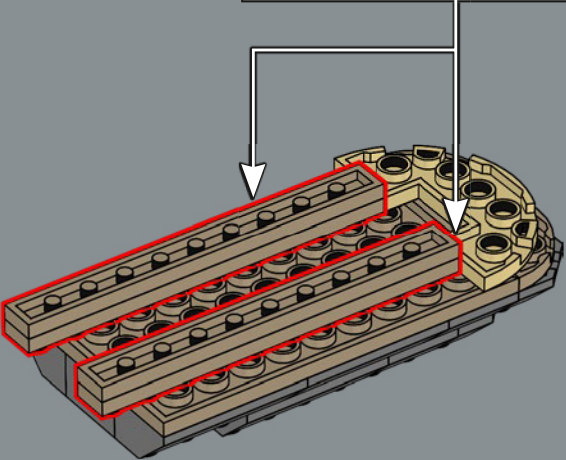
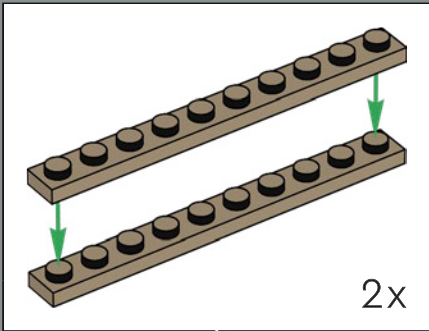


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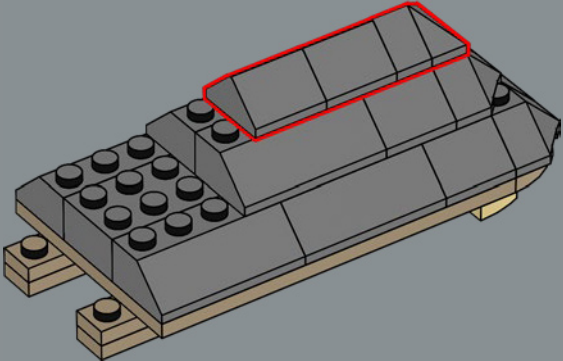




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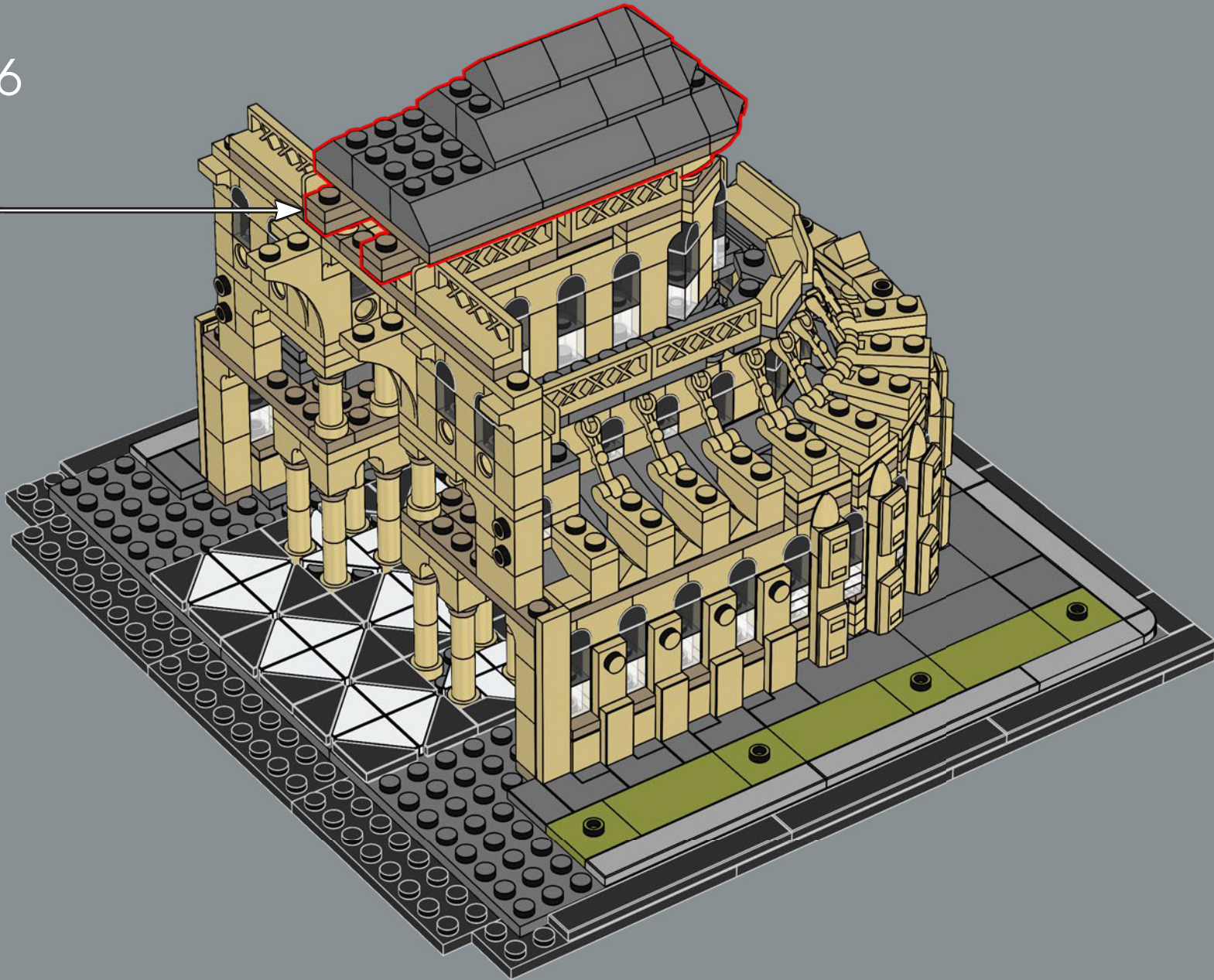


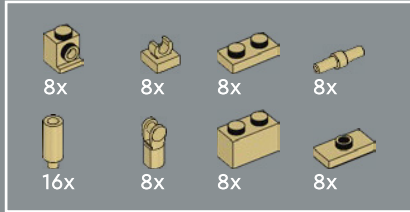
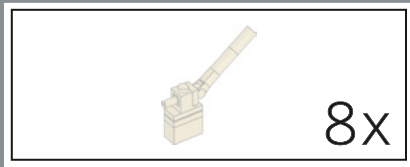
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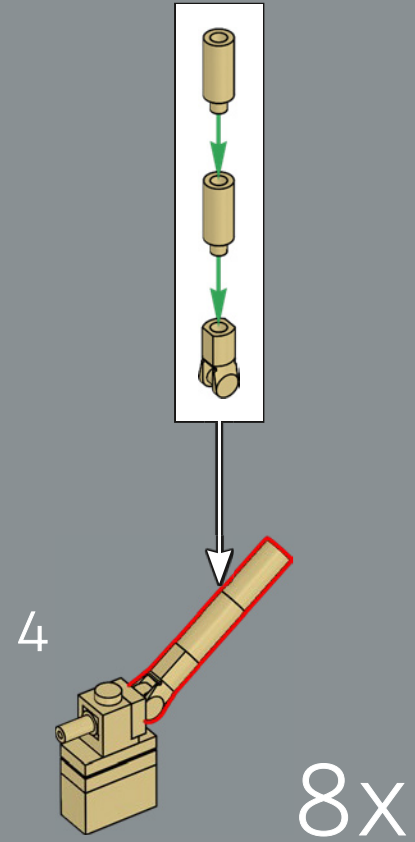
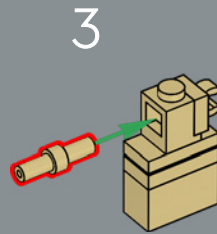
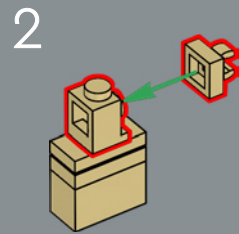
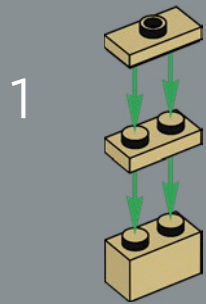
1177 - The choir and chevet are nearly complete, except for the high vaults. The roof and wooden framework are constructed prior to the vaults to offer protection from wear and tear.

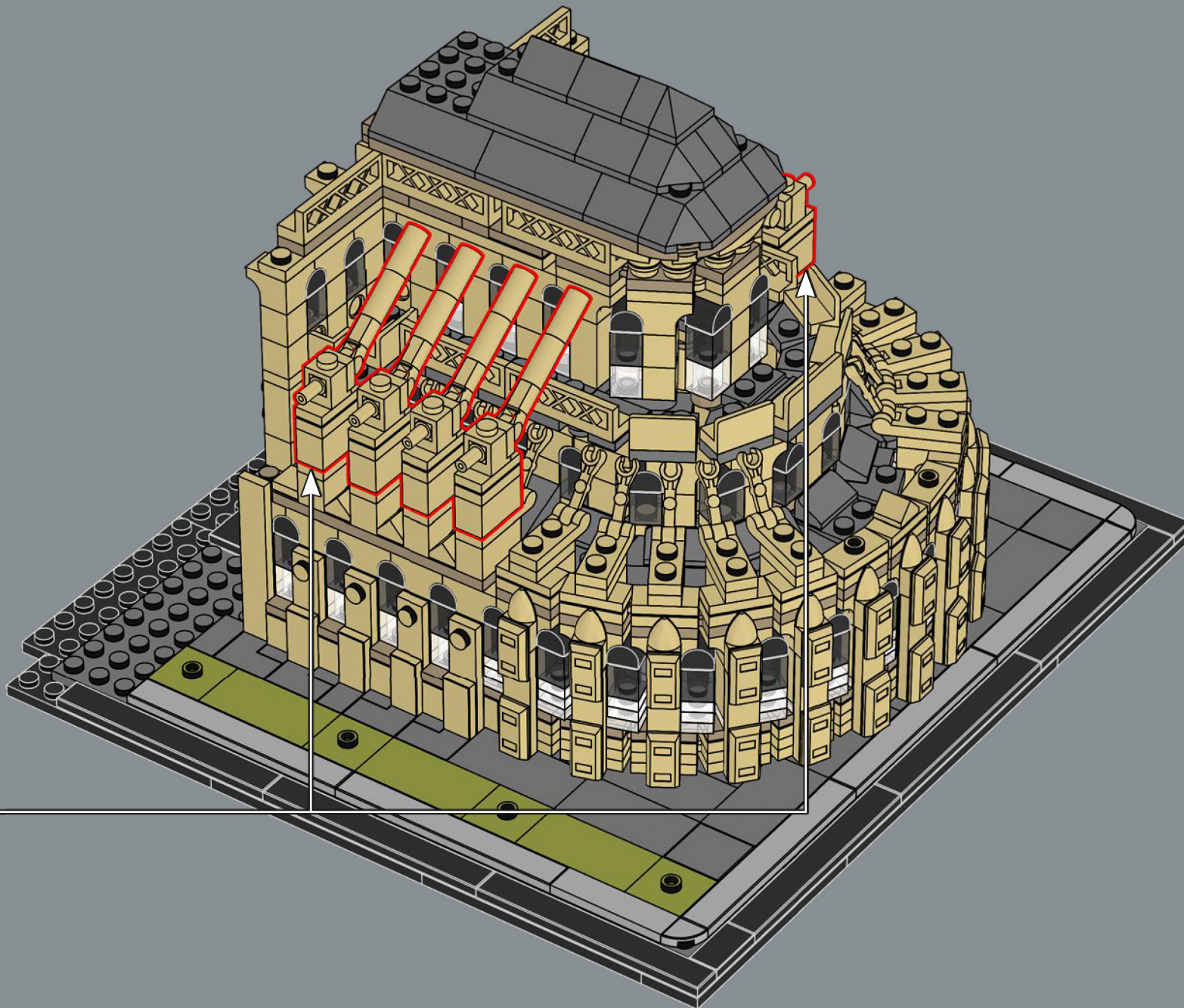

✚ At 128 m (419.9 ft.) long, 48 m (157.4 ft.) wide and 69 m (226.3 ft.) tall, the Notre-Dame Cathedral was built on the site of an existing cathedral on Île de la Cité in the Seine. While the first completed eastern section functioned as an interim church, construction work continued on the transept and in the first bays on the south side of the nave. From the original Romanesque architectural style, the construction gradually incorporated contemporary architectural styles, evolving into the Gothic style it represents today. This model stays faithful to the construction of both the structure within and the external architectural details – with certain features scaled down – to recreate the awe-inspiring view that has met visitors through the centuries.

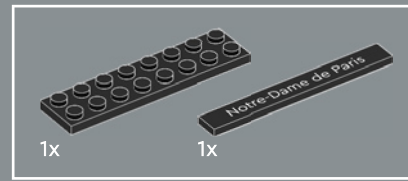
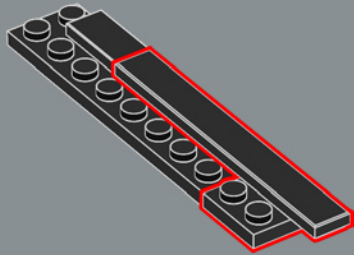


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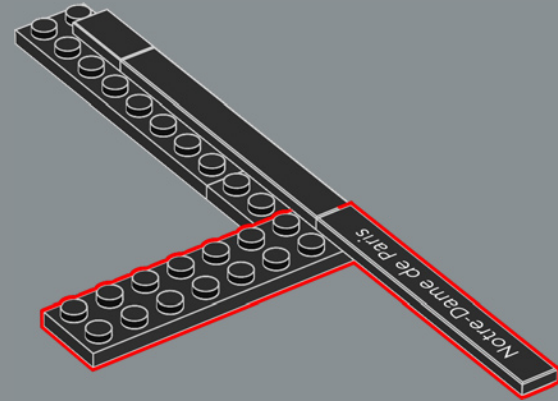


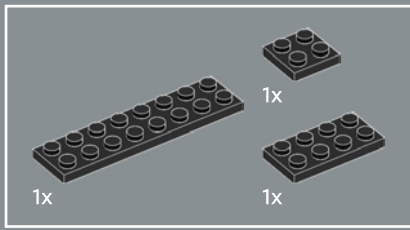


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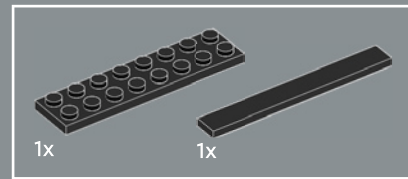
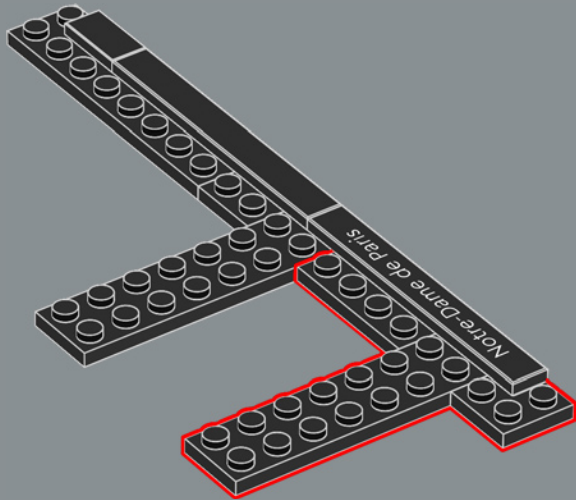


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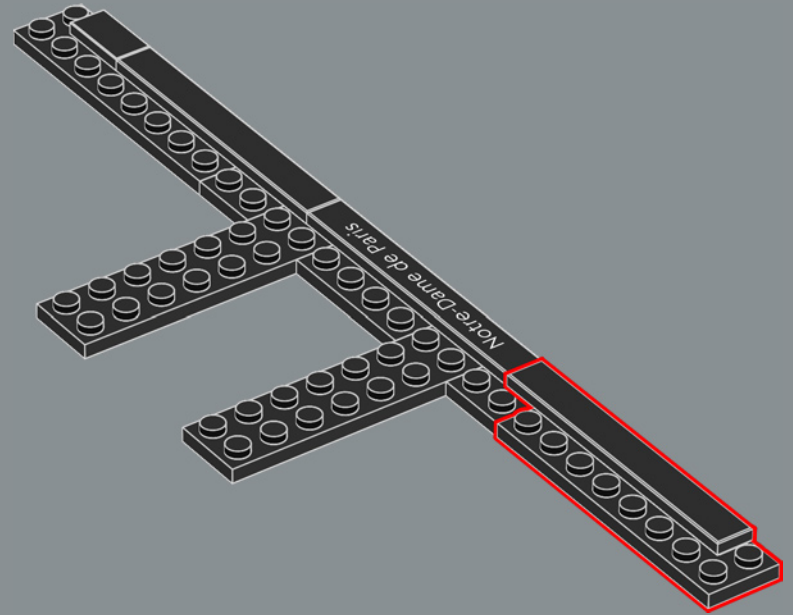


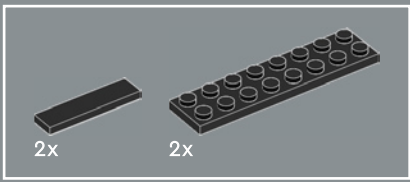


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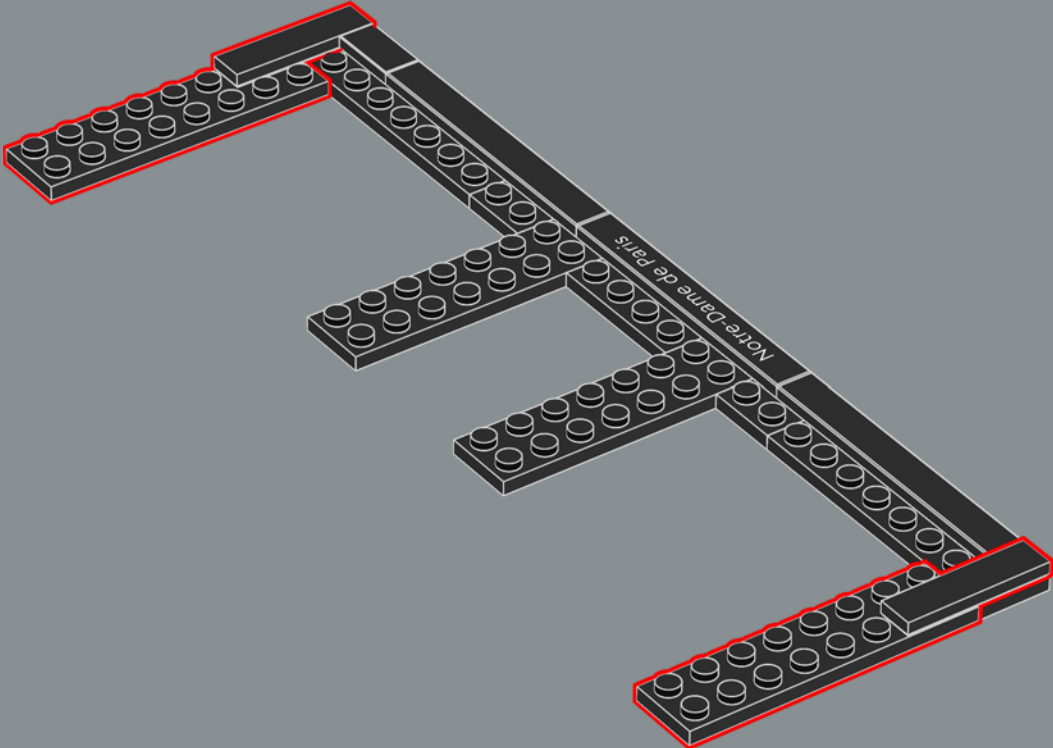


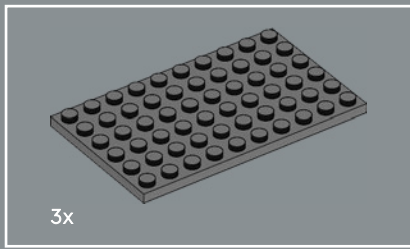
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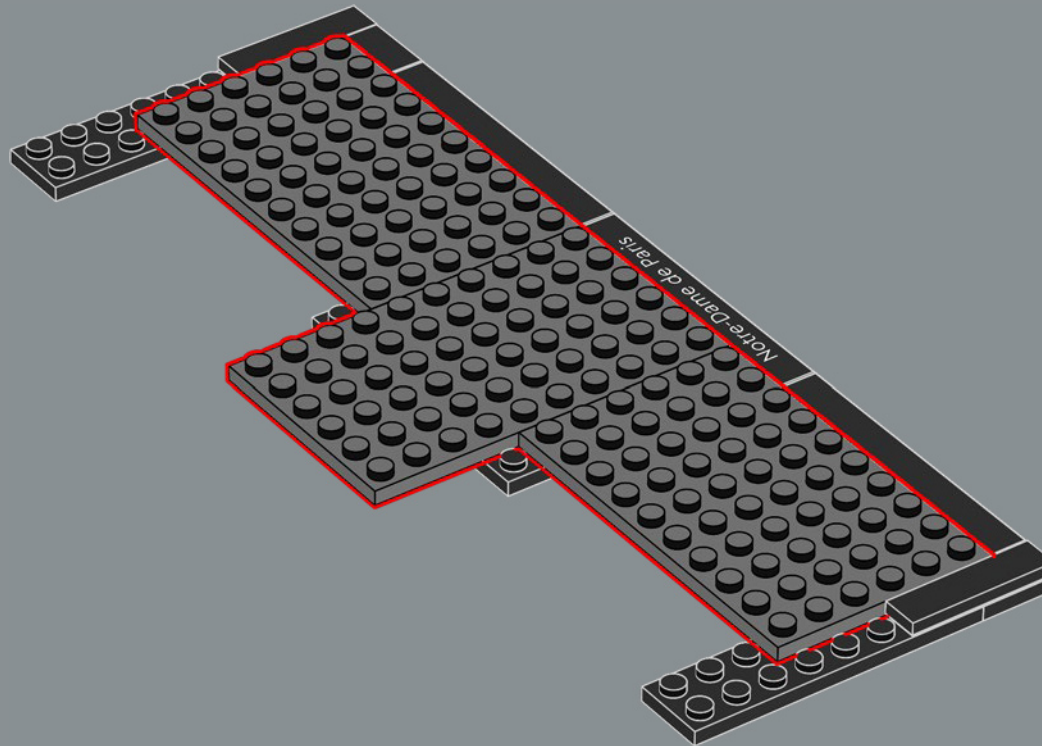


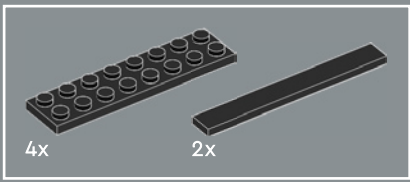
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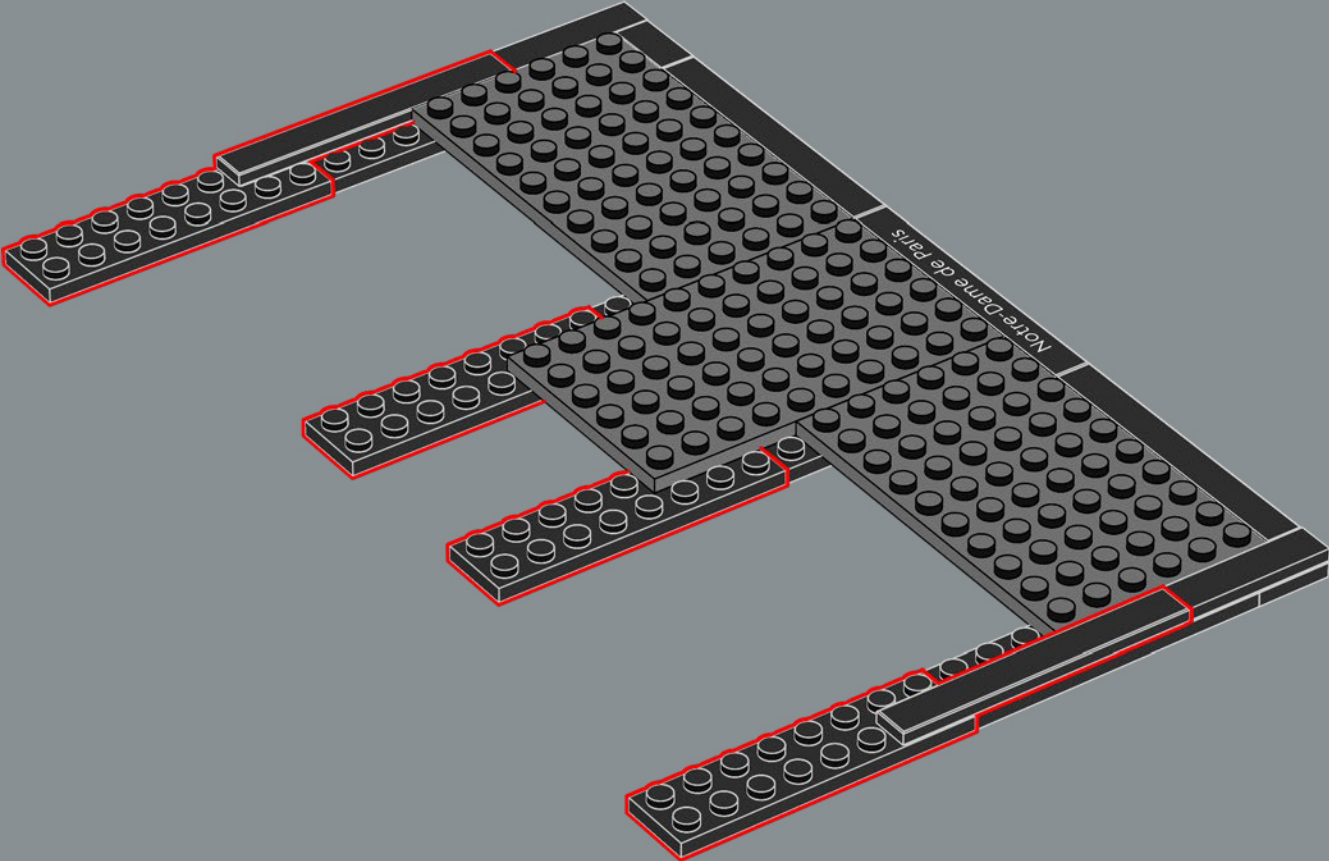


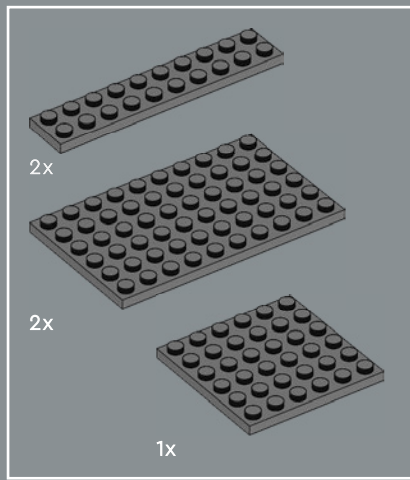
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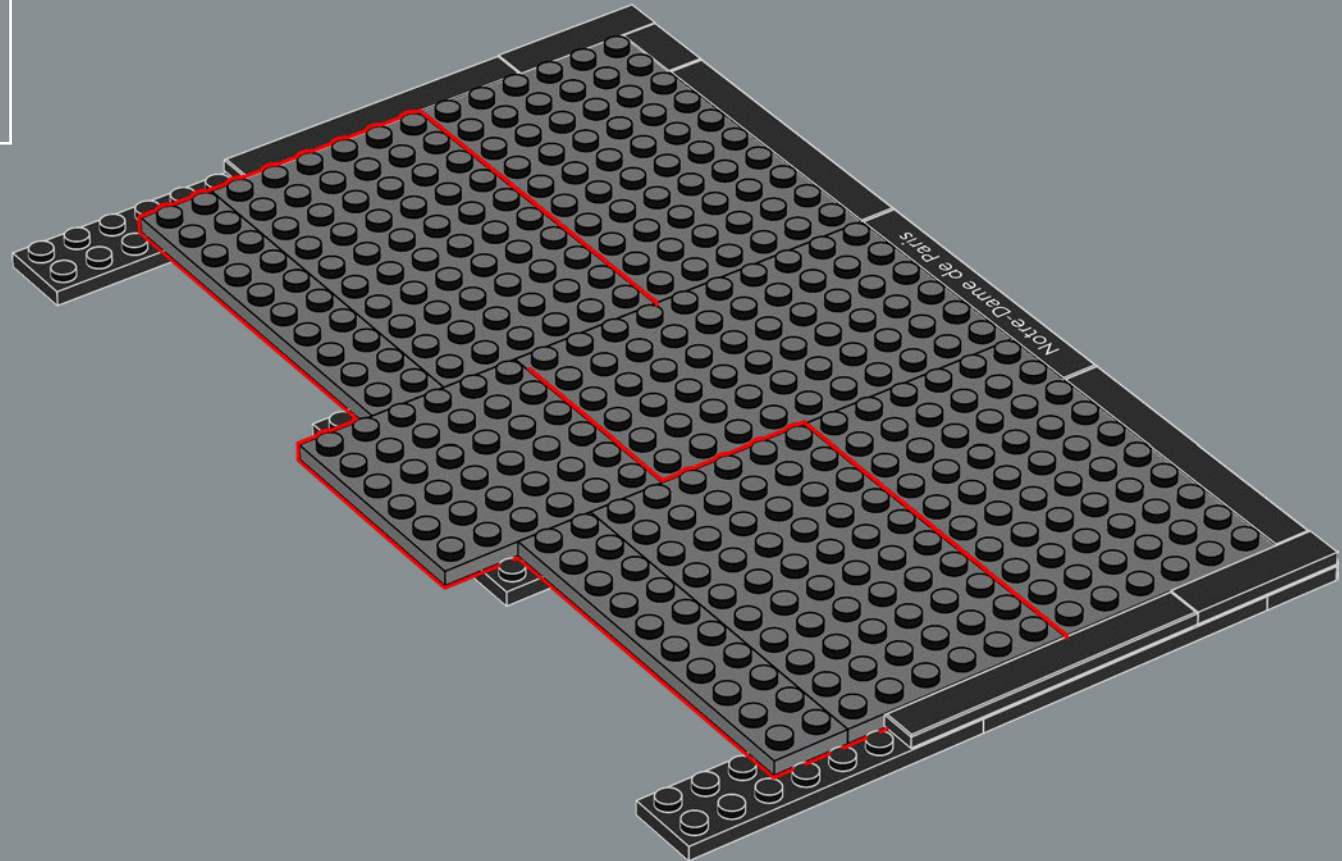


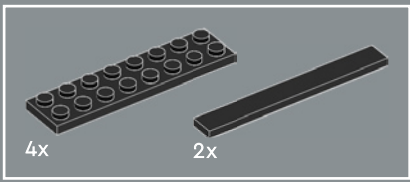
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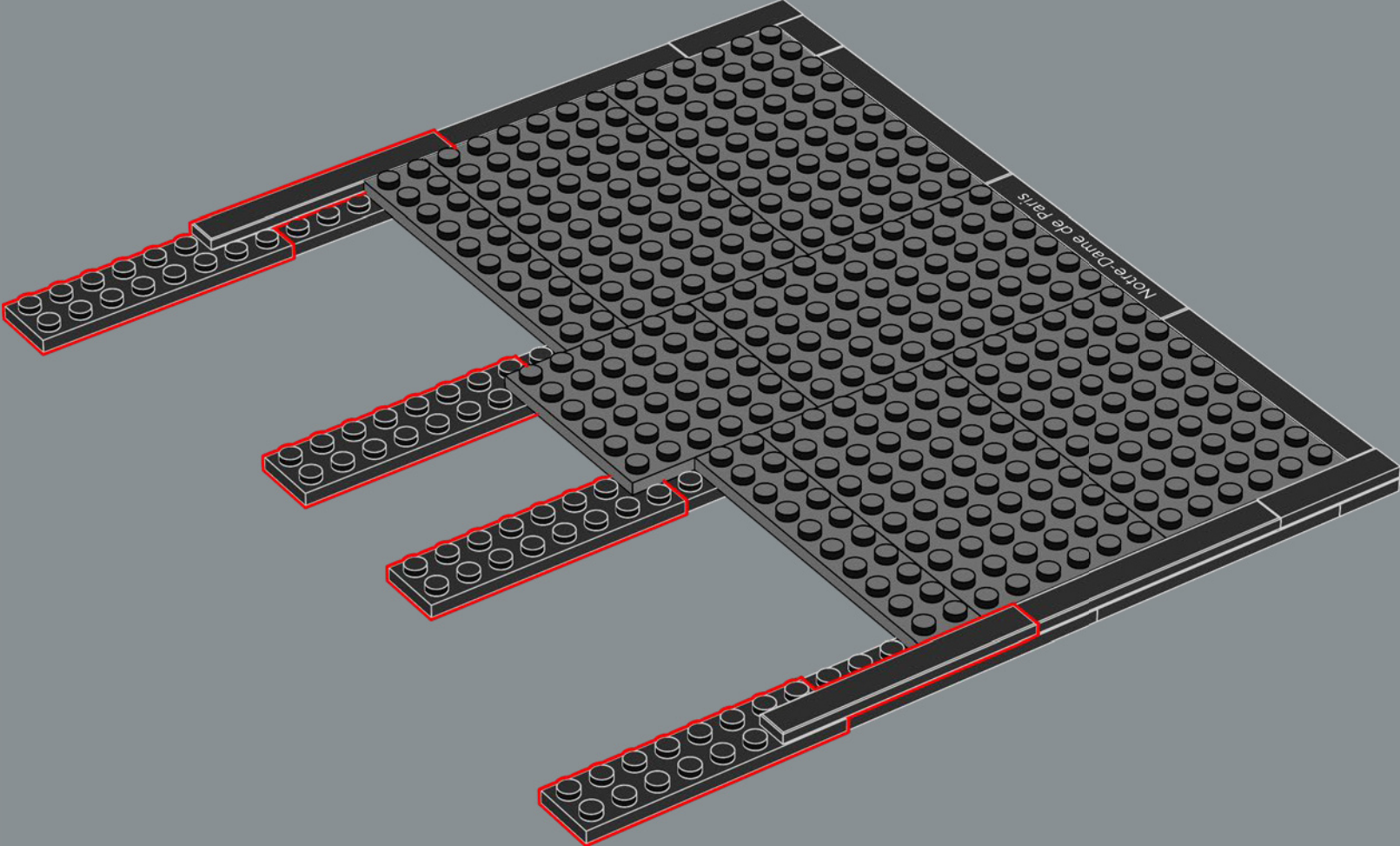


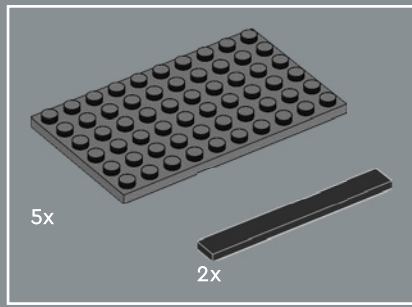
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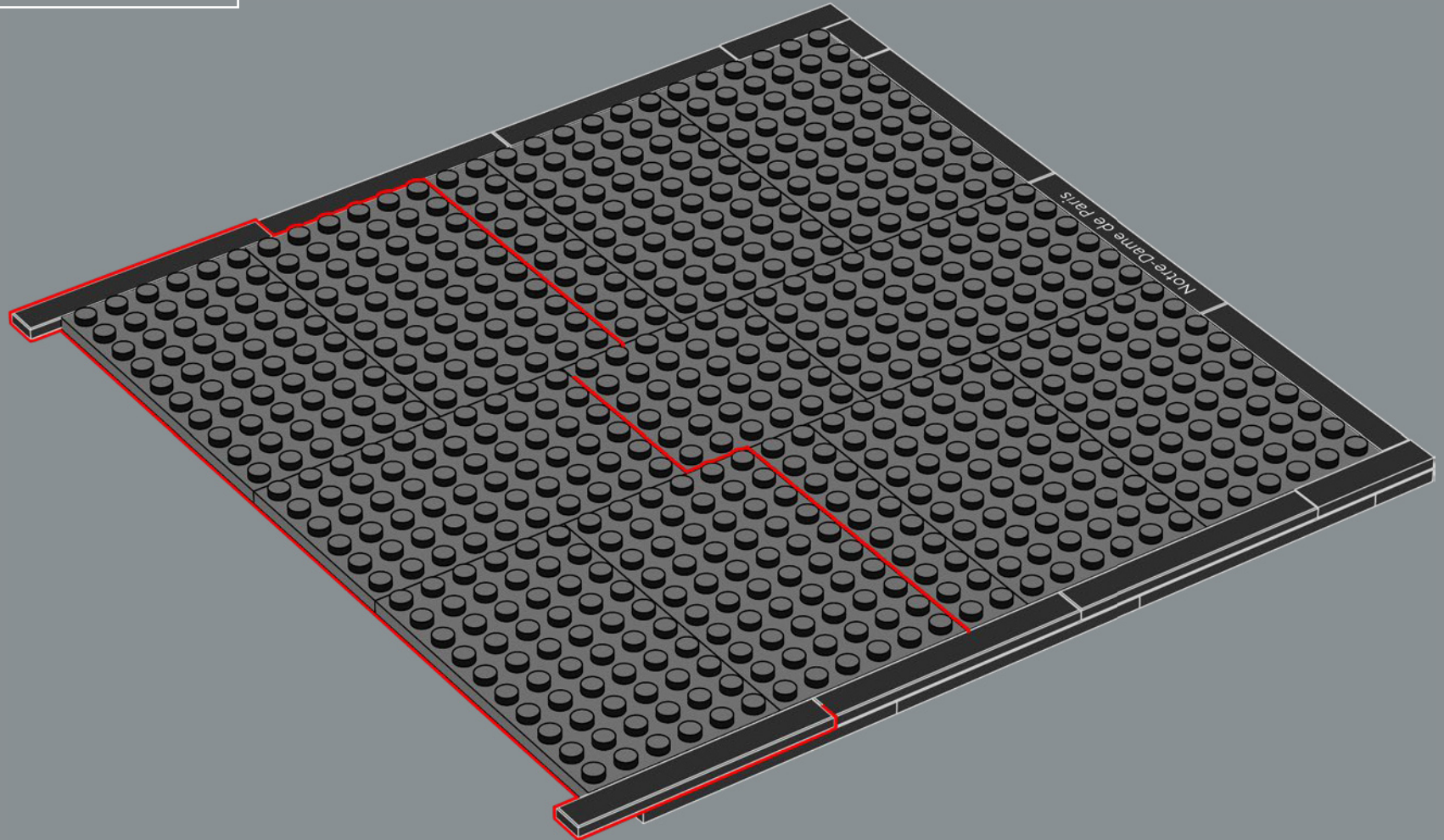


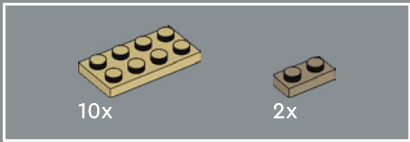
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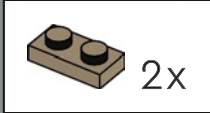
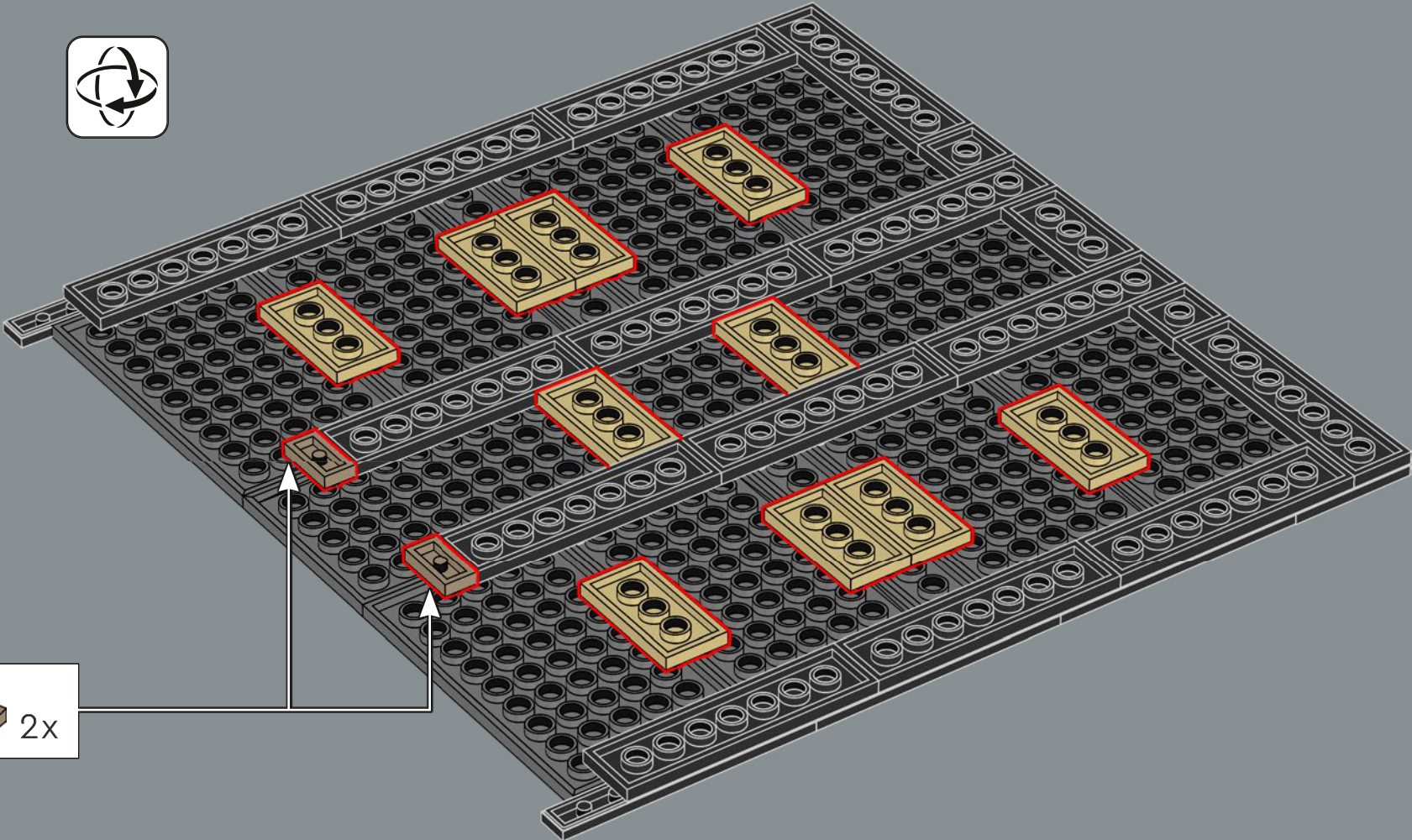


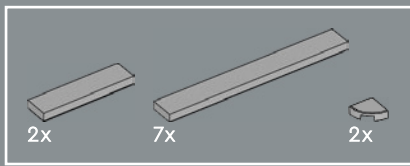
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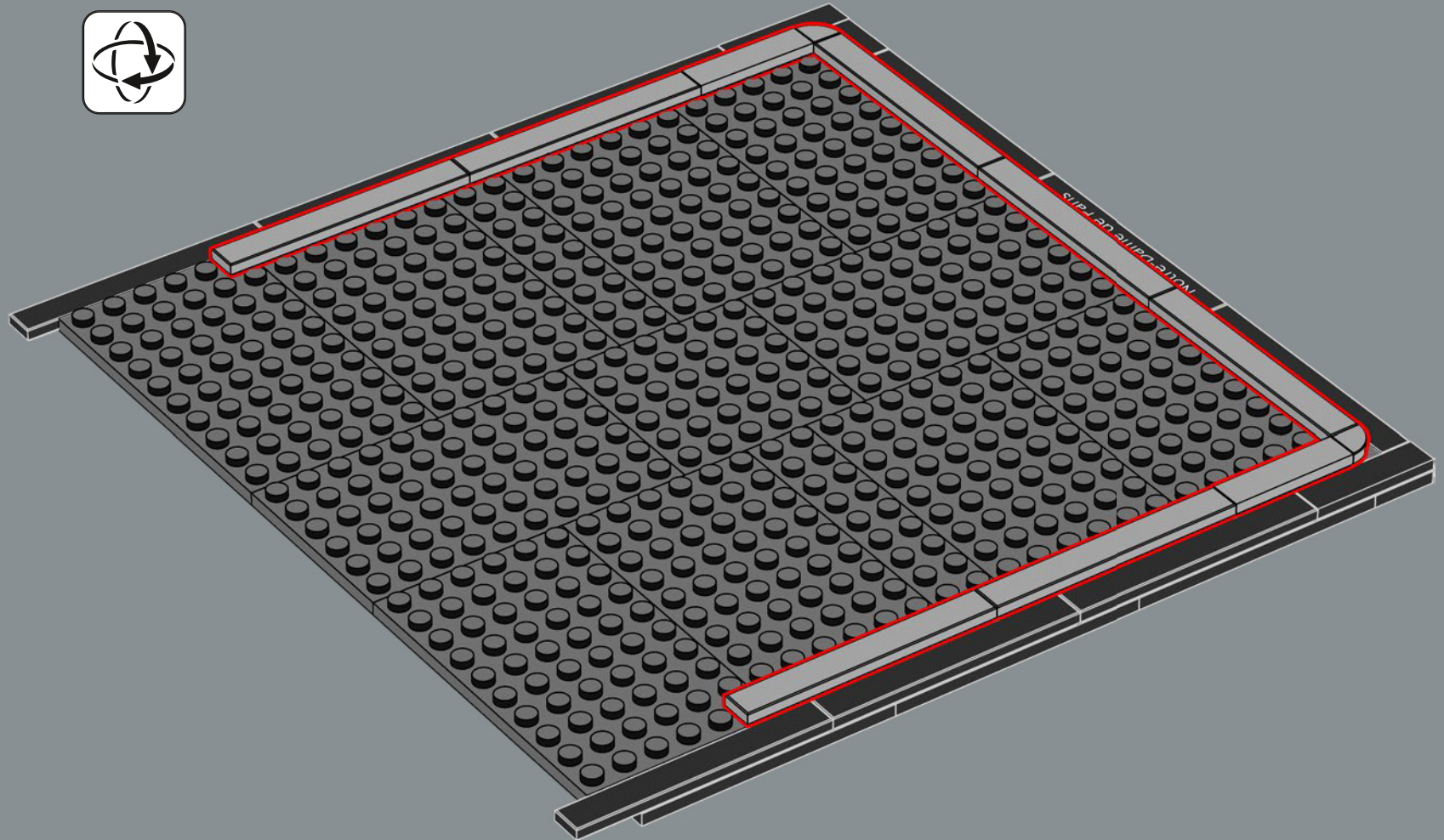


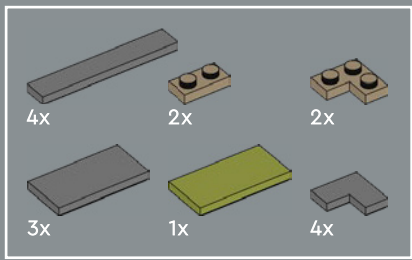
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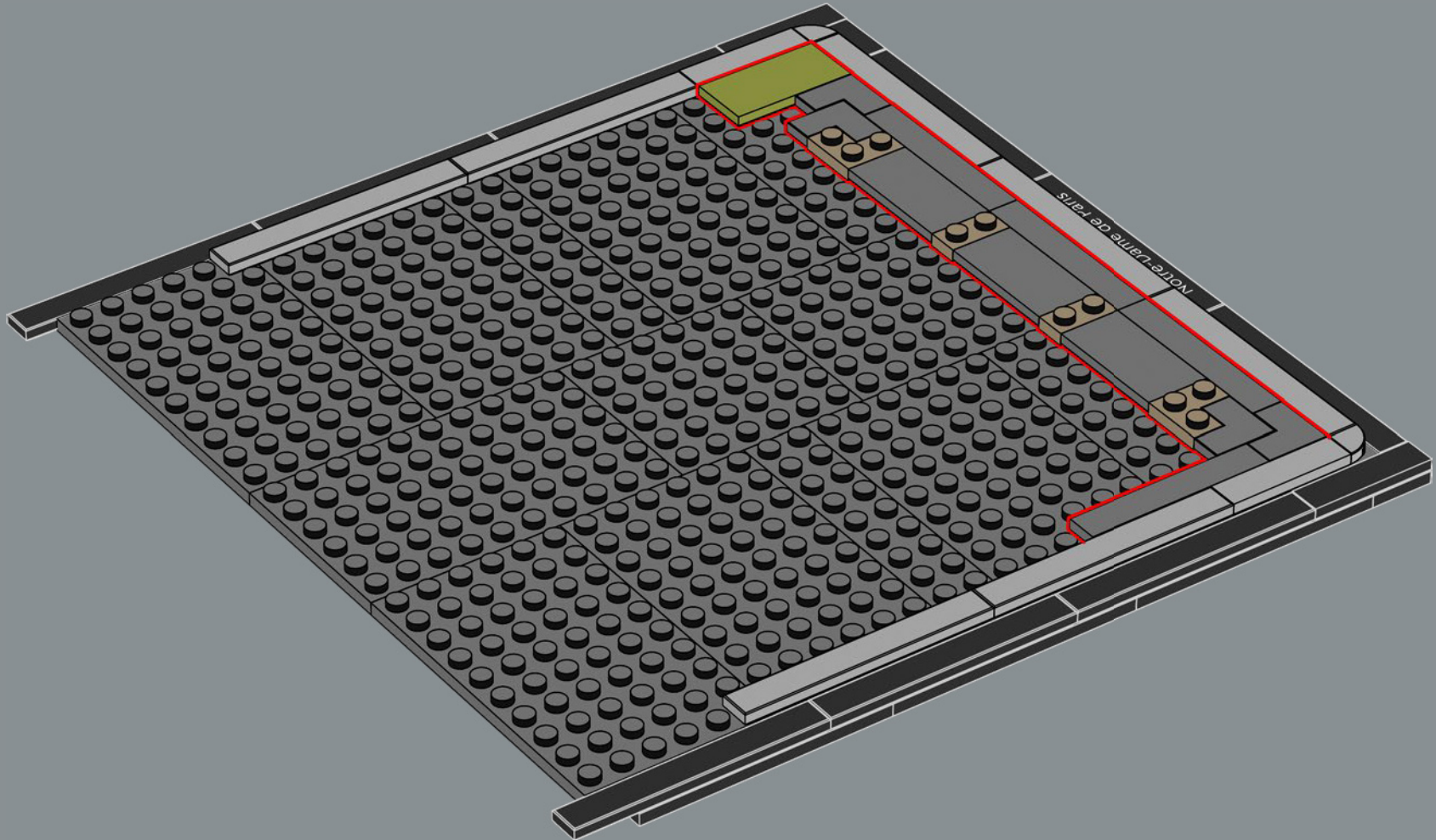


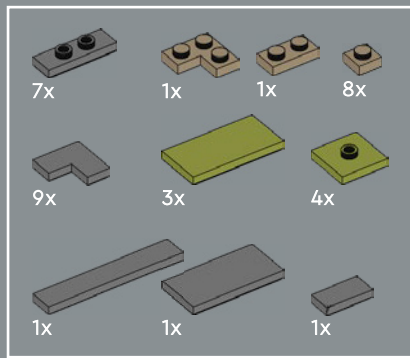
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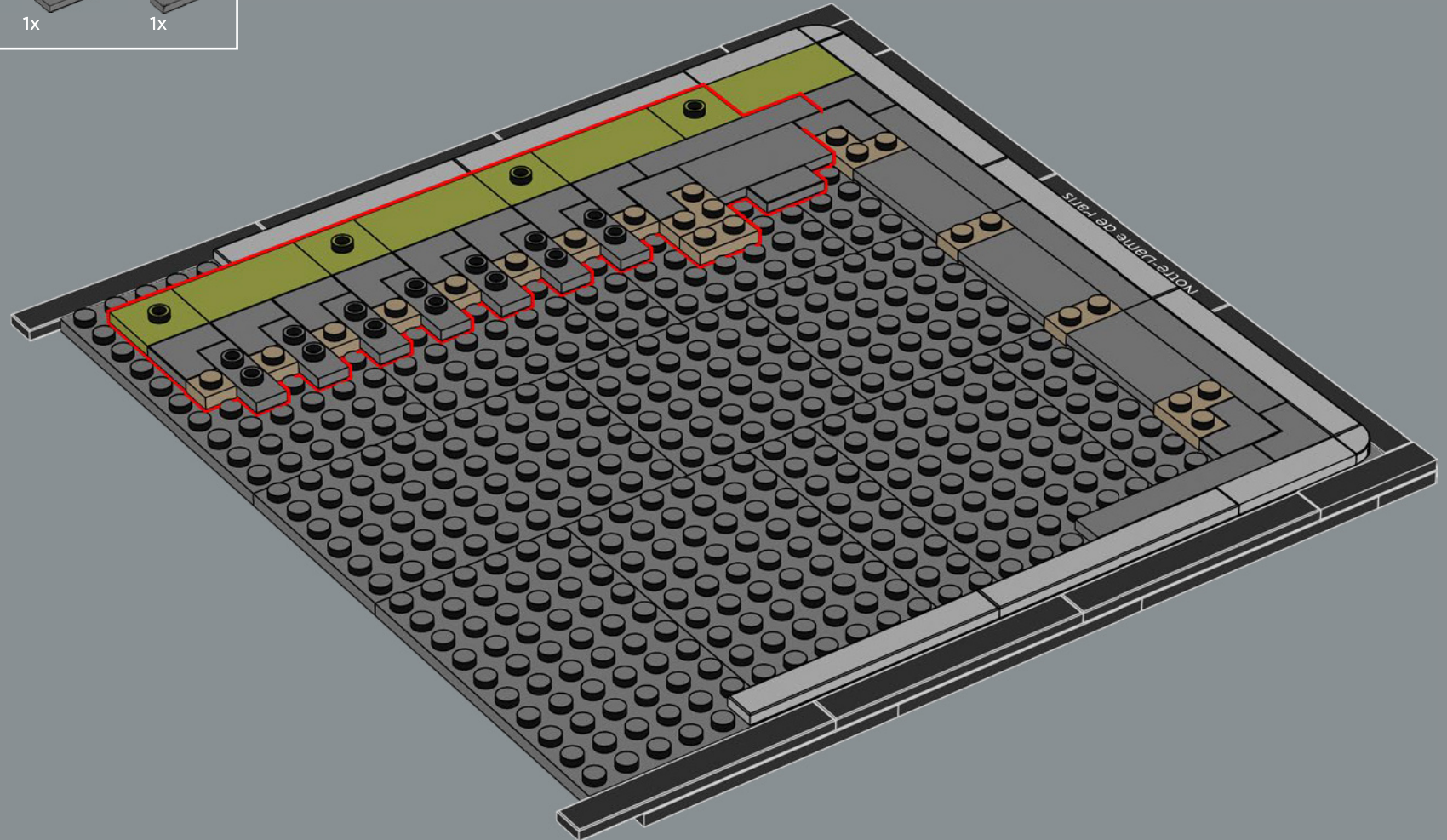


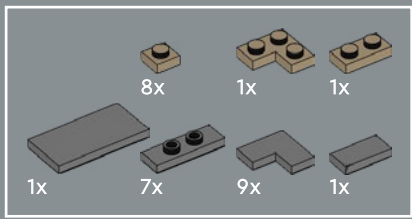
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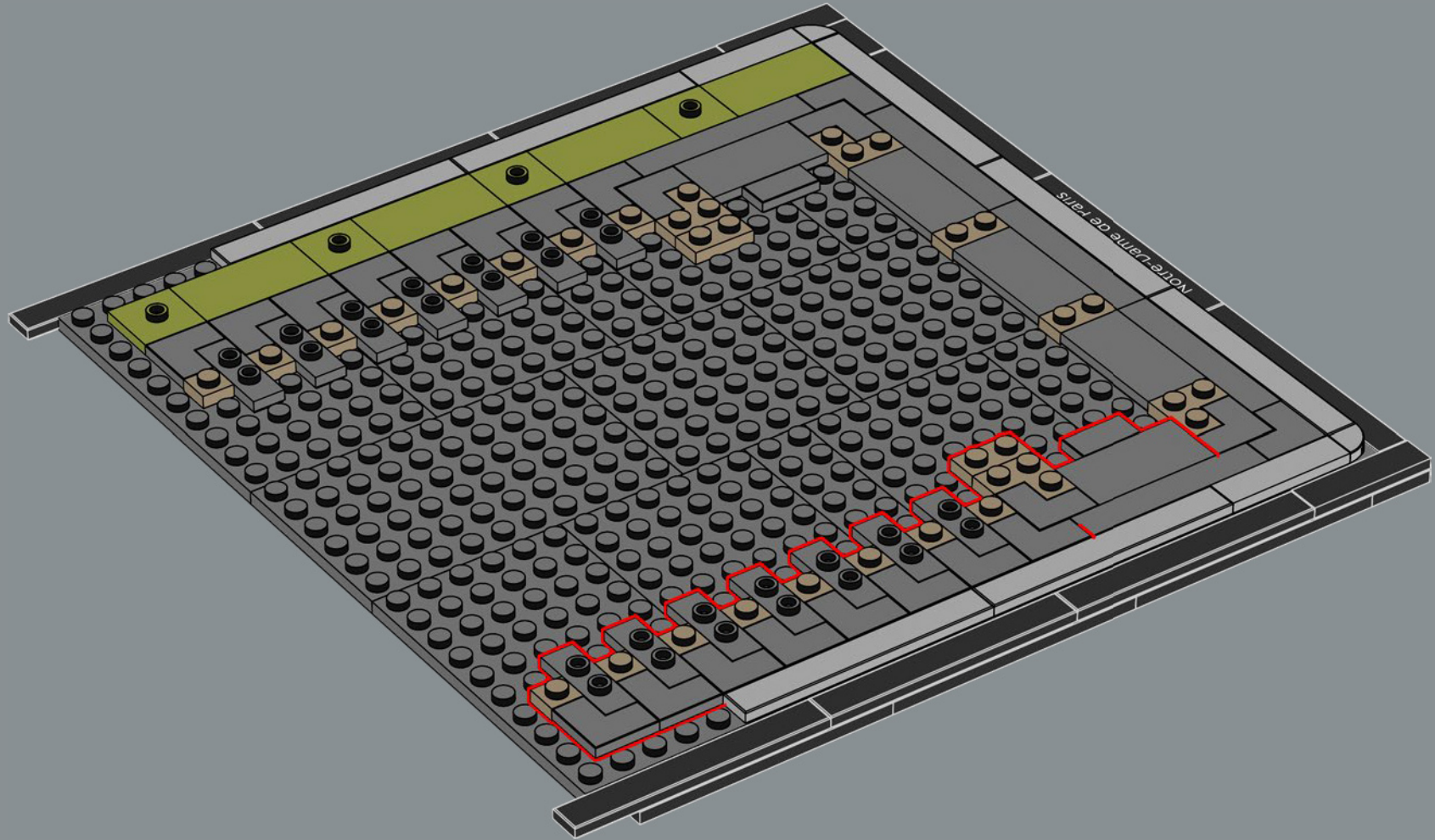


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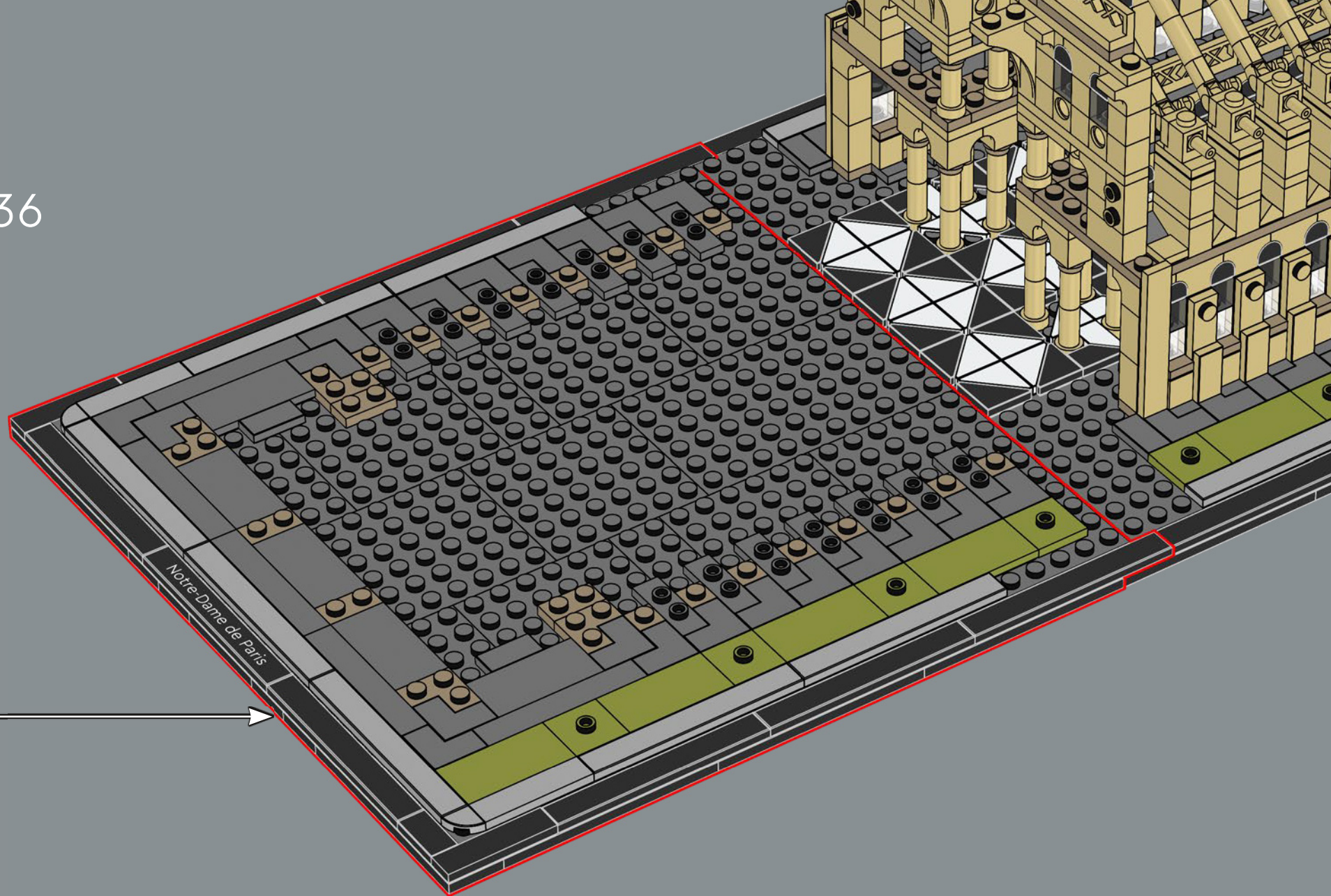


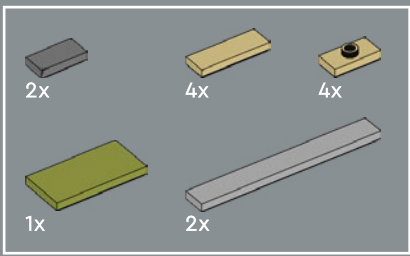


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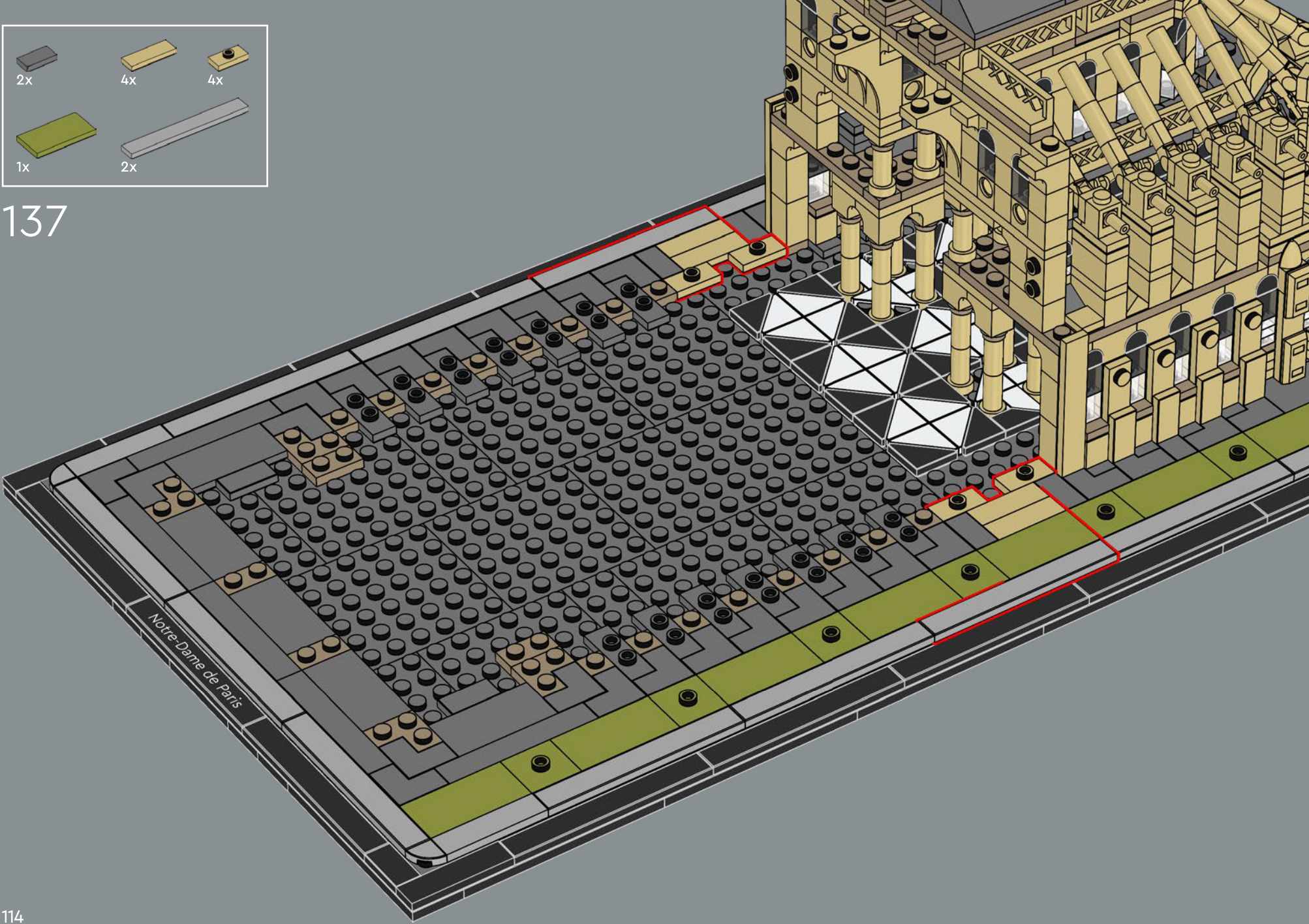


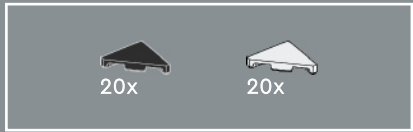
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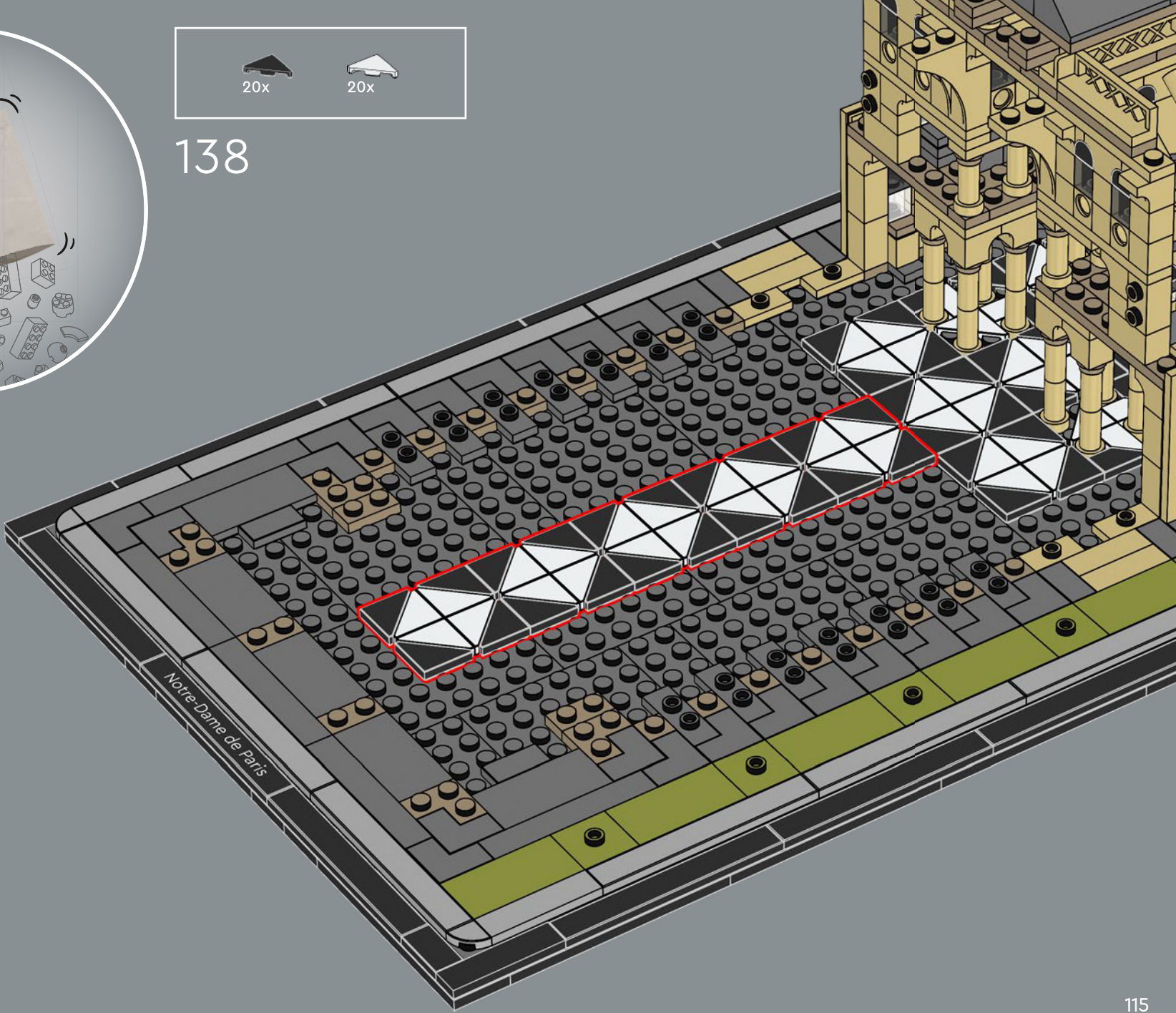


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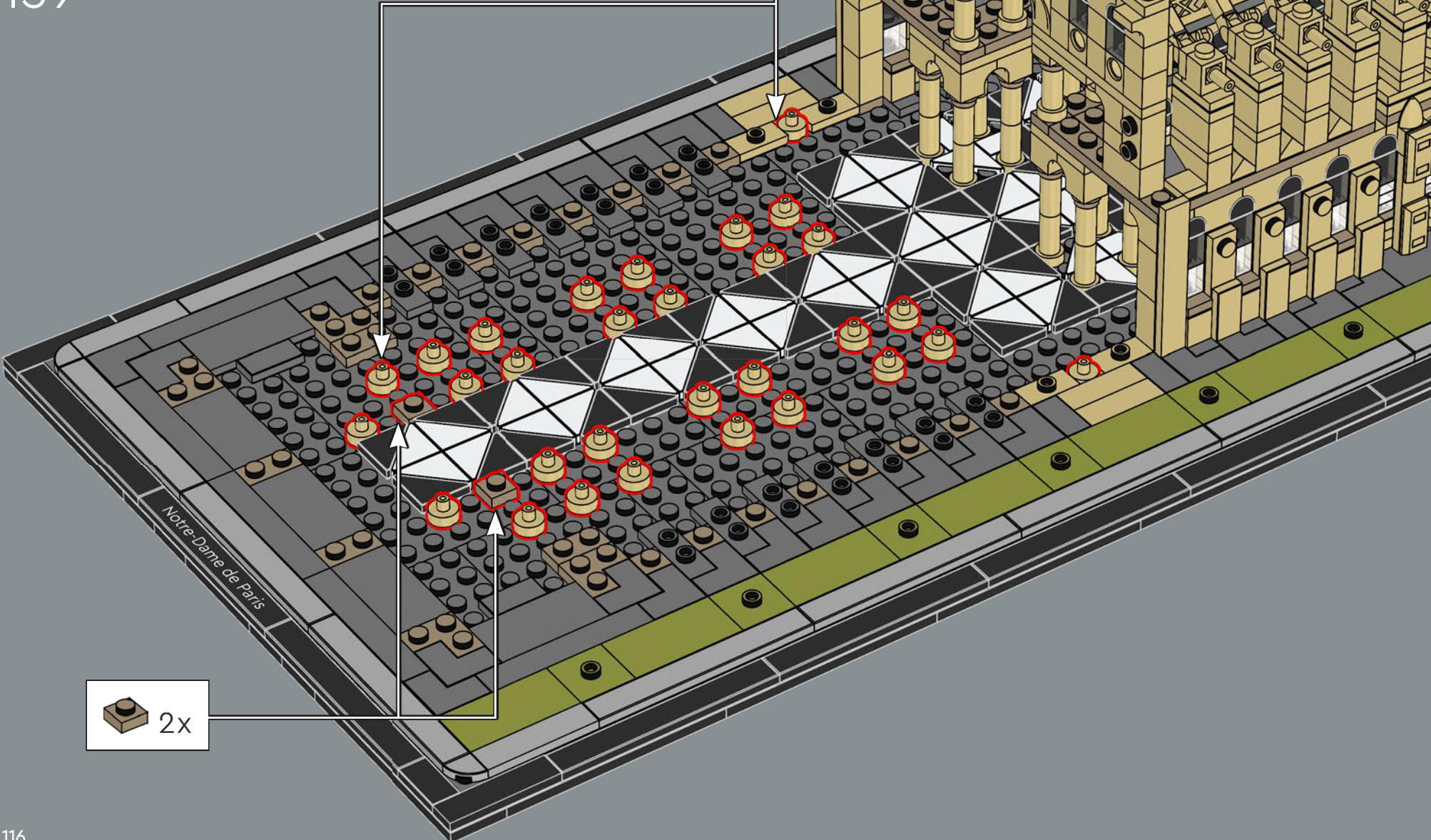
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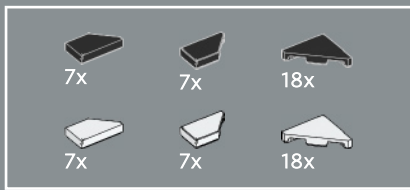


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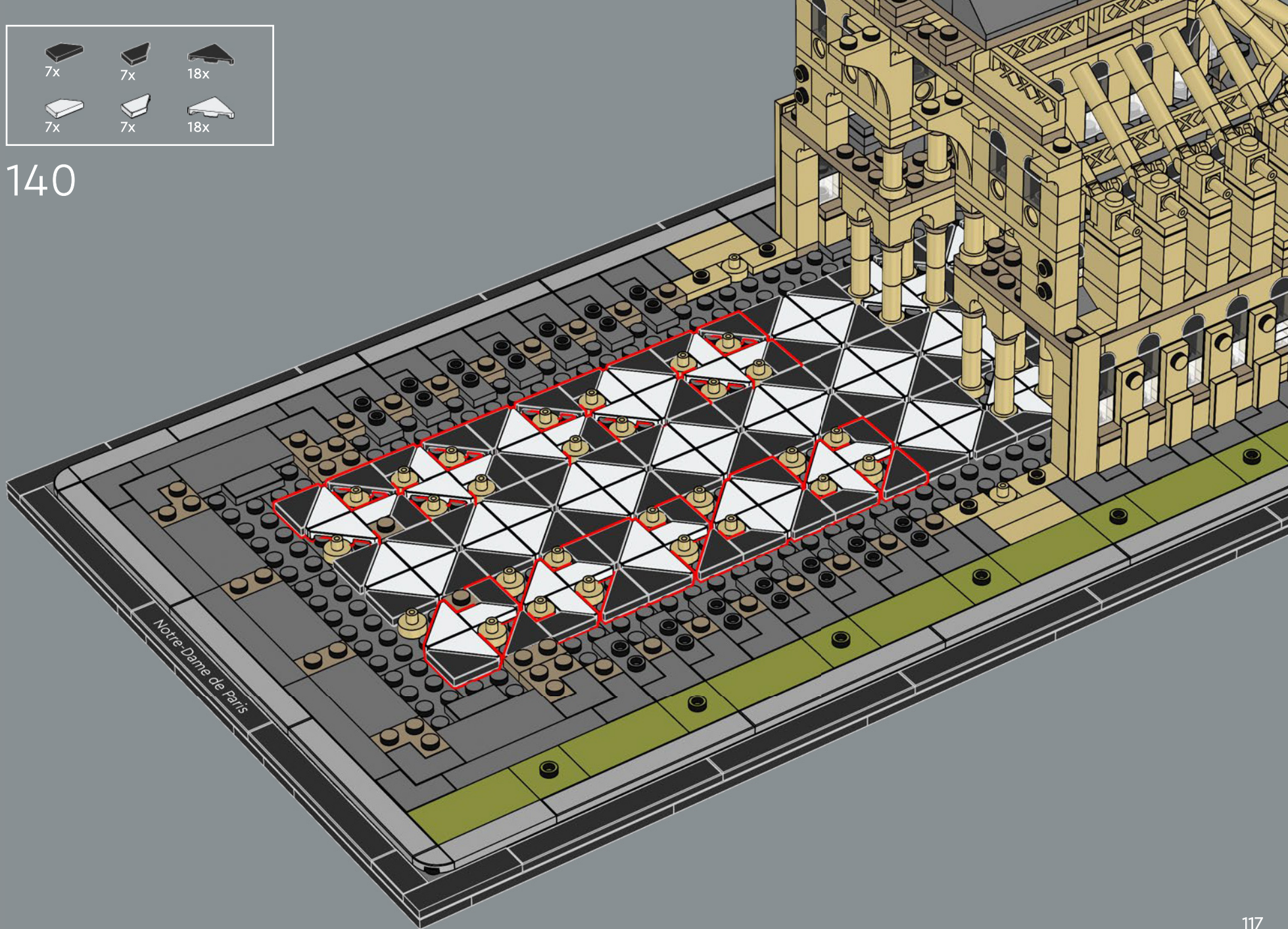
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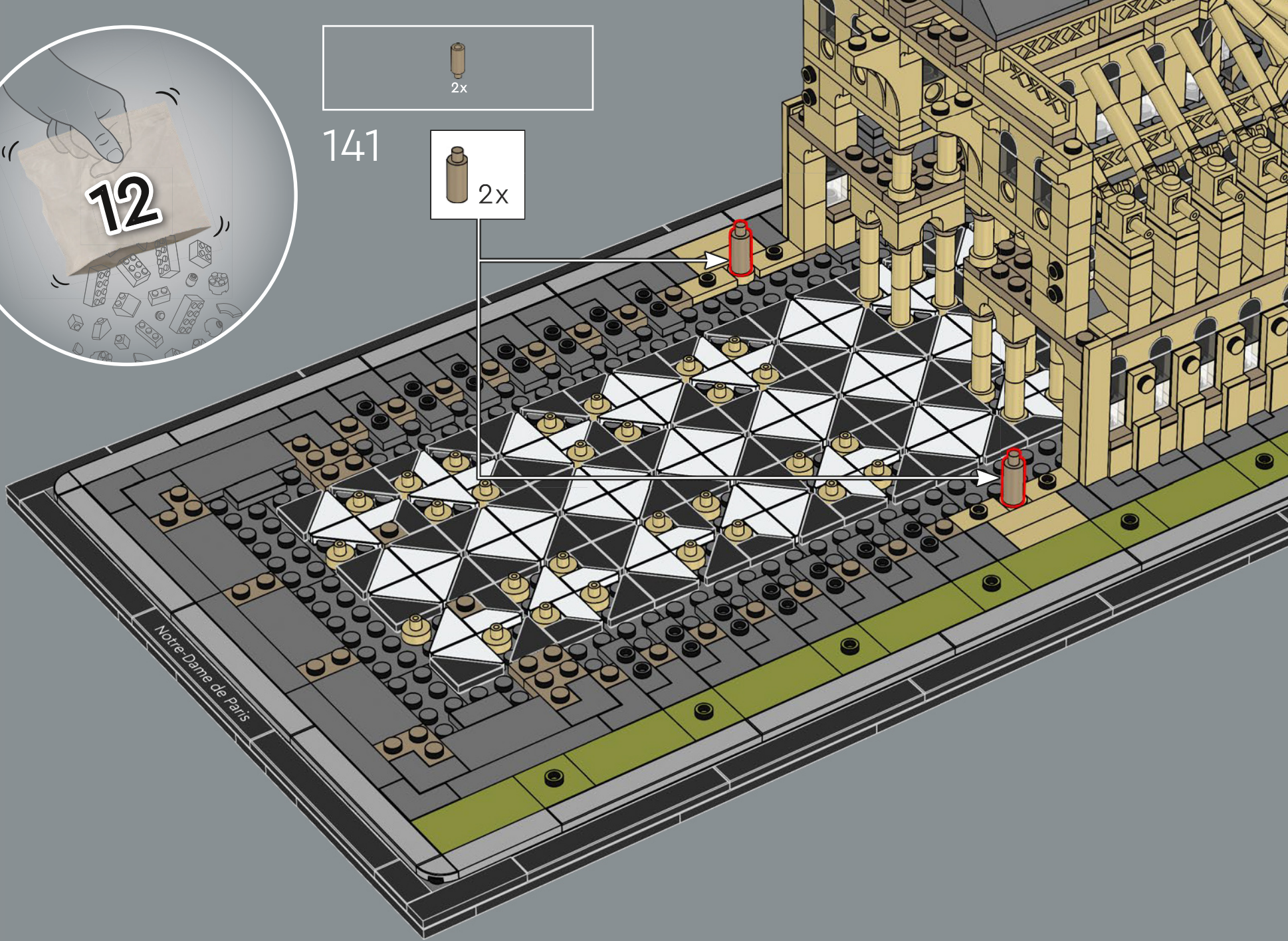
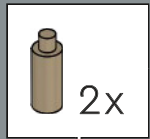


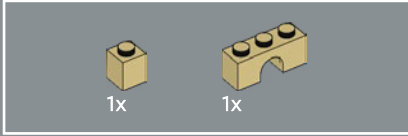
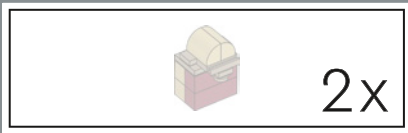
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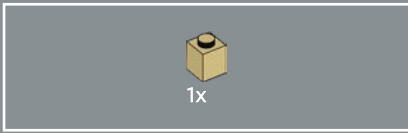
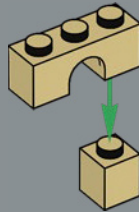


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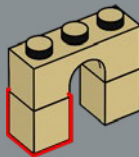




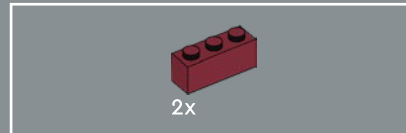
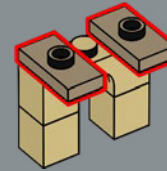
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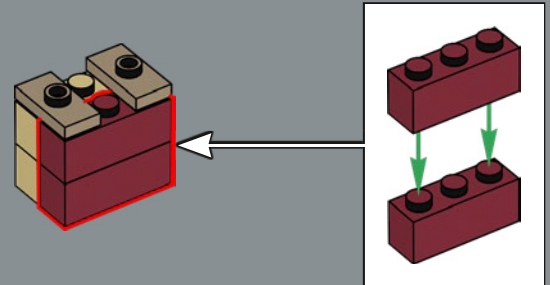
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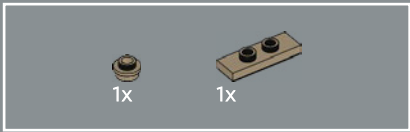


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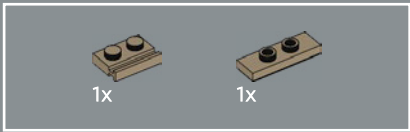
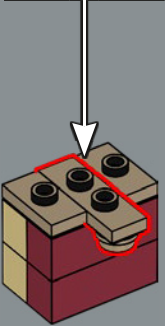
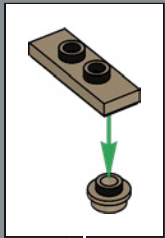


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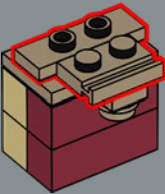




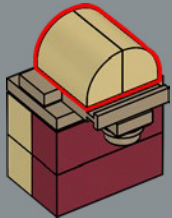
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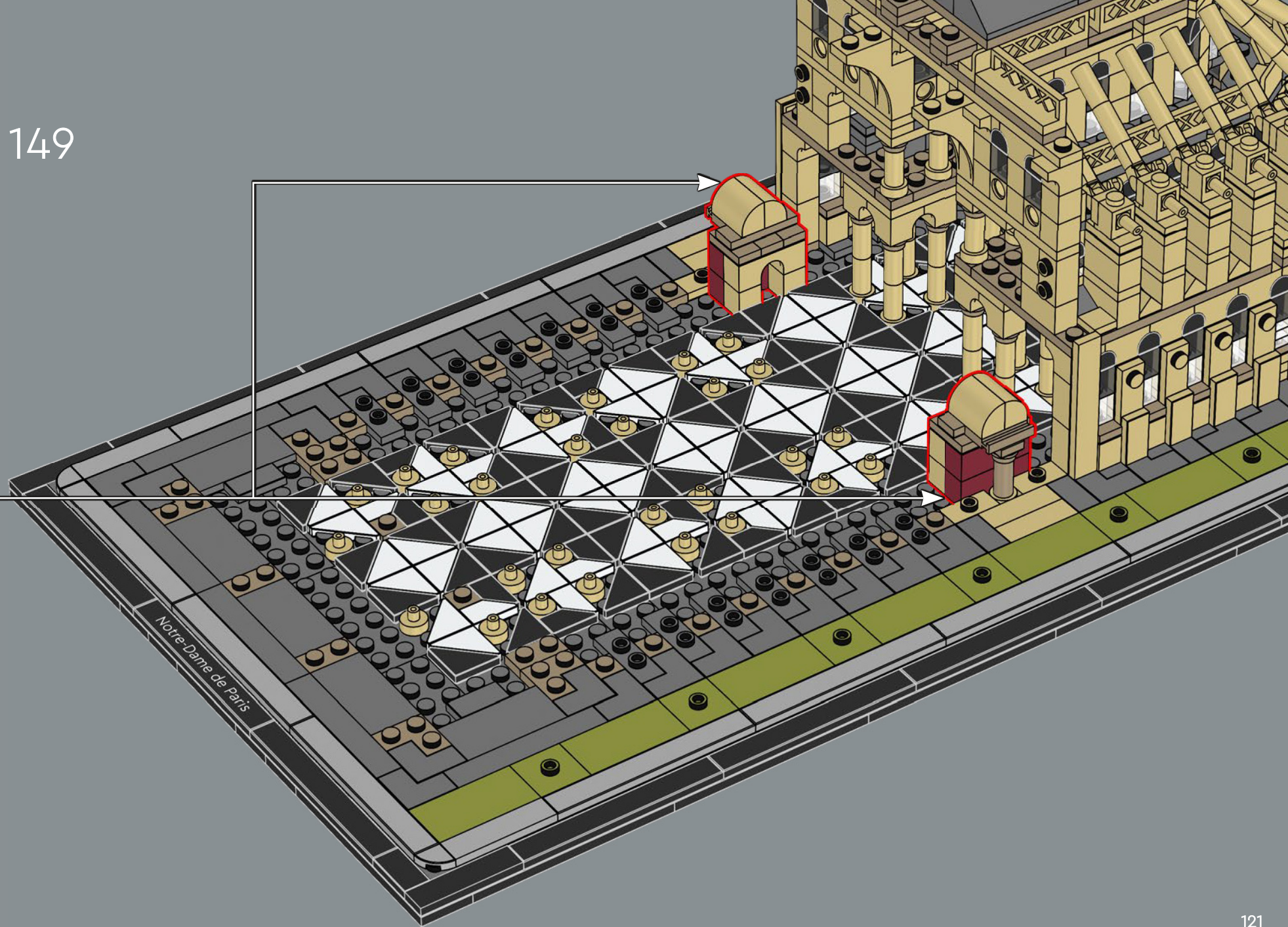


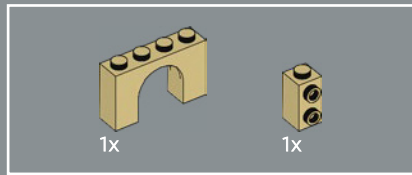
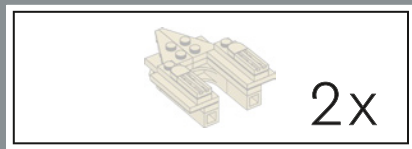
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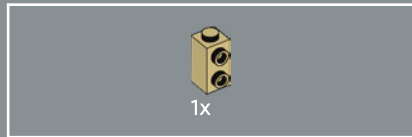
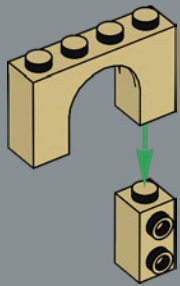

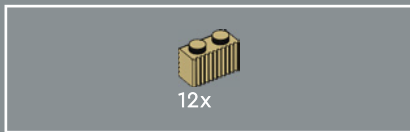


BUILDING TECHNIQUES AND FEATURES

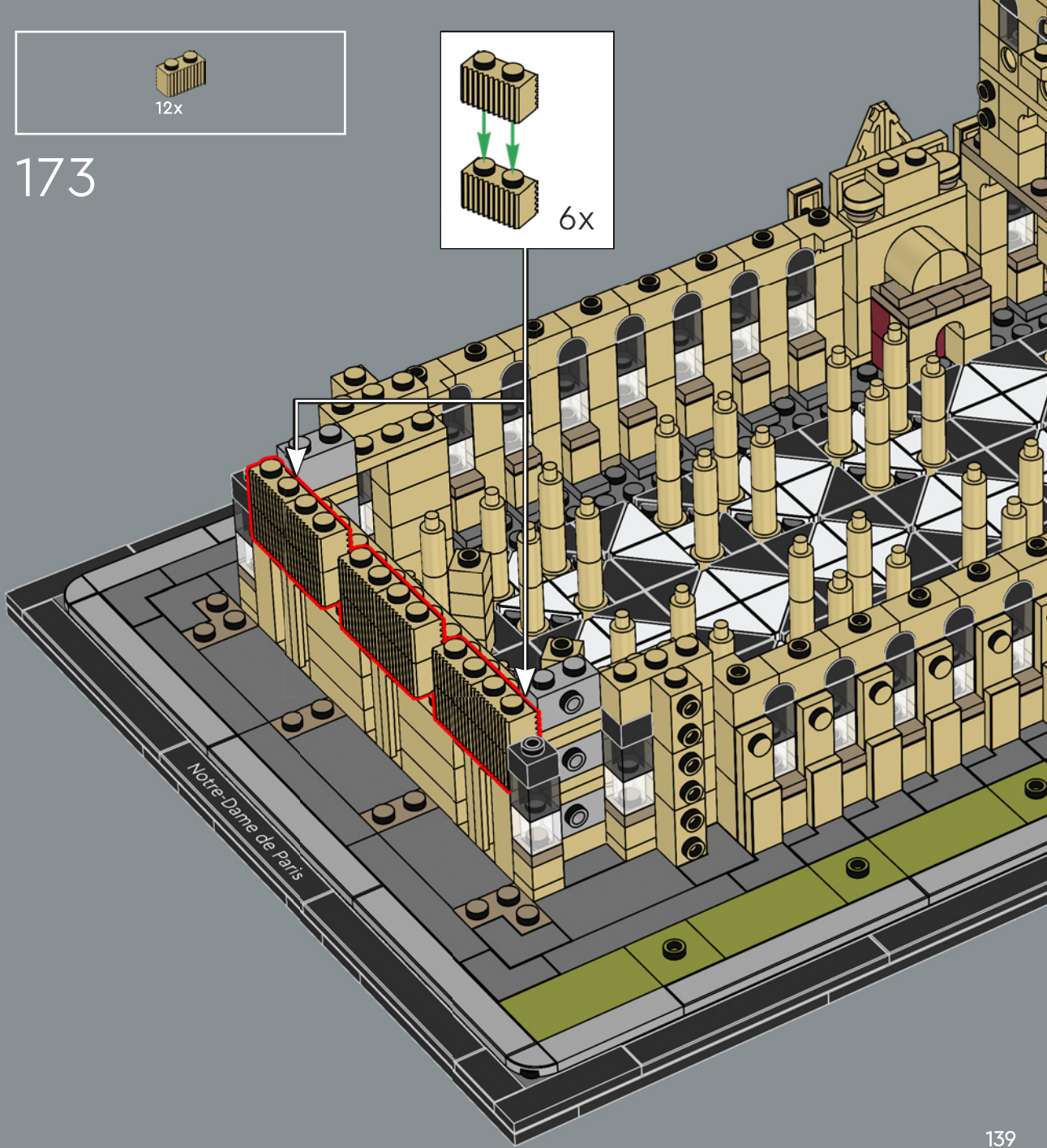
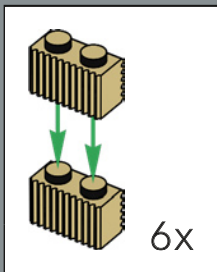
✂ In 1208, construction of the transept was complete, with large, unique rose windows on the facades, all in different sizes and designs. The original north rose window has a diameter of 13.5 m (44.2 ft.), a record at that time. Every architectural feature in the cathedral serves a purpose, both decorative and practical. The three LEGO® rose window elements are an abstraction of the originals – they are all the same size and design, and you can use them interchangeably in the model. By 1220, the body of the cathedral is complete except for the upper part of the towers.

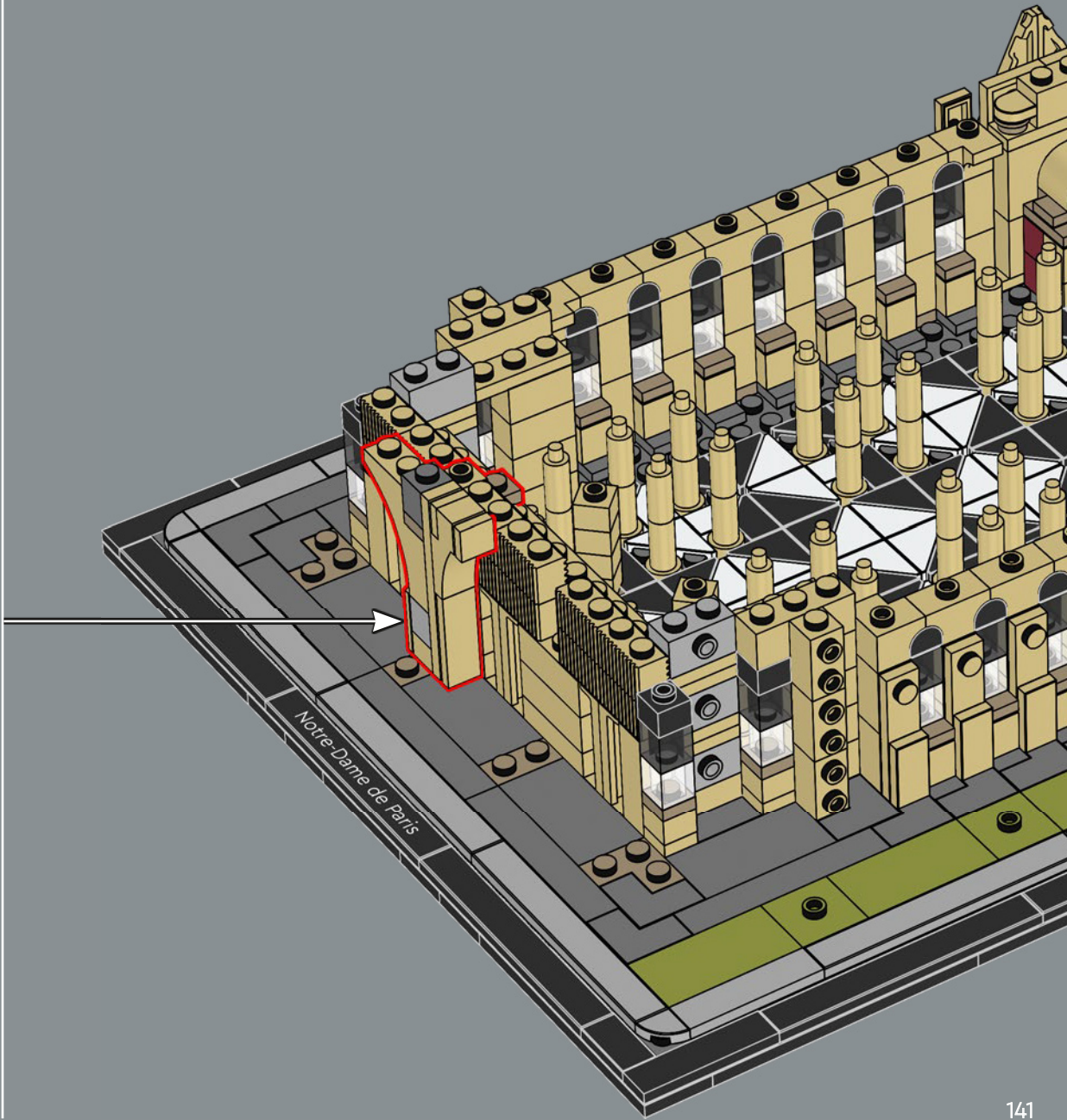
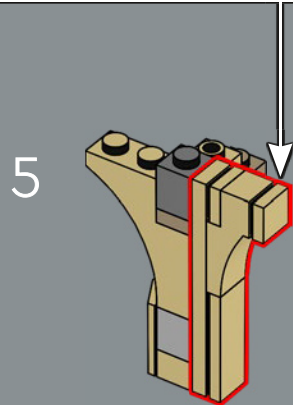
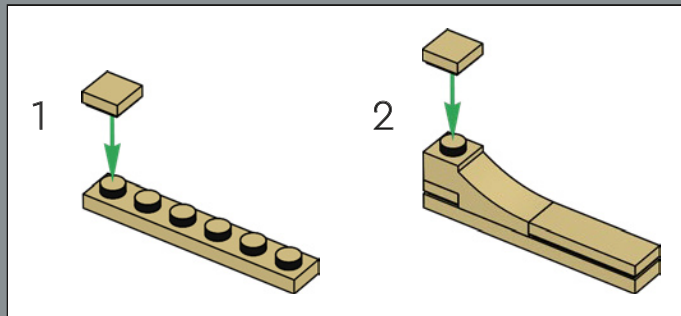


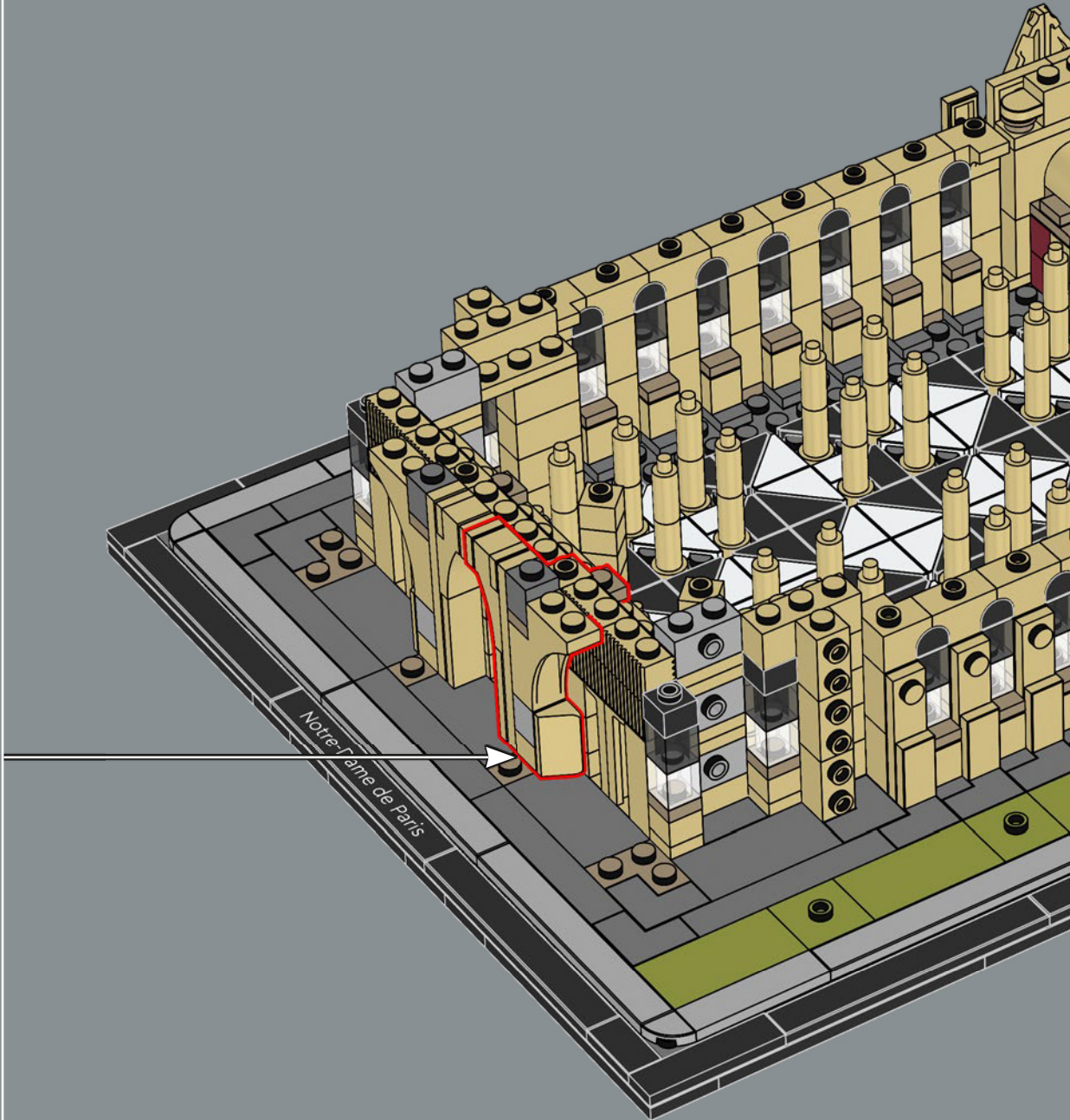
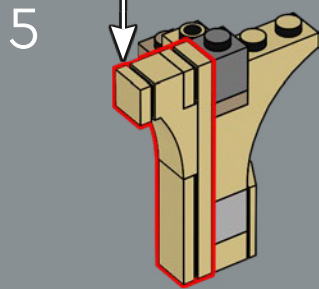
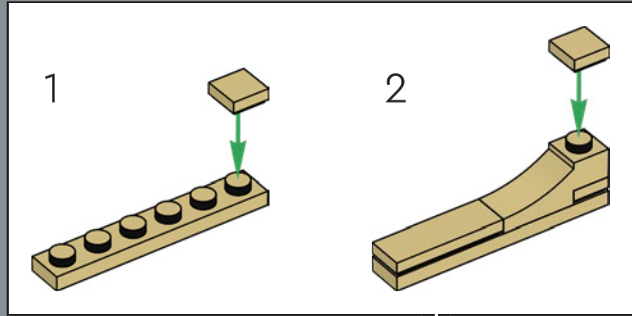
By evacuating rainwater, the characteristic gargoyles also serve to protect the cathedral from damage caused by excessive runoff. You can see this feature replicated in your model.

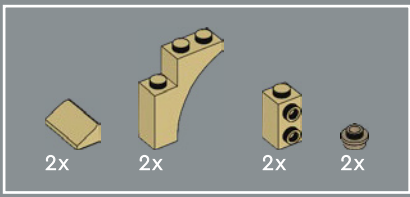

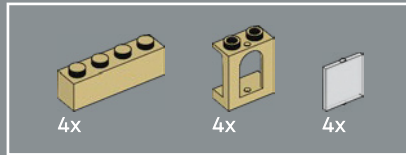
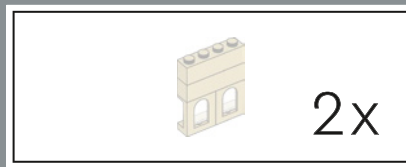


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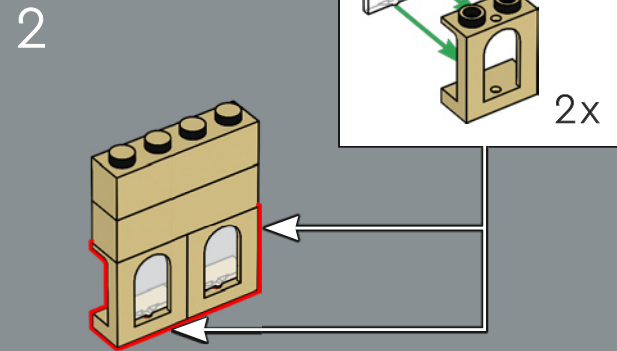
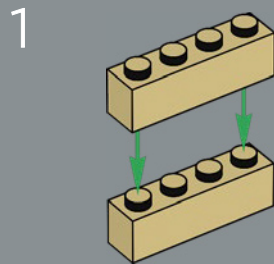


In 1225, nave flyers are fitted with channels that drain rainwater from the roof through the gargoyles.

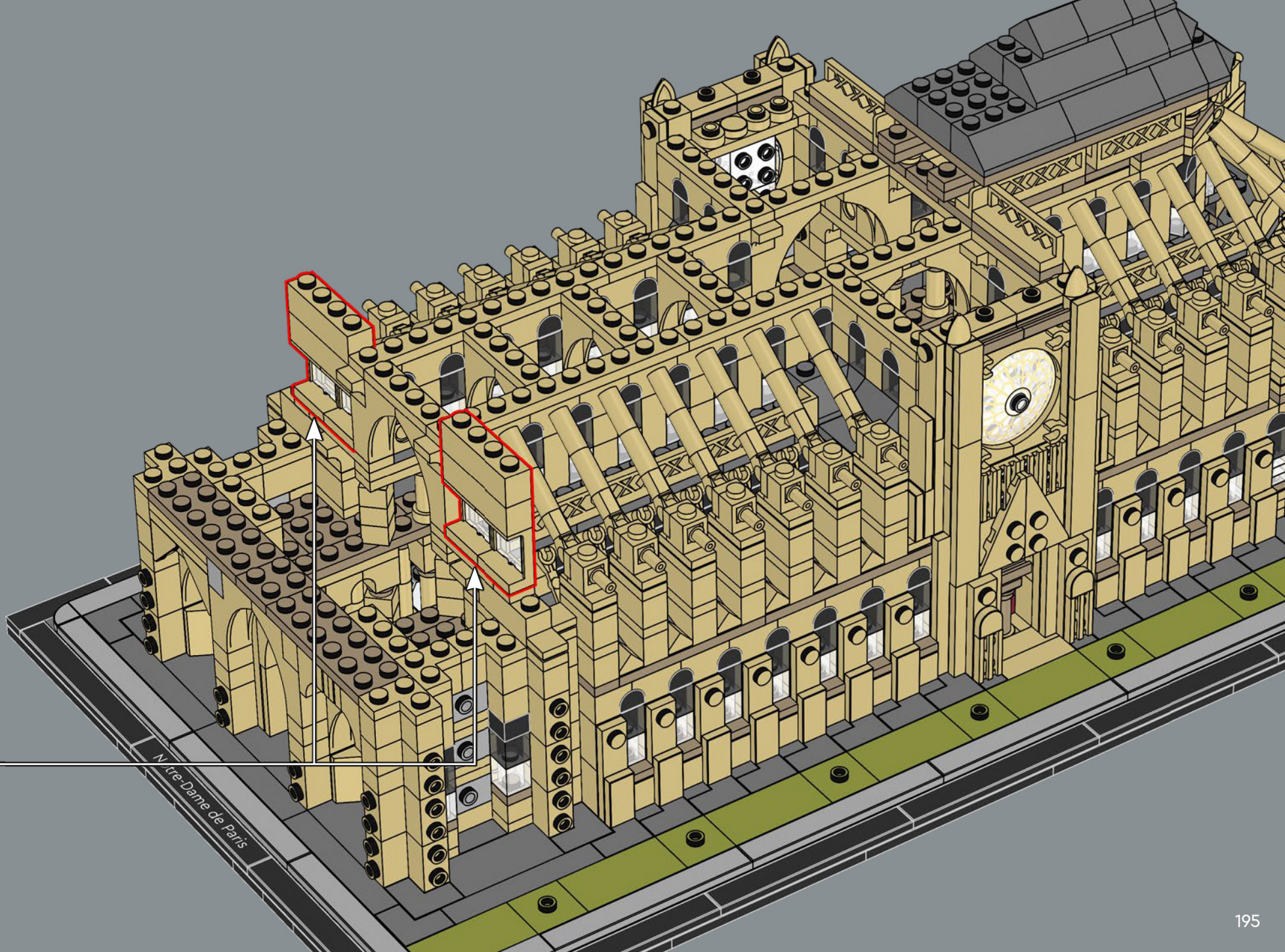




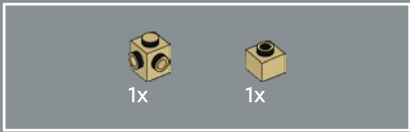
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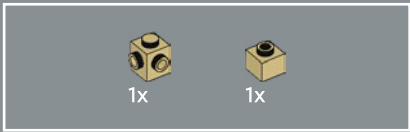
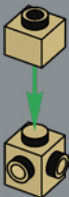

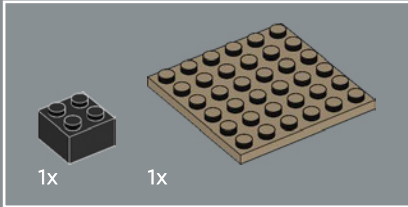
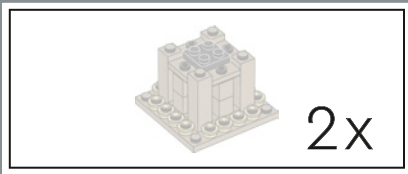
✂ In 1245, all towers were complete. As you build the towers, you can experience some of the inner workings of the cathedral's belfry and the superstructure that supports the legendary bells. Throughout the following five centuries, wear and tear set in. New generations of architects oversaw modifications, repairs and additions – like a lead-covered wooden spire constructed above the crossing. In 1300, the chapels were added to the perimeter of the choir.



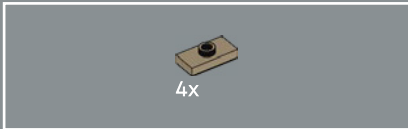
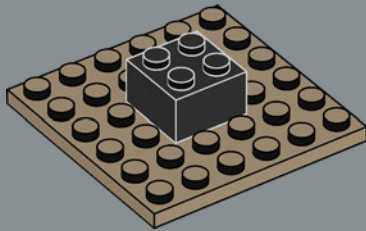


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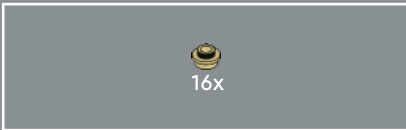
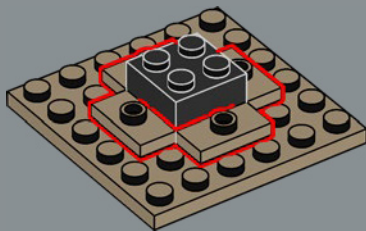




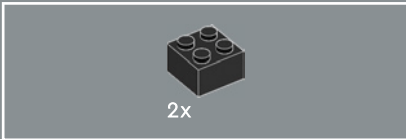
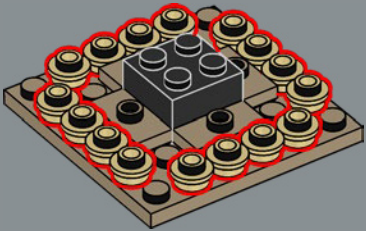
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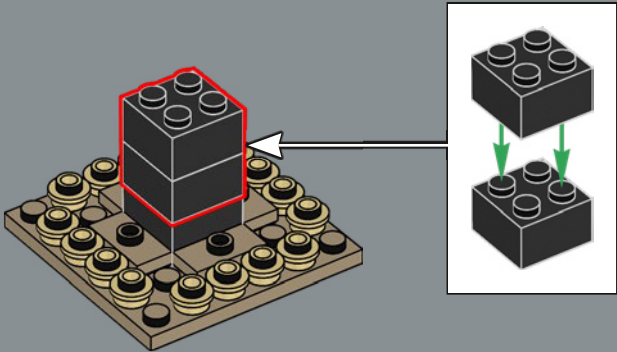
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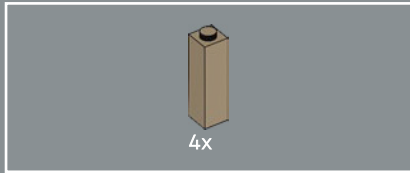
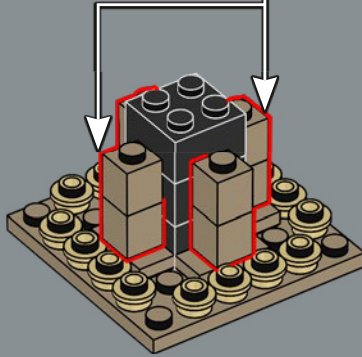
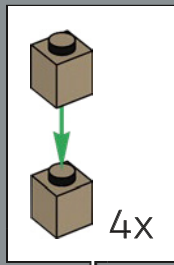


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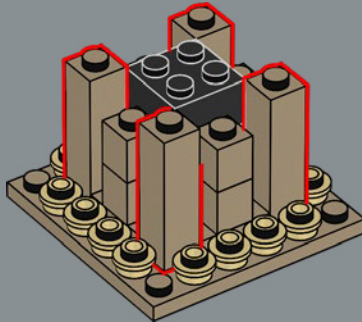




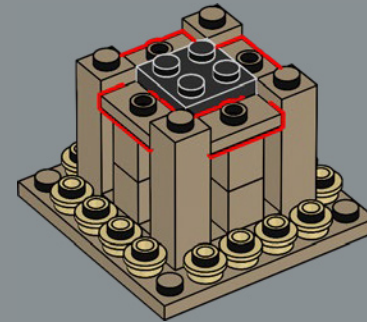
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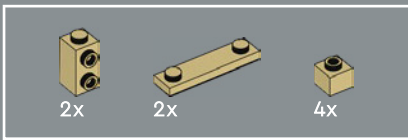
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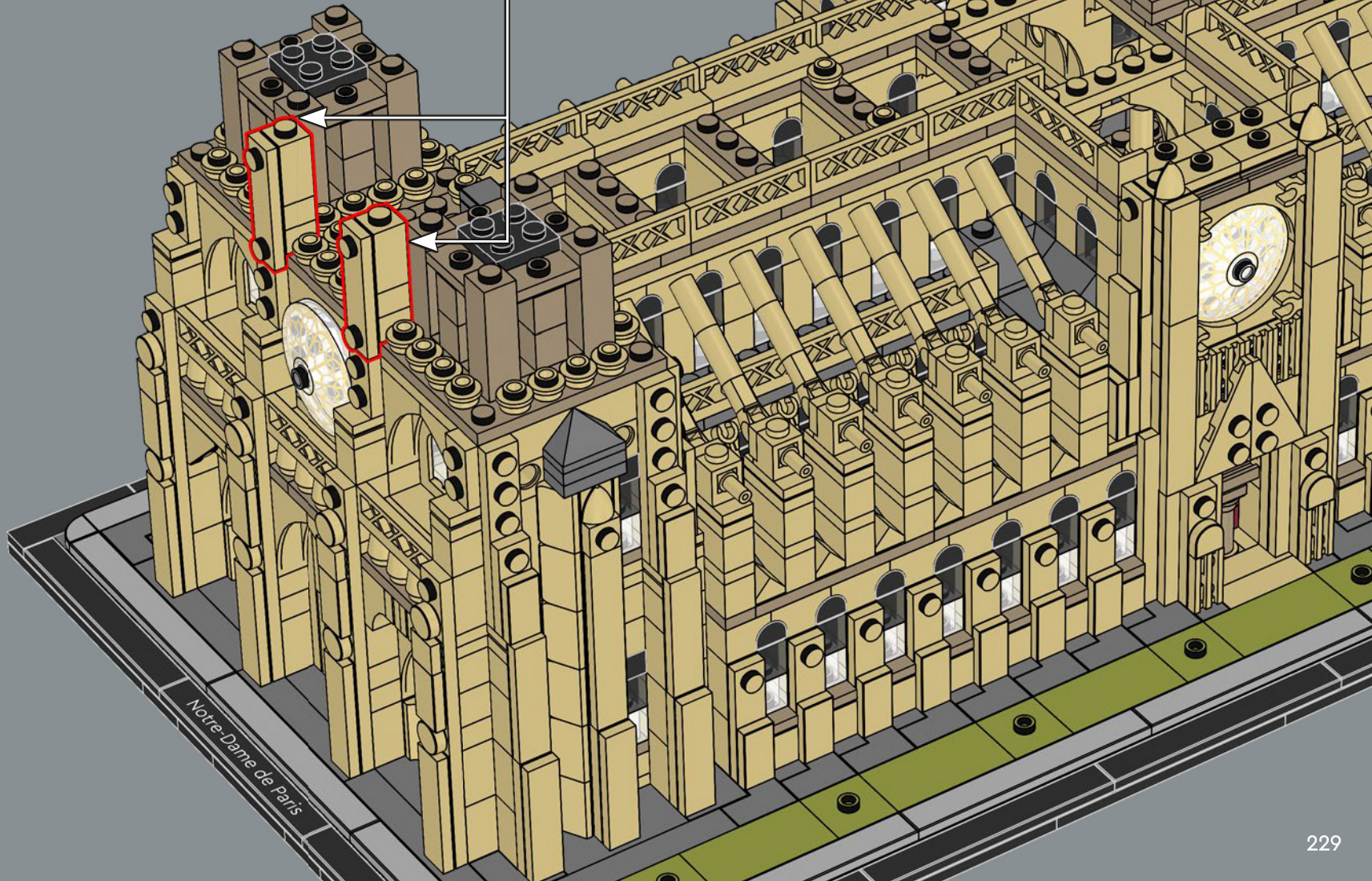
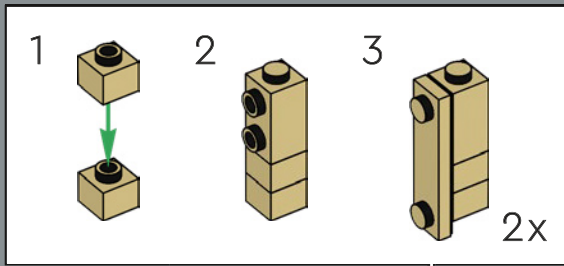

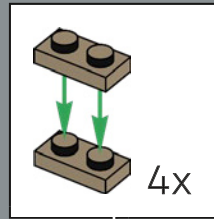
Timber for the wooden structure of the cathedral came from around 1,300 oaks, or the approximate equivalent of 21 hectares (51.8 acres) of forest!



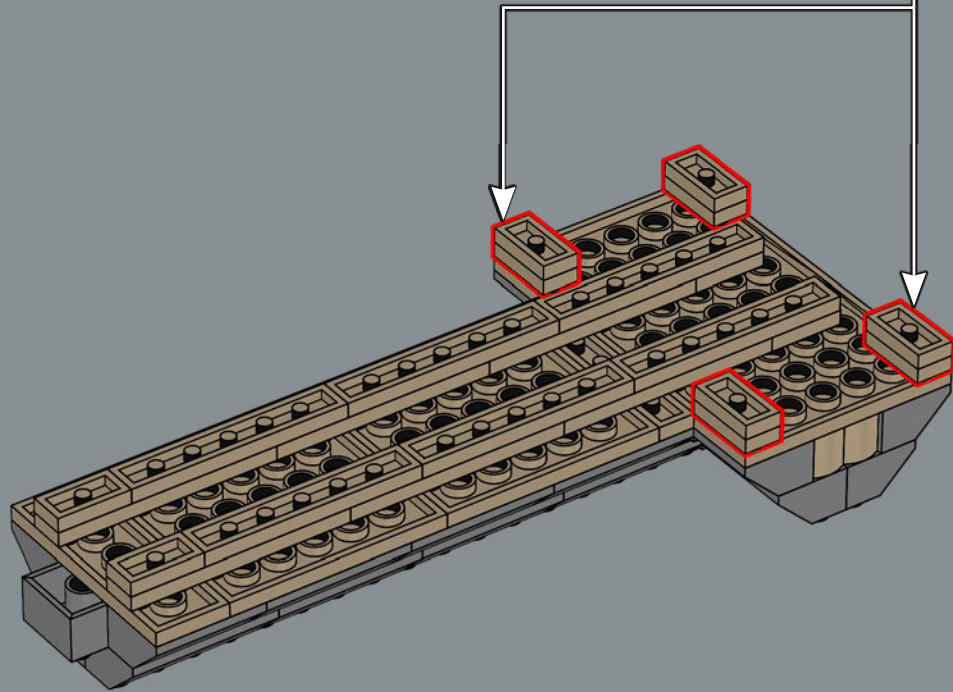


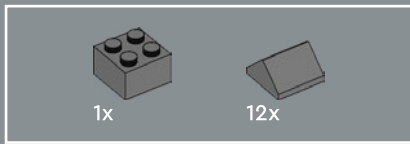

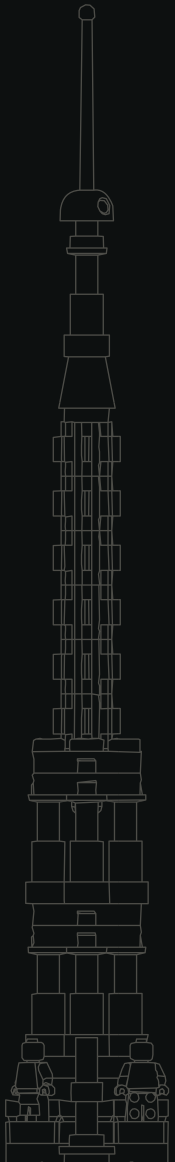


REVOLUTION AND CULTURAL LEGACY

✂ During the turbulent years of the French Revolution (1789-1799), the noble Notre-Dame Cathedral suffered damage and gradual decay. Windows, altars and tombs were destroyed and bells were dismantled to be melted down. In 1792, rioters tore down the statues from the Gallery of Kings and dismantled the spire. For a while, the cathedral was even used to store wine and other goods. But in the wake of the revolution, there followed an emerging awareness and appreciation of French national heritage. The publication and widespread international acclaim of Victor Hugo's *The Hunchback of Notre-Dame* (1831) cemented the cathedral's status as a cultural gem in world history. From 1843 to 1860, architects Jean-Baptiste Lassus and Eugene-Emmanuel Viollet-le-Duc led the cathedral through an extensive restoration campaign to the version of the historic landmark we know today.

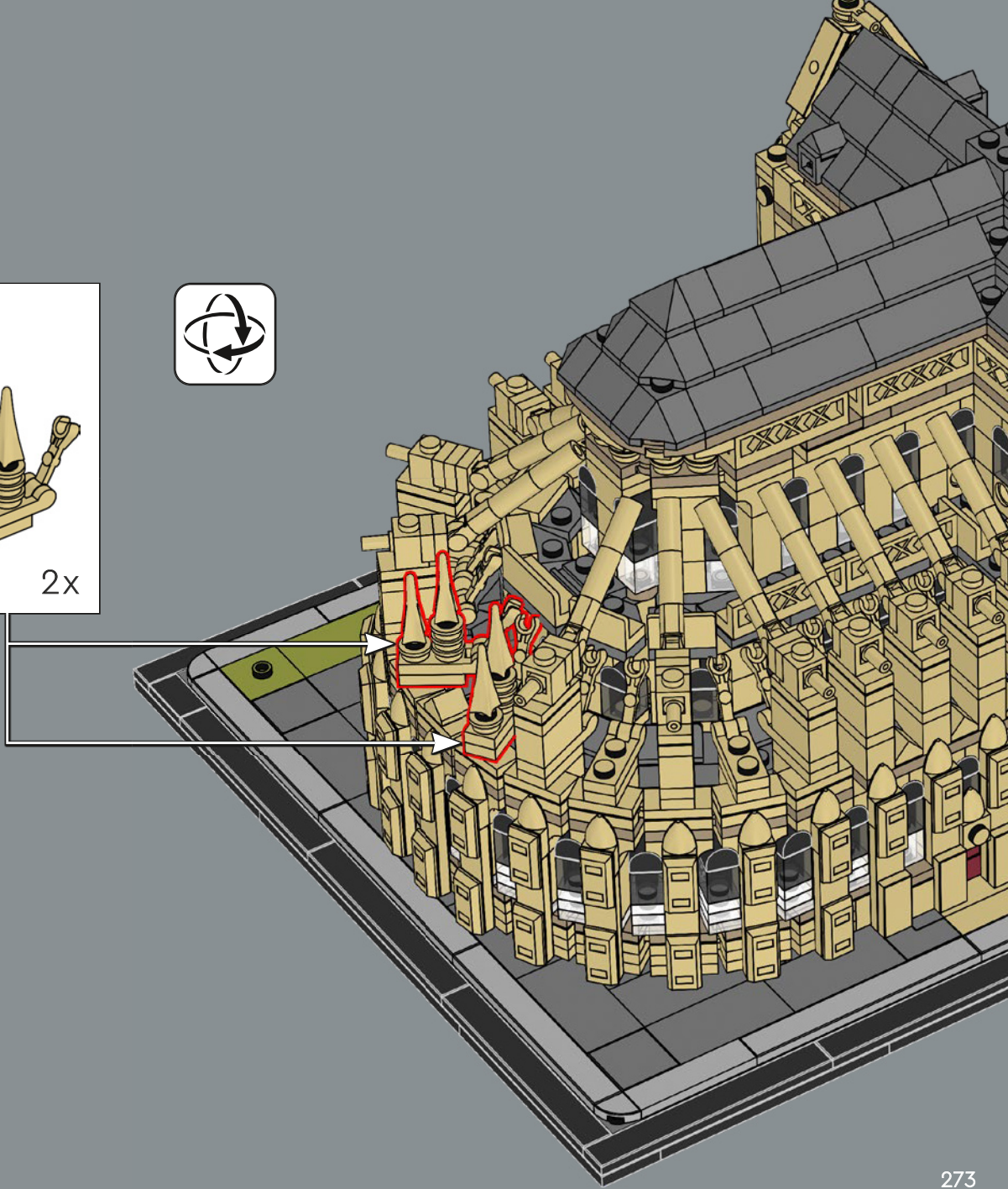
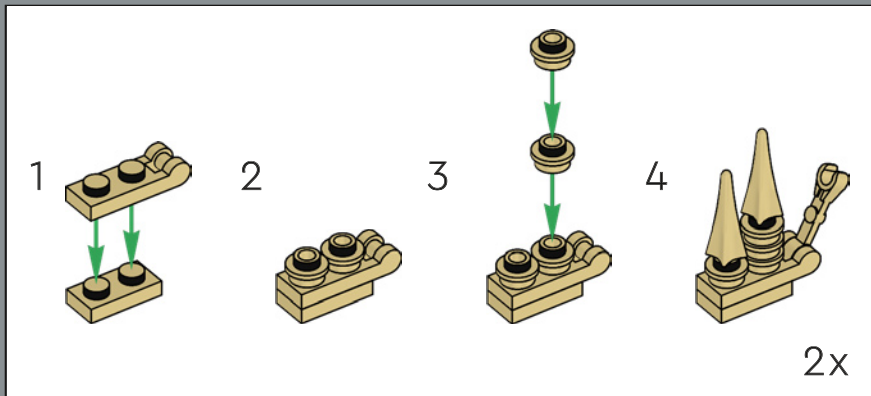

1860 - The spire is reconstructed, now slimmer and taller than the original, with the addition of sculptures of the 12 apostles along the slope of the roof.

The front doors of the LEGO® Notre-Dame Cathedral are open to allow us to peek through and feel the sense of awe you might experience when entering the intricate, vast arched space within.

The single statue facing the spire has the face of Eugene-Emmanuel Viollet-le-Duc, one of the architects of the Cathedral. He gazes at the spire in appreciation of the building, while the others watch over Paris.



FIRE AND REBUILDING

After the devastating fire in April 2019, the Notre-Dame Cathedral was forced to close indefinitely, pending reconstruction. As the world watched rescue workers extinguish the fire, global fundraising campaigns raised overwhelming contributions towards the extensive rebuilding efforts in record time. A testament to the lasting impression the Notre-Dame Cathedral has left on people of all cultures throughout its lifespan, and to the incomparable spirit of Paris. With nearly 900 years of history packed into more than 4,000 LEGO® elements, we are excited to include this model in our LEGO Architecture collection.

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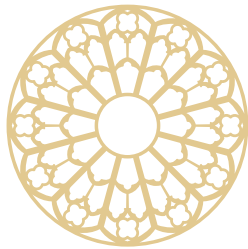
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
